CUNTINUE PURSUIT

Effort of Germans to Check French Pressure Has Proven Successful Only in Few Places-The Huns Must Make Greater Sacrifices Yet to Save von Hutier's Army.

With the French Armies in the Field, Aug. 29.—The rapidly succeeding military events not only confirm that the Germans have lost all control of their operations in the regions of the Somme, Avre and Olse rivers, but they indicate that the enemy's own retreat is getting out of hand.

The effort to stem the French pursuit by fighting rearguard actions with machine-gun sections, leaving a section at intervals of about 400 yards, was only locally successful. On ground especially favorable for that sort of resistance such as the terrain around Roye, it gained some time for the enemy, enabling him to move a great many guns and a considerable part of his material behind the Canal du Nord an i north of Noyon.

ARTIFICIAL LIMBS

FOR SOLDIERS MUST BE GOVT. STAMPED

Order-in-Council Passed To Protect Men in Need of Appliances.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.-In order to protect returned soldiers, who are amputation cases, from the competitive atten tion of the representatives of private manufacturers of artificial limbs it has been found necessary by the Government to pass an order-in-council en-forcing strict regulations in the mat-ter of the supply of artificial limbs to such returned men as require them. It has been found necessary to attach a strict penalty to any misrepresentations or false statements mad in connection or false statements made in connection with appliances manufactured and iswith appliances manufactured and issued by the Government. The order-in-council in question enacts that every artificial limb and appliance manufactured or issued by the departments of soldiers civil re-establishment shall be stamped with the words "issued by the Government of Canada." The penalty for forgery of this mark is punishable by a fine of from \$50 to \$200 or four months imprisonment.

With the British Forces in France, Aug. 29 .- Noon .- Ginchy, a town about two miles northwest of Combles, is reported to have been captured by Field Marshal Haig's forces this morning.

British troops also captured Belloy, Ashevillers, Herbecourt and Feuilleres. All these towns are within five miles of Peronne. Launching new local attacks and following up the advantage gained yesterday, the British today moved forward along a large part of their battlefront.

The French having reached the backwaters of the Somme, the British just north of them have made long strides, and themselves this morning were only about three miles from the river at Brie, with the enemy being rapidly forced out of the triangle formed by the right angles of the river and the advancing British line, which strikes it in the north just west of Ham.

GERMAN COUNTER-ATTACKS FAIL.

London, Aug. 29.—German counter-attacks east and southeast of Vis-en-Artois, east of Boiry and in the vicinity of Gavrelle, villages to the east of Arras, have been repulsed, according to the official statement issued at the war office today.

South of the Somme, British forces are keeping up their pressure against the enemy and are advancing eastward. Since August 21 the British have taken 26,000 prisoners and 100 guns.



From east of Nesle the fighting front follows the course of the Canal du Nord to Catigny, and then southward to Noyon. Catigny is surrounded on three sides, but houses transformed into blockhouses and bristling with machine guns are holding up the French for the moment. The enemy also is holding fast on the heights east of Catigny. There is very severe fighting at many places.

AMERICANS GAIN AT BAZOCHES BUT HUNS RETANE FISMETTE

American Army on the Vesie, Aug. 29.—American and German troops were engaged in spirited actions today in the regions of Bazoches and fisher. According to the latest report the fighting continues at both passing at Bazoches, while the Germans had recaptured Fismette, on the north bank of the Vesie opposite Fismes. The fighting has been marked by much stubbornness. Several days ago when the Americans advanced in the region of Bazoches, the Germans retired into a wooded stronghold, known as Haute Malson, just south of the Soissons-Rhelms road. Small detachments were left in the cellars in Bazoches to harass the Americans approaches from the west and maintained their advance during the night. Today the Americans made progress toward the town from the east and south, a descendent taking the eastern outskirts this morning. Since then they have made
