During the past week, Messrs, Rich, Goodenough & Rhinn, of Detroit, tohave been in St. Thomas, looking over that city as a prospective site for the

Nothing definite was done.

The St. Thomas papers contain nothing about the affair, as they are maintaining an agreed upon silence.

Disappointed With St. Thomas. It was learned, however, that the Detroit men were somewhat disappointed in that no proposition was submitted to them by the city representatives.

London's claims were laid before the members of the party, and were most favorably considered.

A proposition will be submitted to the St. Thomas council, after which London will be considered. The firm will employ from 1.000 men within five years.

It is understood that the Wilcox plant on Chelsea Green will be looked over by the capitalists. London Can Get It.

"London can get this steel company if it goes after it properly," said a gentleman to The Advertiser. "London is just as well situated for such an industry as St. Thomas.

"It's up to the manufacturers' committee to be up and doing." St. Thomas appears to feel that by keeping the matter dark it can "einch" it, but it is known that Londoners are cognizant of the negotia tions, and there may be something doing shortly.

May Submit Proposition.

OFFICIAL ON THE SUBJECT

But Rumor Is Persistent in Toronto and London That There Will Be no Camp Here This Year---All Other Camps To Be Dispensed With.

Col. Peters, D. O. C., stated to The Advertiser this morning that he had as yet received no word regarding the camp at London this summer,

and could not say whether it would or would not be held. Considering the enormous expense the Government would be put to in taking so many soldiers to Ottawa, he did not now think it likely that the regular camps would be held, although he expressed the opinion that the training camp would be far better for the men than the trip to Quebec.

Col. Peters thinks there is sure to be some dissatisfaction among some of the regiments, as they can not all go to Quebec, and they are sure to think they are being discriminated against.

In contradiction of the above, the following item appeared in yesterday's St. Thomas Journal:

"Col. Robertson has received a notice from Col. Peters stating that a composite battalion from the city corps of military district No. 1 shall train at London camp this year for a period of six days, commencing June 15, It is proposed to furnish, if possible, one or more companies "om the Twenty-iFfth Regiment for this battalion.

If the camp is not held here this year it will mean a loss of many thousands of dollars to the people of London, as the men usually spent all their pay here, and London merchants supplied the Government with the food they consumed.



FURNITURE IN TOMB

Welathy Man Building Mauscleum Like Bedroom for Wife's Ashes.

New York, March 9 .- A handsome granite mausoleum furnished like his first wife's bedroom in every detail is being built by John Jamieson of Rockaway, on his beautiful lawn, for the repose of the ashes of the wife now dead four years.

A year and a half ago Mr. Jamieson announced his intention of forming a second marriage, and introduced as his prospective zride, Miss Harriet Barber, then a teacher in a Rockaway public school.

The daughters thought their mother should be remembered in some marked way, and Mr. Jamieson and the woman who was to become his second wife agreed with them. The plan for the mausoleum, which is now approaching completion, was worked out between them.

It was the intention of Mr. Jamieson and his daughters to have the body of the first Mrs. Jamieson interred in the tomb. It was found that the authorities would not permit this, so her body was cremated and the ashes placed in an urn which will stand on the marble mantel.

Some of the first Mrs. Jamieson's personal effects and the furniture and bric-a-brac of her bedroom will be transferred to the tomb some day next week. The furniture will be placed just as she left it when she died, and the reproduction made as complete as possible.

MEET DEATH SMILING

Italian Murderer Goes to the Chair With His Face Beaming.

Ossining, N. Y., March 9 .- Antonio

Strollo, an Italian, who killed a man

in Van Cortlandt Park, New York, for he purpose of robbery, went to death in the electric chair at Sing Sing Prison today with a smile, after a cheery good-bye to those who had been summoned to witness the execution. Strollo showed the most extraordinary composure. When he entered the death chamber with a light, springy step, his face was beaming and the smile was never absent for an instant. Four contacts were made before the man was pronounced dead. Strollo killed Antonio Torselli, a felow countryman, in Van Cortlandt Park last summer. Torselli's face was literally slashed to pieces. In all there were 36 stab wounds in the murdered man's body. The execution was wit-

nessed by three New York assemblymen. They declined to give their names. Judge Edmund S. Terry, of Brooklyn, was also present. 
