Dealing with the insufficiency of the bill Mr. Parnell said that the land question was not so large as many people supposed, but they could make it large by the method of purchase proposed. If adopted, the bill must make the question a larger question. The principle of the bill was to buy whole estates, and \$40,000,000 was a ridiculously inadequate sum for the purpose. Ireland

In a typical case, a landlord at £100 yearly, who is encumbered to the extent of £1,000, is left, under the best conditions under this bill, with his present income of £40 reduced to £27 los. WORK AND WAGES.

Congressional Inquiry Into the Workings of the Labor Law.

Chicago Strikers Cause a Riot-The Labor Situation Elsewhere.

New York, April 23.—The sub-committee of the Joint Congressional Committee on Immigration continued its inquiry here to-day. Mr. T. B. McGuire, of the Knights of Labor, was further examined about the central labor law passed in 1885, through the agitation of the labor organizations. The law does not work satisfactorily, the witness said. Immigration was being stimulated by steamship and railway companies here and abroad through advertisements inserted in foreign papers to the effect that America is a land of milk and honey and that all immigrants have to do is to come here and gather.

A "CRUEL WAR."

Experience of Gen. Cutcheon While in a Maryland Hospital.

WASHINGTON, April 23 .- In the debate on the bill to pension soldiers who wer prisoners of war for a period of over 30 day or more at \$2 for each and every day they were held in confinement, Gen. Cutcheon and his old schoolmate, John Tarsney, were

were held in confinement, Gen. Cutchees, and his old schoolmate, John Tarsney, were leading participants. Tarsney, who was himself a prisoner of war, opposed the bill on the ground that a great many of the men were volunteer prisoners. In advocating the bill, Gen. Cutcheon said:
"I am very glad to say that I shall not be a beneficiary under this bill. Although on various occasions I received very cordial and pressing invitations to become a prisoner of war, I always respectfully declined. (Laughter). But it was my fortune while lying wounded in the general hospital at Annapolis, Md., to witness the arrival of the first steamboat load of prisoners of war that came there after the commencement of the exchange of prisoners in 1864. I trust that I shall never look upon the like again. I know that war is cruelty, that war is barbarism. Although from that moment those prisoners of war who came that war is barbarism. Although from that moment those prisoners of war who came from Libby prison and Belle Isle stepped on board that boat everything was done for them that human tenderness and love could suggest, yet when the boat reached the dock at Annapolis eight of them were already dead, four more died within the next 24 hours, four more died the succeeding day. As I passed through the great hospitals where the living lay it was such a spectacle of starvation and misery as I trust neither I nor any other American may ever lootupon again. They were awful examples or what the Southern prisons did for our men—not all, I am glad to say. Among that entire boat load there was scarcely one mnot all, I am glad to say. Among that entire boat load there was scarcely one who did not require to be either carried or assisted from the landing to the hospital wards, where I saw them languish and many of them die, and I could only inferfrom the ghastly remnant of humanity that came back to us what had been the sufferings which they had undergone. I know that those men were not willing prisoners, and no possible money compensation can make up to them for the misery and pain which they had suffered. I shall vote for this bill gladly, with the only regret that we can do no more for the victims of those terrible experiences."







DISASTROUS FIRE.

Shortly after I o'clock this morning smoke was noticed by P. C. Woolway coming from the windows in the third floor of Messrs. J. H. Chapman & Co.'s clothing and drygoods store, No. 126 Dundas street. The stable immediately gave the alarm and the department responded promptly. A second stream was then put on the third floor and roof and the spread of the fire to the adjoining buildings prevented. The blaze is supposed to have been started by a tailor's stove on the third floor, and from thence communicated to the second floor.

After the firemen had retired they were

After the firemen had retired they were called out a second time about 4 o'clock, some of the smouldering embers having again begun to blaze. While it lasted it was an extremely hot fire and the heat in the adjoining stores was unbearable. The firemen were compelled to seek the fresh air every few minutes and their work was carried on with great difficulty. The clothing and mantle-making departments were almost completely destroyed and with them a large quantity of valuable stock. The show-rooms down stairs were damaged to a large extent by the water which poured through the ceilings.

Mr. Chapman was seen, and he placed his loss at about \$25,000. Much of the stock which at first was thought untouched now shows evidences of a scorching, which makes the goods valueless. It was insured in the London & Lancashire for \$8,000: Queen's, \$10,000; Commercial Union, \$5,000 and Atlas Company \$5,000. Mr. Chapman cannot understand how the fire could start near the stove, as it has not been lighted for several weeks. He is of the opinion that it was caused by someone tramping on a match which might have fallen on the floor and smouldered for several hours without being discovered.

Chief Roe says it was the hottest place he was ever in. He noticed an iron bar across the doorway leading into the third floor which he says was red-hot.

The premises of R. S. Murray & Co., first door west of the Chapman premises, were badly smoked. The ceilings and walls were damaged to the extent of about \$200.

Will the Michigan Central Sidetract Detroit.

"It's rather funny to see the way Jas. F. Joy threatens not to play if things don't go to please him," said a railroad man yesterday. "Now, how would it doif the Michigan Central refused to play? Detroit people want to give everything to the new roads and take away as much s they can from the old." "But the Michigan Central is in now and

roads and take away as much room the old."

"But the Michigan Central is in now and must play," was suggested.

"I'm not so sure of that. Of course the Michigan Central is in here, but they don't need to play. Now just look at a map of Michigan. You see Ypsilanti. Now draw a line from Ypsilanti to the Michigan Central's crossing at Amherstburg and see how much shorter the distance is that way from Ypsilanti to Essex Center than by coming up through Detroit. The Michigan Central went to the expense of building that line from Essex Center to Detroit to bring the traffic through the city. Bringing this traffic here means the employment of a large force of men in the Detroit yards and is a benefit to Detroit in many ways. It would be a big advantage to the Michigan Central to side-track Detroit, for the through service is much more important than any local business furnished here. The crossing is better at Amherstburg, for it seldom freezes up, and for bridging it would be a great deal better, for the channel there is very narrow. If they made the change there would be no trouble about street crossings, for all that would be needed would be to run a plag train up from the crossing to Detroit, and the local traffic wouldn't obstruct the streets to any great extent. Of course this may not be done, but this talk about refusing to play can work both ways. The Michigan Central has built a fine depot here and done a great deal for Detroit, but nobody seems to remember it."—[Detroit Free Press.
