COUNT Witte has retired from the Russian Premiership and is succeeded by Goremykin, who has formed a new ministry. The elections are over and the first Parliament opens to-morrow. The opening ceremonies will be on a magnificent scale. The Emperor will open Parliament in person and all members of the Royal family and all the ladies and gentlemen of the Court, and civic and military officers are expected to be in attendance. The new Parliament is made up of many parties; but the constituocrats have a majority.

In London, on the 2nd inst. Sir Thomas Shanghnessey, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, created some stir by a speech made at the Cana. dian Club, in connection with the Canadian Pacific Empress subsidy. This subsidy is voted from the Imperial Treasury, and it was stated at this meeting by the Secretary for the Colonies, Lord Elgin, that it was to be continued for two years. Great Catholic Losses in San Francisco

Disaster.

How fared Catholic San Francisco?

Commercial San Francisco bas been practically annihilated. I stood in the heart of the six square miles of territory now covered by smoking ruins. Within the ruined ares, along with the great business structures, were thousands of dwellings and numerous churches, schools and charitable institutions.

"Churches in San Francisco were especially hard hit by earthquake and fire," says one despatch. " More than eighty churches, missions and propped and repaired several times convents were razed. Among these San Francisco."

Then follows a list of the destroyed buildings, arranged under the various denominational heads. From this list it is evident that the Catholies suffered more than any other religious body. They have received a staggering blow, recovery from which will entail years of toil and sacrifice. Tae list, which is probably far from complete, follows:
