HEROISM OF THE ELEVATOR BOYS
 Another Fire Horror Narrowly Averted at Chicago—Masonic Temple Ablaze.

Chicago, Jan. 25.—Fire in the Masonic Temple Saturday caused a panic among the 4,000 occupants of the building and did \$20,000 damage. All the occupants of the building escaped without serious injury through the bravery of the elevator men who remained at their posts, operating their cars while dense clouds of smoke filled the building. The fire broke out on the fifth floor in the rooms of Robert Friedlander & Co., manufacturers of X-ray apparatus. A lighted match carelessly thrown into a pile of excelsior is believed to have started the blaze. A number of X-ray vacuum tubes exploded the moment the great heat reached them. Robert Friedlander, senior member of the firm, realized the danger from these tubes and worked, until overcome by smoke, throwing them out of the windows.

The fire spread rapidly through the company's rooms to a light shaft, through which the smoke rose to the upper stories. Thousands of occupants of the building, with the memory of the Trocadero theater horrors before their minds, rushed into the elevators; many fainted in the scramble, but none were seriously injured. The large building was emptied within half an hour after the fire was discovered.

The men who had retained their senses. The elevator men stuck to their work like heroes, and continued to run their lifts until they were told every person was out of the building. Armed with axes and picks the firemen broke doors and windows. In the rotunda at the bottom of the elevator well, persons leaving the elevators after descending from the upper stories, were obliged to dodge heavy beams and fragments of stone and plaster falling in the rotunda from the fifth floor. The crowd of people on the streets watching the fire were thrown into a panic by the explosion, sending smarting fluid raining on the crowds below.

The fire was within an hour. Eighteen persons were injured as a result of the fire. R. Friedlander, in whose suite the fire started, was unconscious on the floor. He was overcome by smoke and chemical fumes. Twelve girls in the employ made their escape at the first alarm.

FEED THE BRUTE AND BE HAPPY
 Social Economics Club Applauds One Woman's Solution of the Husband Problem.

Chicago, Jan. 25.—The Social Economics Club, an organization made up of women representing a score of women's clubs, has been searching for the "essentials of a happy home."

Mrs. Edward A. Bigelow appears to have suggested one "essential," if the applause which has greeted her words by the "other half" can be taken as a criterion. She said:

"Feed the brute good, well cooked food and forgive him."

The wife and mother must recognize in him a piece of household furniture not altogether ornamental, but occasionally useful, but very much needed when wanted."

"It has taken ages of repression to bring the husband and father to his present position of object slavery to the wife and mother. He is the victim of a process that began in the Garden of Eden and gives no promise of ending until he is able to the reward that awaits the humble on the other and brighter shore."

LIPTON HELPS LYNCH
 Irish-Boer Leader Released by British Government.

London, Jan. 25.—The Daily Telegraph says it understands that "Colonel" Arthur Lynch, who commanded the Irish brigade against the British forces during the war in South Africa, and who was afterwards convicted of treason and sentenced to imprisonment for life, was liberated Saturday morning "on license." Lynch has not received the royal pardon, Lynch, who completed a year in prison last Saturday, was the only political offender in prison in Ireland. Patrick A. McHugh, ex-member of the House of Commons, who recently shared this distinction, was with Lynch, was also released from jail. The release of both, it is said, is due to the mediation of Sir Thomas Lipton with King Edward. Lynch will enjoy personal liberty and may even leave the country should he care to, but he is disqualified from sitting in Parliament or from holding any public office. When Mrs. Lynch came to Sir Thomas Lipton to thank him for what he had done for her husband, she was so overcome that she was unable to find words to express her gratitude, and impulsively taking hold of Sir Thomas' hand she kissed it.

AN ATROCIOUS DEED
 Horrible Butchery of a Young Woman by Her Insane Brother.

Dunkirk, N. Y., Jan. 25.—Miss Hannah Hall, 30 years old, was murdered early yesterday at her home in Van Hook street, Dunkirk, by her brother, Isaac Hall. Hall is about 33 years old. He is in jail at Fredonia, having given himself up after the murder. He declares that he obeyed a divine behest when he killed his sister. He used four weapons—a pistol, a jackknife, a pocket knife and an axe. Her head was severed from the body and crushed into a pulp. Hall says he attacked his sister while she was asleep. He shot her, and then dragging the wounded woman through the house, cut her throat with both knives. In the woodshed he placed her neck across a chopping block and completely severed the head from the body. Hall and his sister lived alone. Both their parents are dead. Until this time Hall was considered a model farmer, and his sister was a great favorite among a wide circle of friends. Hall was religiously inclined, and there is no doubt he lost his mind, his insanity taking the form of a religious mania.
