STANDARD of minimum wages for women employed in all retail stores has been fixed in Massachusetts. The State Minimum Wage Commission issued a decree effective the first of the year providing that "no experienced female employee of ordinary ability shall be employed in retail stores in Massachusetts at a rate of wages less than \$5.00 a week,' and that "no other female em ployee of ordinary ability shall be paid at a rate of wages less than \$5.00 a week."

While the provisions of the Massachusetts laws are not man datory upon employers, neverthe less, the action of the Comission focuses public attention upor what has been found to be a bare living wage in this employment It must be a short-sighted employ er indeed who will subject himself to just public criticism by forcing the women in his store to work for less.

Here in this city we have girls employed at such magnificent weekly stipends as \$3.00 and in some cases even less. How can girl keep the straight road, sup port herself and in many cases widowed mother as well on such a salary? They toil from early morning till late at night and even in some stores along the street the act of being caught sitting down during business hours may mean dismissal. Girls who are compelled to earn their living in the


