LUMBER EXPORTS - The total lumber shipped from the port of Parramatta for the United Kingdom during the present year amounted to 39,519,638 superficial feet. This was carried in 40 vessels, aggregating 43,496 tons register. Mr. George McKean shipped 19,778,653 feet in 23 vessels of 22,429 tons, and Mr. W. M. McKay's shipments amounted to 19,720,288 feet, in 17 vessels, aggregating 21,007 tons.

Boyson, of San Francisco, California, in the memory of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Outhouse.

The waste scraps of leather are pulped at the factory and help to feed the hundred or more hogs that Mr. Ayer raises every year.
