The Springfield Republican says the musical preparations for the great Bosto peace jubilee have been enormous in their requirements. ### GREAT BRITAIN.

LONDON, May 27.— The Alabams claims still form the great theme of conversation and newspaper comment. The Times to day has an article on the communications of Sir Francis Head, which have recently been published here respecting the case of the ship Carotine, and the course of United States tewards Canada during the patriot war. The Times says that Senator Sumner's assertions of English hostility to America are met by the testimony of American officials. Abuses much more frequent have occurred within the frontier of the United States, for the popular teeling of the State of New York was admitted to have more than countenanced the Fenian expelitions to Canada. The American papers expose Mr, Sumner's inconsistency by historical tests and point out his perversion of facts.

The Mesers, Laird, of Birkenhead, who built the Alabama, have recently published a letter giving legal opinions, and extracts from documents and speeches, to prove that the building of the Alabama was not illegal. The letter has been extensively copied, and is thus commented on by the papers to-day:

The Standard (Conservative) says that the Americans were equally guilty of a breach of international obligations in the case of the Carotine, and the case of the Ferian drillings and organizations. The final reckoning will give a heavy balance to the debit of the United States.

LONDON, May 27th.—In the House of Commons this evening, Mr. Ottway, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in reply to a question stated that the papers in the case of the Alabama would shortly be laid on the table.

PARIS, May 27th. — Hon. Mr. Washburne, United States Minister, was formally received by the Emperor to-day, and made a brief address, in which he assured the Emperor of the friendahip entertaized by the people and Government of the United States towards himself and the French nation. Napoleon, in his reply, expressed the utmost satisfaction at Mr. Washburne's cordial assurances, and hoped that the present friendly relations between the two countries would long be maintained. Mr. Washburne called on Prince Napoleon to-day and met with a hearty welcome.

North-West Resolutions.—The North-west resolutions were submitted to Parliament yesterday. After reciting all the facts connected with the matter, the resolutions provide that it is expedient to address her Majesty that she will be graciously pleased, by and with the advice of her most hou. Privy Council, under the 146th clause of the B. N. A.
