New Rochelle, Jan. 25. - With the settlement of the claim of the heirs of Theodore H. Fajardo, of New Ro-New York Central Railroad Company for deaths in the Park avenue tunnel disaster two years ago has been dis-

posed of. Mr. Fajardo was 34 years old and was Spanish correspondent for the firm of A. Capen & Son, importers, of New York. He met a terrible death, being slowly scalded by steam from a broken pipe in the rear car of the train. Shortly before the accident Mr. Fa jardo bought a house from Adrian Is-elin. When Mr. Iselin heard of his death he drove to the Fajardo cottage and offered to supply the widow with all the money she needed until the case

The settlement of the Fajardo claim brings the total amount paid by the New York Central Company for accident and death claims growing the wreck to about \$1,240,000.



Passengers On Snow Bound Trains Did Not Suffer.

Farmers and Train Hands Looked After Their Wants,

The twenty-five passengers who were on the L. E. and D. R. R. trains which got stuck in the drifts at Glanworth on Thursday and Friday were none the worse for their experience. They were well looked after. On Thursday afternoon, when it was seen that there was no possibility of the trains getting out before the next day the train bands before the next day, the train hands visited the general store at Glanworth and secured a large quantity of provious, and these, with what a number of the farmers living in the immediate the farmers living in the immediate vicinity brought, were more than sufficient to meet all the requirements. Some of the passengers would not wait for relief to be sent from London and St. Thomas and they either walked or got farmers to drive them in, but the majority of them were quite contented to remain where they were. One of the number was a lady from this city, who is a frequent passenger on the road.

The passengers spent the night on the train. A few of the evening hours were very pleasantly passed. The cars were

very pleasantly passed. The cars were well heated, and to add to the pleasure well heated, and to add to the pleasure of the little party music was furnished by Tony Cortese's orchestra, which had been in St. Thomas the previous evening. At 11 o'clock berths were made of seats, and everybody spent the night as comfortably as could be expected.

On each of the two Lake Erie trains which were stalled in the drift there were two engines, and in each of these steam was kept up the entire time, thus steam was kept up the entire time, thus keeping the cars warm. The chief difficulty confronting the engineers in this regard was the supply of water, for it was quite evident that with steam in the tanks would not last for many hours. So the train hands got to work and by melting snow they managed to keep enough water in the tank for all pur-

The snow drifted several feet deep and when the two trains gave up all hope of getting out on Thursday the beauti-ful had piled up to the car windows. Two ngines on the first train in the procession were cut loose from the cars and attempted to make their way through a drift half a mile or more ahead, and in doing so they got into a worse fix than before, for when they came to a standdoing so they got into a worse fix than before, for when they came to a standstill the snow was far over the boilers and little could be seen of them except the top of the smoke-stack, and the upper portion of the cabs. Concessions were necessary to induce the promoters to make the eastern extension which they would not have undertaken if left to their own resources. The fact that they have asked for modifications is certainly not discreditable to the Government, as it is an evidence that the Government drove what the promoterconsider a hard bargain. If the contract was such a gold mine for them as the opponents of the scheme have been claiming why this demand for changes? On the other hand, if the eastern section of the road cannot be operated at a profit, even if it is built, why have the promoters undertaken to operate it, and pay the interest on the cost of







