



On June 14th Stephen the eight year old son of Bernard and Mary Curtis was taken very ill, he having contracted a very heavy cold. A day or two afterwards his brother, "Michael, also became ill. The doctor was summoned to attend the two children and pronaunced Steuhen to be suffering from inflammation of the lungs, and Michael, from croup. Everything possible was done to relieve the littl sufferers, but after only three days illness Michael expired. Stephen lingered for eight days during which time he was constantly watched day and night, but on Monday, June 21st, at 4 a.m., he, too, was called away. Worn out with watching and attending to the wants of her children the poor heart-broken mother is prostrated with grief at their death, and to make it harder for her to hear their father is absent in America. Scarcely had the grave closed over the bodies of the two little children, whose death is chronicled above, when word was received that their cousin, Bernard Curtis, had been drowned while fishing out of Boston, Mass. The deceased had for the last five years formed one of the crew of the fishing schooner "Frances S. Grueby," Capt. Enos Nickerson. The accident happened on June 20th. Bernard was in his dory attending to his trawls, when the captain passed him in the schooner. About five minutes later he had disappeared. How and when Capt. Nickerson is unable to state, for no one saw him fall overboard. Assistance was sent from the vessel, but no trace of Bernard could be found. The characteristics which he possessed were such as had endeared him to all who knew him. Always ready to greet you with a pleasant word and smile, always kind, gentle and courteous in his dealings with others, it is no wonder that his loss is felt by everyone. He was above all a good Catholic, generous always to a great degree, he was especially so towards the church, and when help was needed to swell the church fund he could always be depended upon to give a generous contribution. The deceased was the youngest son of Annie and the late Bernard Curtis. He was 33 years of age and was unmarried. Besides his mother, he has two sisters residing in Newfoundland and two brothers in the U.S.A., one, John J., police officer in Gloucester, and Garrett, of East Boston; another sister, Mrs. James McPhail, resides in-Gloucester. Cabinet Secrets.


Scores of secrets are born behind the portals of No. 10, Downing Street, Whitehall, and they are so well kept there is little chance of one of them leaking out to the public. Ministers are not only pledged to secrecy, but they are forbidden to take notes of the business transacted at a Cabinet

Occasionally it is found desirable to have a "secret" set up in type. The original manuscript of a "secret" is not handed over in its entirety to a compositor. It is cut up into numerous little pieces, which are distributed among a number of compositors, each of whom sets up his little

When all the fragments have been put into type an official holding high rank in the Government personally collects the lines of metal and puts them together in their proper place. He then superintends the actual printing of the "secret." No one but himself is allowed to handle the printed copies as they come from the press. Spoilt copies he destroys, and when a sufficient number of . copies have been taken off he has the type from which they have been printed melted down in his presence.

Some years back a spy endeavoured to secure a position in the Government printing department, imagining that if he had a job there he would be able to secure printed copies of the 'secrets" which originated at Downing Street. / When he discovered how nportant documents were printed he had no further desire for a post.
