Pace, a planter of Tallapoosa county, Ala., was today found guilty of holding negroes in involuntary servitude and sentenced to five years in prison. Mr. Pace was under eleven indictments and was found guilty under each indictment, but as he was sentenced to serve his punishments in all cases concurrently he will only suffer the single five-year penalty. This concession was made because of the advanced age of the defendant and his feeble condibeing represented that he might die before he reached prison. When the cases were called demurrers were filed in all of the cases and over-



The presses are gorged with tons of arguments for and against fiscal change.

The discussion of preferential trade

and free trade has been temporarily from Parliament to every chamber of commerce and public gathering in the realm. Mr. Chamberlain's Liberal-Unionist organization an-nounces the dissemination of literature, ostensibly for purposes of inquiry, but Mr. Chamberlain's mind was a solution of the word "creamery." Facts About Man's Growth. "The growth of mankind," said a scientist, "is an anteresting study. Recent statistics have proved that men's stature increases up to the age of 50 years. This is a refutation of the former belief, according to which men

stopped growing at 22 or 23. "Boys and girls see-saw oddly in the rapidity of their growth. The fastest growth experienced in life comes between the ages of 1 and 5 years. Boys and girls grow about equally here. From 5 to 10 the boys outstrip the girls, but from 10 to 15 the girls outstrip the boys. At 11 and at 14 the girls are the boys' superiors in weight. "But between 16 and 20 the boys forge ahead, taking at that stage a lead which they never again relinquish. The boys cease their perceptible growth at 23; the girls cease theirs at 20. From 23 onward to 50, men, however, continue to grow (no observations have been made on women), though this growth is, of course, slight. They also increase slowly in weight, but from 50 to 60,

their weight increases very rapidly. "Male strength increases most mark edly from the age of 12 to that of 19. From 19 to 30 it increases more slowly. From 30 onward it begins very slowly "Female strength increases most ra-

and was granted. The city engineer wrote to say that it was absolutely necessary that they should get gravel for repairs on Bathurst, Horton, Richmond, Craig and other streets in No. 1 ward. As Boss & Alexander had refused to deliver screened pit gravel and as they had called for fresh tenders and got bid, the engineer recommended using unscreened pit gravel for repairs under the present contract. He drew attention to a committee motion ordering him to use nothing but screened pit gravel; therefore until he got permission he could not use unscreened pit

Ald. Cooper thought that unscreened gravel would do-in fact thought it better. His discourse on the subject did not succeed in satisfying Ald. Gerry, who advised making the contractors live up to their agreement.
"Put the screws to them," he said. No one could tell him that they could not make the firm live up to their contract. He suggested letting the city solicitor deal with them, which Ald. Cooper thought would mean "another street railway business."

The latter moved that the matter be left to the city engineer and the chair-man, and in amendment Ald. Gerry pressed his suggestion to force the contractors to live up to their contract. The motion was carried. The paysheet, amounting to \$382 02. was passed and the board adjourned.
