



Washington, April 11.—Willis L. Moore, chief of the weather bureau, issued a statement today that will bring peace of mind to folks who are worrying about a possible collision with Halley's comet. Here is what Moore has to say:

"Popular apprehension regarding harm to the earth and its inhabitants during the impending visit of Halley's comet to this portion of the universe is unfounded. The result of a collision between the earth and the comet would depend upon a mass of the comet, the velocity of the bodies and the angle of impact. A collision in the present case will be impossible owing to safety margin between the tracks of the earth and the comet of

"The tail of the comet, through which the earth will probably pass, will be noticeable only as an absolutely harmless luminous gas or dust, and may produce electrical and magnetic effects that can be detected only by self-recording instruments. A source of possible danger or discomfort to the earth attending cometary visits would be the falling into the sun of a comet. As the least distance between Halley's comet and the sun in the present instance will be more than 54,000,000 miles, the possibility of discomfort from solar excitations will not exist."



GRAND TRUNK TO

Proposes to Take Portion of the Trallic of New York Central.

BUFFALO TO THE SEA

Interchange in Michigan With Wabash and Pere Marquette Is Proposed.

New York, April 11.-The World says: The Grand Trunk, one of Canada's two powerful railway systems, proposes to invade New York State and New England and get an important share of the rich traffic monopolized for years by the New York Central and Hudson River systems. Co-operating with the Grand Trunk in this purpose is the New York, New Haven and Hariford Road.

Friday the up-state public service ommission gave a hearing at Buffalo on the application of the Buffalo, Rochester and Eastern Railroad to build a steam or electric road across the state from Buffalo to Troy. The real eastern terminus of the proposed road is Providence, R. I., but the pubic service commission only has to

deal with the territory in this state., Mystery as to Backer.

There has been the greatest ery about the backing of the Buffalo, Rochester and Eastern Railroad, those actually behind the project preferring to remain unknown, evidently with the hope of mininizing the hostility of the Vanderbilt-New York

Central interests to the project. This secrecy was carried to such an extreme that when the public service ommission gave its first hearing March 15 on the application it was denied because the financial ability of those behind the matter, to carry through the project, was not clearly established to the commission's satisfaction. The rehearing given Friday at Albany was the result, it is said, of the public service commission being convinced that all of the money needed to build and equip the road would be forthcoming.
