RAILWAYMEN ORDER GREAT STRIKE TO BEGIN LABOR DAY

ATTACKS AT VERDUN STOPPED--FRENCH PROGRESS

Railwaymen Order Strike HUNS ENRAGED To Start on Labor Day Uness Settement Found Declaration of War Came Like

Latest Proposition of Executive Rejected by Brotherhood and Railway Presidents Refuse to Accept Wilson's Plan.

CONGRESS ALONE CAN PREVENT STRIKE

President of States Will Present Grave Situation to Congress This Afternoon-May Legislate to Prevent Great Industrial War.

Washington, D.C., Aug. 29.—The statement presented to President Wilson by the committee of eight, denies that the judgment of society favors an eight-hour day, and declared that arbitration is the only proper way of settling industrial disputes.

The suggestion of President Wilson for a proposal including the principle of the eight-hour day, but postponing its effectiveness for a year pending investigation, was rejected by the railroad executives at the conference this morning. The action of the railroad presidents, taken in connection with the strike order of the employees, left President Wilson no alternative but to so to Congress in a five effort. 

On January 1, 1914, there were 30,1986 members, and the number had fallen to 144,259 on January 1, 1916, a decline of 52 per cent. For the six months since elapsed figures are not available, but it is probable that further calls to the colors have left not more than 40 per cent of the members at home.

The membership totals given include, however, a large number of female members, so that the decrease of mem members was considerably larger than the percentages indicate.

The number of unemployed has declined steadily. Money support had been granted on January 1, 1915, to 15,334, but this total had dropped on January 1, 1916 to 2,457. The greatest decreases in unemployment were in the case of book printers, woodworkers and metalworkers.

The influence of the war on the indions' treasury is shown by the fact that while there was a decrease of nearty five and a quarter million marks in receipts, the treasury balance increased some 330,000 marks in 1915 over 1914.
