WOLFVILLE, N. S., SEPT. 16, 1904.

At Wolfville the works are in active operation, some 80 tons of iron being turned out daily. The quantity of iron now piled up is very large—probably a million dollars' worth, or more.

Dr. George Lorimer, pastor of the Madison Avenue Baptist church, New York, and formerly of the Tremont Temple, Boston, died at Aix-les-Bains, France, Sept. 9th, at the age of seventy-one years. This distinguished preacher, for a long time pastor of T. Remond Temple Boston, had gone to France for his health.

It is understood that Archbishop Worrell, the newly elected Bishop of Nova Scotia, is neither distinctly a High or Low Churchman, but holds moderate views. He was born at Smith's Falls, Ont., in 1855, educated at Trinity University, Toronto, and held several parishes before going to Kingston, where he has lived in recent years.

R. J. Byrnes, M. P., had a grand reception in St. John Thursday evening. He spoke for two hours at the York Theatre to a large audience. He was well received by his enthusiastic friends. Hon. Geo. E. Foster was also present and spoke in his usual interesting and forcible manner. Mr. Borden was escorted to his hotel after the meeting by a torchlight procession.

In Yarmouth on Sept. 3rd the first of a batch of Scott Act cases resulted in the defendant being fined \$50 or thirty days in jail with hard labor. He chose the latter. This is the first case tried under the Act since the hard labor amendment passed the commons and the Senate. One of the defendants has left town and a star witness in a prospective case, a woman, has left for Boston.

Halifax wants the Dominion Exhibition of 1905. The provinces down by the sea have become somewhat overshadowed by the importance and enterprise of their sister provinces in the west. Now in turn they claim their time has come to call attention to the magnificent advantages and possibilities of these eastern lands. Halifax is well qualified to assume the responsibilities of such an undertaking, if the success of her annual provincial gatherings is any criterion, and we hope to see the Dominion Exhibition of 1905 in Halifax.

Hon. James MacDonald, chief justice of Nova Scotia since 1881 until his resignation last April, has been presented with an address and handsome gift by the Bar of Nova Scotia. The gift is of solid silver in the form of a casket. The cover is worked in mayonnaise and surmounted by the figure of a griffin.

where an old ruin is shown of the House of Assembly, and held the office of minister of justice in the House of Commons from 1878 until his appointment in 1881. Sir John Macdonald regarded him at that time as the ablest man in the House of Commons.

An Ottawa despatch says that there is a likelihood of Thanksgiving Day being fixed on Monday this year instead of Thursday as in years past. The date will not be determined until the Ministers' return to the capital. The principal reason for making the change is that Monday would give a longer interval, viz. from Saturday night to Tuesday morning. There would be an advantage in this way. Those taking the holiday in the middle of the week are unable to go away far from their work whereas the holiday coming on Monday would allow an interval of sufficient length to get the full benefit of the holiday.

The Provincial Exhibition.

The Great Exposition of 1904 has come and gone, and we may now make a review of its successes, as compared with preceding years. Generally speaking the exhibits were fully up to the standard. The great exception, however, was in the Fruit exhibit, owing, no doubt, to the early date of the show. Vegetables, too, were behind the exhibits of former years, as was also the display of carriages.

On the other hand it was generally conceded that on no former occasion had there been a finer exhibit of live stock, poultry and manufactures.

The main building showed very much artistic skill in the arrangement of the exhibits, and it was a pleasure to note that malt liquors were not prominent in the roll of exhibits, however much they may have been used as a beverage in the subterranean vaults of the grand stand.

And yet it seems at least to the layman, that there is too much space in the main building occupied by vendors of various commodities, especially of our own provincial manufactures.

In Machinery Hall there was much to interest those who like to observe the processes of manufacture. The power looms in operation were both novel and attractive.

The whirring of busy machines gives an air of business progress. Twice the number representing other manufacturers would have been doubly attractive.

Within a stone's throw of the rattling weaving machines, of Machinery Hall is the Woman's Work department, in which could be seen in operation, an old hand loom such as might be found in many country homes 30 years ago and in some places even now.

At Acadia, and Mrs. Leung and residing at New Brunswick, the 17th century and 18th century contrast but perhaps not more strikingly the beautiful designs in lace or embroidery of the present day.

A verse or two from the old sampler may not be uninteresting. Charlotte Newton, 1796, A. D. has this so say:

While roses blossom on thy face
Virtue thy mind and kindly grace
Let every pleasing hour engage
The needle or the shining page.
And as the linnet o'er the lawn
Unit to hail the rising dawn
Be youth the morning of the days
Devoted to thy Maker's praise.
Elizabeth McIntosh, 1793, aged 10
years eulogises herself in these modest lines:

"Mark my Betsy how the roses"
"Emulate thy damask cheek"
"How the bud its sweets discloses"
"Birds the opening bloom bespeak"
While Elizabeth Locker, of Marshfield, 1783, A. D., gives the following recipe for future greatness:

"Let this be your plan"
"Do all that you can."

Farewell Service.

The farewell service in honor of Rev. W. B. Boggs, D.D., and Mrs. Boggs, was held in the Baptist church last Sunday evening and called out a large audience. Rev. L. D. Morse presided and presented regrets from Rev. Dr. Trotter and Rev. Dr. Keirstead, who through other engagements were unable to be present. Dr. Boggs graduated from Acadia in 1865 and has spent about 30 years on the foreign field, where his labors have been highly esteemed. His class-mates now living are Rev. T. A. Blackadar, Rev. Joseph Murray, Rev. D. A. Steele, D. D., Thomas E. Corning, barrister, of Yarmouth; Professor H. C. Creed, of Fredericton, and Professor Silas M. MacVane, of Harvard.

At the opening of the service Pastor Morse gave a very earnest and sympathetic address, in which he bore testimony to the beautiful Christian character, unselfish devotion and untiring zeal of the two missionaries so soon to leave the home land for another period of arduous service.

Dr. Boggs spoke very eloquently and impressively upon the beneficial results of foreign missions, and outlined the future outlook especially in China and India. Indications were ripening of a great upheaval among the nations and a turning to the Christian faith, and he looked forward to his work to assist in the establishment of a new commonwealth, a spiritual empire, a kingdom that shall never end, composed of true believers from all ranks and classes.

On his field were ninety missionaries and he looked forward eagerly to again meeting this noble band of workers. Mrs. Boggs expressed her hopes, her sympathies and her trustfulness by reading a very appropriate selection of Scripture passages.

Rev. D. E. Hatt, of Canard, being called upon, made a very interesting address. He spoke of the far-reaching influence of these devoted lives, of the excellent impression the departing missionaries had made upon the churches in the provinces, and pleaded eloquently for renewed consecration of money and talents to the great work of evangelizing the world.

The music, under the direction of Professor Maxim, contributed materially to the success of the meeting, especially a vocal solo given by Miss Flora McDonald. Dr. and Mrs. Boggs left on Wednesday morning, and are followed by best wishes of Wolfville friends to their far away home.

Vessel Abandoned.
New York, September 13.—The steamer Pathfinder, Captain Parse, from Norfolk to Boston with coal arrived here today from Norfolk with the derelict British schooner Theta in tow. The Pathfinder picked up the Theta at sea last Sunday near the Five Pathon Bank lightship. When she sighted the derelict sails were all set. She evidently had been hastily abandoned after being in collision with an unknown vessel. The fate of the crew is unknown. Her starboard quarter was stove in but otherwise the hull was in good condition. She was leaking badly, but was kept afloat by the cargo of hard pine lumber in her hold. The Theta is a three masted schooner of 450 tons register. She left Brantford, Ga. on September 1 for Dorchester, N. B. with a full cargo of lumber. All the crew were saved except Simon Ingraham, who was lost. (The Theta is one of the fleet owned and managed by Capt. Roderick Pratt, of this town.)

Robinson Hanged.

Kentville, N. S., Sept. 12.—At 1.35 this morning W. S. Robinson was hanged for the murder of his wife. He made no confession. When asked to do so, he said: 'I have no confession to make. I committed no crime. I am, so help me God, an innocent man.'

The prisoner had slightly weakened and there was a quiver in his voice, yet he said, 'I am ready to die, and wish it were all over.'

Dr. Shaw, of Ottawa, who had been summoned to attend the execution, arrived at 12.30, and Radcliffe, the hangman, at 12.35. Rev. Mr. White was with the prisoner at midnight and remained till 1.25 o'clock, when Radcliffe knocked at the cell door and asked Robinson to come with him. He quickly handcuffed the prisoner's hands behind his back. The old man had lost his color, and his white face and snow white hair were in marked contrast to the sombre suit of clothes he wore. There was no defiant air noticeable. The hangman rushed his man through the room adjoining the scaffold. The latter opened out to full view, and while the prisoner passed, a disgraceful scene was in progress. Men were clinched in a fight and others were trying to part them.

The execution was soon over. Radcliffe adjusted the noose and within five seconds after Robinson stepped on the scaffold the drop was sprung and the convulsive body was dangling below. Radcliffe would not permit Robinson to make a statement on the gallows. He told him, at midnight he must say all he had to say before leaving his cell. He bade Rev. Mr. White farewell and gave him a hearty handshake.

We understand that Mr. Ralph M. Jones has been appointed instructor in the English and Latin languages in place of Professor Sawyer, who relinquished his appointment as Professor in the college when he accepted the principalship of Horton Academy. Mr. Jones will accordingly teach these subjects to students of the Freshman year. Mr. Jones has for two years been a student in Rochester Theological Seminary where he maintained a high record in scholarship. The appointment at Acadia, we understand is for the present academic year only, it being the purpose of Mr. Jones to complete his Theological course. Mr. Jones has had excellent training. His course of four years study at Acadia and two at Rochester have, it is believed, prepared him to do excellent work as instructor in the college.—Messenger and Visitor.
