The average showed that a red light of 75 candle-power could be identified at a distance of 600 feet, while a green light had to be 250 candle-power, a yellow 750, and a blue light 1.000. The observations were made at disances of 600, 900 and 1,250 feet. At 1.250 feet the candle-power required was 1,500, 2,500, 3,000 and 7,500 rc-


