

Power From Poison.

that invisible things have weight. The weight of nearly fifteen pounds to every square inch. More surprising still is the fact that for every ton of iron than five tons invisible gas escapes some large blast furnaces make 350 tons of iron per day, this means that something like two thousand tons of invisible gases have also been produc ed in the same time.

Of this enormous amount of gas n less than six hundred tons is carbon nonoxide—the deadly gas which has caused so many "gas tragedies" during the last year or so. Carbon monoxide, in fact, is the most valuable in-

Waste Which Works. Formerly all this gas was allowed o burn to waste at the top of the furnace; but now, like scores of other "waste products," it is used, partly for burning under boilers and so generating steam, and partly for heating up the air before it is forced into the furnace. In the most modern fronworks the gas from the blast furnaces is cleaned and used to drive large gasengines, but whatever use is made of t, the final result is that nearly all of the poisonous carbon monoxide is changed into carbonic acid—the gas that gives the "sting" to the sodawater. The gas-engines drive electric generators which, in turn, supply the power for operating the whole of the machinery in the works, amount-

The recent magnificent attempt to scale the summit of Mount Everest re-opens interest in the various methods by which heights can be ascer-

The instrument which is used by the majority of mountaineers is the aneroid. This instrument has no mercury, but depends on a mechanical contraction of a thin metal plate for its method of registering the air pressure measurement.

Ordinary mercurial barometers were also carried by the Mount Sverest expedition, and the readings obtained from them were used to check the figures given by the aneroid. Another method, which might be described as an unofficial way for a party to discover their altitude above sea-level, is to determine the temperature at which water will boil. Water owing to a curious phenomenon of the atmosphere, boils at about one degree (Fahr) for every 590 ft.

An instrument called a hypsometer or boiling point thermometer, registers the boiling point at any altitude reached, and therefore indirectly registers as well the height above sea

The fact that the boiling point of water changes at varying altitudes place of a house dress and is adapted leads to many very strange situations all house keeping activities. 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



The circumference of the city, says Dr. Schofield, was not much more than half a mile. That disposes of the belief that Joshua's troops could not possibly have sur-

Various arguments have rought forward to account for the disappearance of the wall, such as that it descended miraculously into he earth, but none of them will stan against Dr. Schofield's theory. He believes that, although frighten-

ed at first by the nearness of the hostile army, the inhabitants became bolder when they found that the troops outside did nothing more than walk round the city. In time these extraordinary manoeuvres became almost farcical, and the walls were crowded with large numbers of curious sightseers.

They All Turned to Fly.

Then, on the seventh day, when, according to God's command, the priests blew with their trumpets and the soldiers all shouted, the people on the walls were so panic-stricken that they ushed with one accord from this sudden and unexpected development. Imagine thousands of feet thrusting against that unsubstantial wall at the same time! What more natural than that the wall should fall outwards into the surrounding ditch, filling it up, and thus leaving the way clear for Joshua and his army to pass in and take possession? Again, God uses natural means to perform His wonders, thus transforming a natural accident into a miracle.

Dr. Schofield also found the house from which Rahab the harlot let down the two spies, and he has published photographs in the June Pearson's Magazine of the natural window from which the spies were lowered . The story of the swine which "ran

down a steep place into the sea" has been discredited because no place could be found on the shores of the sea of Galilee where this could have been possible. Once again Dr. Schofield has confounded the sceptics, for he has brought back to England the photograph of a steep cliff on the shore of the lake, at the top of which lies the modern village of Ghersa. This village he identifies with the biblical village of Gedona.



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

"As Through a Safety Valve." It is only when the gigantic prere is relieved by the cracking or fisuring of the closed case called "the crust of the earth" that the inclosed ep-lying matter of immensely high mperature liquefles, or even vapor es, and rushes into the upleading sure. Steam and gas thus "set free rives everything before them, carryng solid masses along with them earing, rending, shaking "the foundations of the hills," and issuing in terrific jets from the earth's service, as ough a safety valve, into the astonished world above. Often, in a few hours they choke their own path by the destruction they produce and the falling in of the walls of their brieflyopened channels. Then there is a lull of hours, days, or even centuries, and after that again, a movement of the crust, a "giving" of the blockage of the deep, vertical pipe, and a renewed and jet of expanding gas and liquely-

The general scheme of this process nd its relations to the structure and properties of the outer crust and inner mass of the globe is still a matter of discussion, theory, and verification; but whatever conclusions geologists may reach on these matters. the main fact of importance is that steam and gases issue from these fissures with enormous velocity, and pressure, and that a "vent" of this kind, once established, continues, as s rule, to serve intermittently for centuries, and, indeed, for vast periods which we can assign no definite

The solid matter ejected becomes piled up around the vent as a mound, its outline taking the graceful catenary of rest and adjustment to which are due the great beauty of volcanic ones. The apex of the cone is blown way at intervals by the violent blasts issuing from the vent, and thus we have formed the "crater," varying in the area enclosed by its margin and in the depth and appearance of the cup the amount of solid matter ejected by the crater, the mound will grow in the course of time to be a mountain, and often secondary craters or temporary openings, connected at some depth with the main passage leading to the central vent and the formation of one or more subsidiary vents, the activity of which may blast away or smother the cup-like edge of the first crater. Such a history has been that of Vesuvius. In geologic ages perhaps some thousands of years ago-Vesuvius was perhaps a perfect cone some 7,000ft. high, rising by a characteristically accelerated upgrowth from a circle of ten miles or more in diameter to its delicate central peak, hollowed out at the summit by a small crater a couple of hundred yards across. Its eruptions at that time were neither excessive nor violent. Then came a period of greatly increased energy—the steam-jet blew with such violence, that it shattered and dispersed the cone, lowering the moun tain to 3,700ft. in height, truncating it and leaving a proportionately widen-ed crater of a mile and a half in dia-
