Tangier, Morocco, Sept. 30. — The Governor of Arzila, a small seaport 25 miles from Tangier, who was the father-in-law of the former war minister. El Menebhi, has been murdered at Arzila by people of the surrounding tribes. The murder was committed out of revenge for the action of the governor in imprisoning members of the nor in imprisoning members of the tribes. The murderers released the prisoners at Arzila and killed many of the townspeople. Russian Gunboat Sighted Off the Coast of Alaska.

Bellingham, Wash. Sept. 20.—Members of the crew of the Pacific Packing and Navigation Company's tug C. C. Cherry, Navigation Company's tug C. C. Cherry just arrived from Alaska, report sighting a Russian gunboat. A heavy storm prevailed during the second day out from Nushaki, and in the vening the captain of the Cherry decided it was best to tie up for the night rather than run the risk of being beach-ed in the uncertain waters. When Unimak Pass was reached the anchor was dropped. The Russian gunboat was anchored in the same pass, not half a mile from the Cherry, and was plainly visible to the crew of the American vessel. 



Enthusiasm Caused by the Prospects of the Canal's Completion-Report From Consul-General Gudger.

In a report to the Department of Commerce and Labor United States Consul General Gudger says: "The republic of Panama, the young

est member in the galaxy of nations, \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* commenced its national life Nov. 2 1903, with practically the unanimou support of the people of the isthmus. Such were the conditions that not drop of blood was shed or a gun fired in its defense. Almost as one man the population arose and declared for an independent and free government. Men of all classes and callings joined in the movement and enlisted under its banner. The soldiers of the mother country, Colombia, stationed here without a dissent declared their allegiance to the new republic.

"At a mass meeting a declaration of independence was enthusiastically adopted, and a junta of three men was named to conduct the provisional government. The news spread through the interior, and all towns and provinces, without exception, joined the move-

"Later general elections were ordered and a constitutional convention was assembled in the city of Panama, which adopted a constitution, republican in form, which resembles in almost every respect the constitution of the United States. The tide has now set in in the direction of setting aside more land for public parks, and there is no doubt that London will soon obtain special legislation, as Toronto has done, to allow the council

which to purchase private property for Another thing is the question public playgrounds for the children. It is far better for the younger generation to hold its sports in the atmosphere which is associated with big trees, fair flowers and stretches of green grass, and to be educated up into the love of natural beauty, than to have for their playgrounds only the thoroughfares and small backyards where pavements and houses and other works of man's hands force themselves on the mind. The children will only too soon be bound down to the latter class of objects when they grow up and have to earn their living. The products of human effort are after all very sordid when com-pared with those of nature.

The question, therefore, is one of great importance, and is daily growing

more so as the bounds of the city widen and the country recedes farther and farther into the distance. Toronto has awakened to the consideration of the question only when extremely little land is available within the city limits for parks and playgrounds. Let London not make the same mistake. Moreover, money devoted to such an end is not only not wasted, but produces big effects from a financial point of view, which are very much to be desired. The money which has been expended on Victoria Park, for instance, has been covered many times by the greatly enhanced financial value the private property roundabout, and
