The Turkish officers had much difficulty in preventing their men from firing on the British troops. The garrison troops rushed to the shore from all directions, loading their rifles as they ran, and uttering threats against the British. The latter remained

In all cases, the court holds, where the second marriages have taken place inside of six months after the decree of divorce was obtained, the party so marrying is guilty of bigamy. This decision is based upon an interpretation of the law which holds that for a period of six months after the divorce is granted in this state, the divorced parties cannot legally marry again.





Ottawa, Ont., March 25.-The Supreme

Court decision in the West Prince election case, which is final, is of much interest to Londoners, because it has an important influence on the decision in the London election case next June. In this Prince Edward Island case, Mr. Hackett, a Conservative, carried the seat by a plurality of 45, stepping in between two Liberals. His election was protested, and one case of corrupt practice was proved. It was held to be trivial, and Mr. Hackett's counsel claimed that under the 19th section of the act passed in 1891 he should hold his seat. The trial judges, however, decided that though the only case proved was one of an agent having treated a voter while canvassing his vote, the candidate had not warned the agent against committing illegal acts. In other words, as in the London case secure the complete observation of the law, and one or more corrupt acts are proved, he loses his seat. Judge Ferguson has said that the London trial judges must be governed by the Sureme Court decision, which has upfirming the judgment unseating the member for West Prince. In the Londen case, two corrupt practices have already been proved, and many others are under consideration. A new election for West Prince will take place immediately, and the Maritime Province

The explosion occurred in the separating building, which, with four other buildings surrounding it, was blown to splinters. The destroyed factory was devoted to the manufacture of dynamite and Atlas powder. The shock of the explosion was felt five miles away.

Mr. Case was assisted by Mr. Prosser a student in the School of Mines and the first experiment astonished the only known method of securing energy from carbon by a chemical means has been through a galvanic battery, but the zinc is so expensive as to make this method impracticable as a substitute for steam. The inventor explained to his audience at Columbia that he had suc-

ceeded in doing with carbon what the galvanic battery does with zinc, caron or coal being very much cheaper He then attached the wires from his cell to an electric bell, and as soon pensed with, when this new system has coal the bell began to ring. This showed that the energy of the coal was doing the work. The wires were then unfastened by Mr. Case and attached to an electric fan. The fan flew around with lightning speed. Mr. Case then said that a remarkable illustration of economy in the conversion of fuels was furnished by animals, whose bodies were twice as economical as the steam engine. Onefifth of the potential energy of their food, he said, is converted into work, and four-fifths is converted into heat But this four fifths was not all waste, as the human body had to maintain an average of heat under varying climatic conditions. Mr. Case then explained the operation of the lungs in taking oxygen from the air. The blood from the lungs carries this oxygen through the arteries and to the tissues, whi become oxydized and so produce hea Mr. Case then performed an amaz experiment. He demonstrated that the chemical apparatus he has devised w extract force from blood just as we hibited a large test tube containing solution of haemogloblin from the blood of an ox. Holding the test tube up to the light, Mr. Case showed that it wa of the color of arterial blood, being fully oxydized. Then he added a reducing agent (a substance that absorbs oxygen) to the blood and exluded the air from the tube by means of a rubber cork. The contents of the tube took on the color of veinous blood. Mr. Case then pulled out the cork, admitting the air, and the blood then took in the oxygen and assumed the arterial color again. The lecturer explained that this was precisely what appened with the blood in the hirman body, and that the experiment might be performed again and again. Every time the reducing agent was introdu ed the blood in the tube changed color and when the cork was withdrawn it resumed its original hue. Mr. Case utilized this test tube as a miniature cell. 


