NINTH ANNUAL REPORT.

The Ninth Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors and Friends of the Boys' Home took place on Monday, the 8th February, 1869, at the Home, in George Street. A large number of ladies and gentlemen were present. Among the latter were the Mayor, Professor Wilson, Hon. G. W. Allan, Rev. E. Baldwin, Colonel Anderson, Mr. Hague, Mr. J. G. Hodgins, Mr. John Macdonald, Mr. Beardmore, Mr. McCord, and other influential friends of the Home, On motion of the Sheriff, the Mayor took the chair, and opened the proceedings with a brief address. He then called on Mr. J. G. Hodgins to read the Secretary's Annual Report, which he did as follows :—

The Lady Managers of the Boys' Home have much pleasure in laying before their friends and the public their Ninth Annual Report ; and, in reviewing their labours for the year that is past, feel that they have abundant cause to thank the Giver of all good for the continued success which has attended their humble efforts. There are now 50 boys in the " Home." During the past thirteen months 38 have been admitted. Of these were :—

Orphans.....	8
With mothers only	11
With fathers only	6
With both parents.....	13

During this period 17 have been removed by their parents ; 6 have had situations found for them ; 2 have absconded ; 1 died ; and 18 have been placed with farmers and others in the country, on trial, 8 of whom have been apprenticed, and are doing well ; in proof of which we would subjoin a few extracts from letters received from parties employing these boys. One writes :—" I have great pleasure in testifying that WILLIE is one of the best and most trust-

worthy of boys. He has given myself and every member of my household the greatest satisfaction since he came to me. He is quite happy, and his rosy cheeks show that he is in the best of health." Another says :—" ROBERT is growing to be large. I send him to church every Sunday morning, and also to school. He can read and write. He is going to school this winter again. He likes learning very well."— And a third, in sending the boy's likeness, adds this pleasing testimony :—" ARTHUR is doing well, and appears very healthy. If you knew him when he came to me, you will see there is a great improvement. I hope to live, please God, to bring him up orderly and soberly, and give him industrious habits, with the fear and love of God, if possible." Many more, with similar accounts, could be quoted ; but these will suffice to show the public that the aim and object of this Institution, namely, the rescuing of miserable, destitute children from a life of vice and wickedness, has not only been attained, but that greater results may be anticipated, and that we may hope to see many of these boys grow up to be good, honest men, doing their duty faithfully in that state of life unto which it shall please God to call them.

Mention has been made of six boys having had situations found for them. To the case of two of these, named William Costello and Edward Gornell, respectively aged 14 and 16 years, the managers would draw the attention of the public. They were sent out from England, by the *Nova Scotian*, last September, in accordance with a desire which had been repeatedly expressed by some philanthropic gentlemen connected with the Industrial Homes of London, to make trial of the facilities possessed in Canada for finding occupation for boys when they attain a sufficient age. The great difficulty of finding suitable outlets of this kind at home, constitutes an impediment to their good work, of which, happily, we have no experience here. The expenses of these boys to Quebec were paid by Quintin Hogg, Esq., of

London, and the remainder by one of our own citizens, interested in the movement. On arriving in Toronto, they were lodged at the "Home," till situations could be obtained for them, and during their brief residence there conducted themselves in the most satisfactory manner. Situations were speedily found for them—Mr. James Lesslie, of the Willows, and the Rev. J. S. Walker, of Campbelford, having kindly taken them into their service; and it is gratifying to be able to report that both of them are giving the greatest satisfaction to the gentlemen who have thus taken in charge to guide them in entering on their career in a new country. The importance of the course thus adopted, in admitting these boys to the shelter of the "Home," until some suitable situations could be obtained for them, is painfully illustrated by the fact, that there are now in the City gaol five boys sent out in like manner from London last year, from an Industrial Institution, under the presidency of the Earl of Shaftesbury, but owing to the want of any friendly shelter and advice on their reaching this City, they have lapsed into crime, and are now augmenting our costly criminal class, instead of adding to the industrious and useful members of the community.

The health of the children has been unusually good during the past year; and notwithstanding the severely trying heat of the summer, we have but one death to record. In the spring five of the boys were attacked with measles, of a rather dangerous nature, but under the care and skilful treatment of Dr. Thorburn, who still continues his valuable services to the "Home" gratuitously, they all recovered, and the disease was prevented from spreading.

The elder boys still attend the Common School in Victoria Street, whilst the younger ones are taught at home, by Miss Croly, the new assistant; and the great improvement already made by them is highly gratifying to the Committee, as showing the satisfactory result of this arrangement.

The Managers would again express their grateful acknowledgments to C. S. Gzowski, Esq., for his generous donation of \$100, to provide fuel for the "Home"; to Professor Wilson, for a most interesting lecture delivered in December, 1867, in aid of the funds of this Institution, and by which was realized the handsome sum of \$180 80; also to Benjamin Lyman, Esq., of Montreal, who, though living at a distance, takes a warm interest in the well doing of the "Home," and has again sent the most welcome contribution of \$100; to C. J. Bridges, Esq., for a grant of twelve cords of firewood; and to those ladies and gentlemen who so kindly assisted at a Concert last Spring, the proceeds of which, amounting to \$347 55, proved a most timely addition to the funds of the Institution, which at that season of the year were in a very exhausted state.

The Treasurer's annual statement of accounts will be found, as usual, annexed; and in thanking the public for their continued subscriptions and hearty co-operation, the Managers would particularly draw attention to the contribution of \$90, the proceeds of a ball, most generously sent them by the cabmen of this City, and for which they would take this opportunity to offer them publicly their warmest thanks. Their best acknowledgements were also due to Governor Allan and the Matron of the Jail, for kindly allowing a quantity of clothing to be made up in that Institution, by the inmates; also to Mr. Robert George, for his unwearied care and watchfulness over the boys during the absence of the Matron, Mrs. Munro, for the space of four months in the summer, thereby preventing the loss of her motherly kindness and attention being felt as much as it otherwise would have been; and in this connection the Committee have much pleasure in expressing their satisfaction with her superintendance and good management of the Establishment. To Mr. Hamilton, also, the Managers would express their hearty thanks, for his never-ceasing labours in behalf of the "Home." To his exertions they are indebted-

ed for the following contributions, which they would gratefully acknowledge, viz. :—From Gould Street Congregational Sunday School \$14 ; from Alice Street Primitive Methodist Sunday School \$30 ; and from Mrs. Barber, of Streetsville, fifty yards of cloth and some blankets. To the Editors of the "Leader" and "Telegraph" the Managers would offer their special thanks, for most obligingly inserting all notices and matters relating to the Institution free of charge. They would also express their thanks for the sum of \$35, the proceeds of a collection taken up in St. Peter's Church ; nor can they close their list of acknowledgements without making particular mention of the liberality of Messrs. Parsons and Fiskens, who have supplied the "Home" gratuitously with coal oil throughout the past year ; and also of the butchers, bakers, and market gardeners of this City, who stock the larder from time to time with meat, &c. &c., and to all of whom the Managers would most gratefully offer their thanks.

In bringing their Report to a close, the Committee would call the attention of the public to the following facts, viz., that the building of the "Home" cost \$5,000, and the land \$4,000, \$500 of the latter sum being still unpaid ; and when it is remembered that this Institution has no grant from Parliament, and that all its expenses have to be met by voluntary contributions, it will not be wondered at that its claims are so continuously brought before the public. A petition for a grant was again made to Parliament this Session, but without success. The Managers will not, however, cease to hope that the urgent claims of this Institution may yet be recognized, and that another year may find them included in the estimates. In the meantime, they will still trust that the generosity and interest which have thus far been shown them will be continued, and that with the blessing of God, their good work may be permitted to prosper.

Medical Report of the Boys' Home.

I have much pleasure, in this my Ninth Annual Report, to congratulate the Managers of the "Home" on the general excellent health of the young inmates. During the year there has been but one death; and such cases as required treatment were for the most part mild in their character, and of short duration,—the happy results of the system which has been pursued, of affording good nourishment, warm clothing, and of giving great attention to personal cleanliness. Mrs. Munro, your excellent Matron, deserves every credit for her strict attention to the directions I have from time to time given, and, I may add, for her constant care and anxiety for the welfare of her charge, and the success of the "Home."

I continue to think that the plan of sending the boys to the Common Schools is attended with the best of effects. It induces order and punctuality, affords good exercise, and by contact with other children a wholesome rivalry is encouraged, which may prove beneficial to them in after life.

Moved by Professor Wilson, seconded by James Lesslie Esq., and Resolved :—That the Managers desire, with heartfelt gratitude, to acknowledge the watchful providence of God over the “Home” during the past year ; and they would fervently unite in imploring that Divine wisdom and protection be graciously vouchsafed to them during the present year.

Moved by the Rev. E. Baldwin, seconded by Geo. Hague, Esq., and Resolved :—That a work which has for its object the rescue, shelter, and training of so many neglected or houseless wanderers of our streets, appeals directly to every lover of the Saviour, who Himself has declared that “It is not the will of your Heavenly Father that one of these little ones should perish” ; and the Managers therefore commend it, with affectionate solicitude, for continued support, to the Christian benevolence and sympathy of the citizens of Toronto.

Moved by the Hon. G. W. Allan, seconded by A. T. McCord, Esq., and Resolved :—“That the cordial thanks of the Managers are due to the Surgeon of the “Home,” for his kind services during the year. They would also gratefully acknowledge the generous aid received from many gentlemen and friends during the same period, in support of the Institution.

OBJECT OF THE BOYS' HOME.

Duties of the Board of Management and Officers.

—The Institution is open to boys of the ages mentioned in 2nd Rule of the Regulations, the claims for admission being the utter friendlessness of the applicant, or being a child of drunken and dissolute parents ; the object of this Institution being the prevention of juvenile crime, by training these poor outcasts in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

The management is vested in a Committee of Ladies, chosen from the subscribers, at the Annual General Meeting, in September of each year ; said Committee to consist of thirty members, from among whom eight shall be chosen as

Directresses ; and among them there shall be a 1st and 2nd Directress, Treasurer, and Secretary.

The 1st Directress, or in her absence one other Directress, shall preside at the monthly meetings, audit and sign the accounts presented for that purpose by the Treasurer, propose and declare the resolutions, and sign the minutes of each preceding meeting.

The Treasurer shall receive and keep an account of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as also the earnings of the boys, a separate account of which must be kept with each. All the accounts must be presented each month, at the meeting of the Managers, for the signature of the first Directress, or in her absence, the Lady presiding.

The Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society ; keep a list of the names, ages, and peculiar circumstances, as far as practicable, of all the boys, in a book provided for that purpose ; attend at each monthly meeting, take the names of those present, and minute the proceedings in a book, which must be read at each ensuing meeting, and be signed by the presiding Lady.

Two members of the Committee, in rotation, shall visit the " Home " daily, each week ; inspect the house ; ascertain from the matron the conduct of the boys ; and enter a report at the weekly meeting on the Monday.

The Weekly or Finance Committee shall consist of the Directress, Treasurer, Secretary, and two of the Committee, who shall have been appointed to purchase or otherwise obtain the necessary clothing for the boys. Three shall form a quorum, and their order shall be sufficient authority to the Treasurer to advance the money requisite for the above purpose, or such things as may be considered necessary for the " Home."

The General Committee shall meet on the second Monday in the month, at three o'clock, p.m. Each meeting shall be opened with prayer. The minutes of the preceding meeting having been read and signed, the vouchers of the Treasurer produced and signed, the Secretary shall inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place during the last month, and the 1st Directress shall put before the meeting such resolution as may be put into her hands, take the votes, and declare the decision. Seven shall form a quorum ; and when a tie arises, the presiding Lady shall give the casting vote. All admissions that have taken place

during the past month shall either be ratified or disallowed, at the discretion of the meeting.

As soon as the meeting is opened, all conversation not addressed to the presiding Lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

Rules and Regulations of the Boys' Home.

I. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the boys ; to conduct the household affairs generally ; to admit applicants with the doctor's certificate, subject to the approval of the weekly Committee ; and she shall daily see to the personal cleanliness of each boy, and every morning and evening conduct family prayer.

II. Boys from the ages of 5 to 14 are admitted as inmates, and none shall be placed in a permanent situation until he has been one year in the Institution. This rule may be suspended under peculiar circumstances, at the discretion of the Managers.

III. The boys shall rise at six a.m. from 30th April to 30th September, and at seven a.m. from 1st October to 1st May ; the time for going to rest being from six to eight p.m. Their meals to be at regular hours—Breakfast at eight a.m., Dinner at twelve, and Tea at half-past five p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals, by one of the elder boys ; and all hours not occupied by such meals, or by instruction, to be employed, under the supervision of the Matron, in bodily exercise, house cleaning, or in play.

IV. All the boys shall regularly attend Sunday School, and also Divine Service, in a Protestant Church, every Sunday, in charge of the Matron ; and in the afternoon receive such religious instruction as can be given by the Matron, or any visiting friend to the Institution.

V. The charge for each boy of parents or friends who are able to pay shall be \$1 50 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one boy of the same parent or friend gains admittance, a reduction shall be made, as approved of by the ladies of the weekly Committee.

VI. Prompt and implicit obedience must be given to the orders of the Matron.

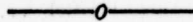
