Affairs in Spain.

King Amadeus Determined to Abdicate. The Cabinet to Tender Their Resignations.

Gaffney's Pretended Insanity a Ruse. He Will be Hanged on Friday.

A Sea of Fire. Horrors of Drowning Passengers.

Mardi, Feb. 10 - Midnight. - At eight this evening King Amadeus announced to Senor Zorilla that he was determined to adhere to his resolution to abdicate.

Since Saturday last, when his Majesty declared his intention of quitting the throne, the Ministers have strenuously endeavored to dissuade him from doing so, but their efforts have proved futile.

The announcement that the abdication is certain creates a profound sensation, but tranquility prevails.

A royal message announcing the determination of the King will soon be submitted to the Cortes. After its presentation the Cabinet will tender their resignations.

London, Feb. 12. - No further news has been received from Madrid. The announcement of the abdication produced profound sensation in Berlin.

The German papers hint that it was caused by French intrigues. The ten millions dollars Erlangen convertible bonds were subscribed yesterday.

The lists will remain open two days longer. The indication is that there is great confidence in the Watson administration.

Buffalo, Feb. 12. - The jury of inquisition appointed to decide as to the insanity of Gaffney, the murderer, have agreed that he is perfectly sane. He will accordingly be executed here on Friday next.

Titusville, Pa., Feb. 12. - Further developments of the disaster on the Alleghany Railway show further loss of life. Several tons of oil were precipitated down an embankment, the oil suddenly igniting and spreading rapidly in every direction...

Carrying flames some distance out on the water of the river, cutting off every way of escape for drowning passengers, except through a lake of fire. In some instances they plunged underneath the burning waves, and swam to points of safety.

and on the east to Wm. Campbell & Son's office, Tilt & Miller's shoe store, Poyntz's drug store, Lloyd's general store, Ramsay's marble shop. The losses as well as can be gathered are as follows: Lindsay, about \$8,000, insured for \$7,000; Atcheson, about \$3,000, insured for \$2,000; Kerns, about \$5,000, insurance not known; Pattullo, nearly everything saved; Wm. Campbell & Son, nearly all saved; Tilt & Miller's loss about \$7,000, insured for \$4,000; Lloyd's loss about \$4,000, insurance unknown; Ramsay's loss about \$300, insurance unknown. The remainder of the village was saved by the arduous exertion of the citizens who laboured under the disadvantage of having no fire engine.

New Way of Raising the Wind. Reading, Feb. 8th, 1873. To the Editor of the Mercury.

Sir, - The proprietor of the Guelph Herald claims that its circulation has increased considerably within the last few months, and if so, I believe I can tell you how the result has been reached. It is reasonable to suppose that the same means have been used in other localities that were used in this, and I proceed to show you the way it circulated to such an extent as it did here.

When Dr. Orton came out as candidate for Centre Wellington, in opposition to Mr. Ross, I was called on as chief supporter for the Doctor, and when in this place, as far as I can make out, every man's name he could find out was marked down as a subscriber to the weekly Herald. At the same time his political friends were assuring the people (although it turned out to be a mistake) that the Herald was a paper to be presented to all, for the space of six months, gratis. I never spoke to any of them, nor they to me, about it, and I don't think Mr. Fahy saw me at all, yet the paper was sent to me, and of course, without my consent. When the six months were up, I stopped the paper, as I did not want to pay for it, not thinking it worth any more than the postage to me. No sooner had I done this than I received a "dinner" for one dollar for six months subscription for the weekly Herald. Was not that a fine trick to extend the circulation of the Herald?

I don't know whether they can collect that dollar or not, but suppose the Herald would not recede to such schemes unless he first satisfied himself that it would succeed. But do you think it will do to obtain subscribers that way? If it won't, and the people find it out, I guess the Herald will never be able to do it. If it will do, then the Mercury may do the same, and so on every other paper, upon the same principle, and the result will be when you have all the disposition to act that way, we shall have to take and pay for all the papers whether we want them or not. I hope it will never be from Mr. Fahy's hands to take that Herald again, filled as it has been with bombast and nonsense.

In conclusion I would advise Mr. Fahy not to force his paper any more upon people, under the pretense of a present, when he intends all the while to pay for it. Although he has not acted honorably in this matter, I certainly know that the deception is despicable mean, and will lower him (if that is possible) in the estimation of all right thinking men.

Toronto Correspondence.

Our spell of severe weather has been followed by a week of really fine, mild, enjoyable weather, with its almost invariable concomitant, the "epizootic." People really began to anticipate an early spring, but we suspect, from the sharp turn assumed by Jack Frost this evening, their anticipations are decidedly premature.

Still it is marvellous how greatly the snow has disappeared during the last few days, and wheels are about as numerous on the streets as runners.

Toronto is still well supplied with entertainments suitable to every taste. Professor Martin has been nightly, during the past week, treating crowded houses to specimens of his skill in jugglery, &c.; whilst Mrs. Martin has been equally electrical in her wonderful exhibitions of clairvoyance. The Professor has been liberal in the way of presents to his audience, and on one occasion, after the performance, a couple of men might be seen triumphantly bearing on their shoulders a bureau as the product of their presence at an investment of 25c in the Wizard's entertainment; another man was lucky enough to obtain \$10, whilst sundry jokes were cracked at the expense of those who were fortunate enough to draw from the "lucky bag" such useful articles as toy cradles, &c.

I heard a rumor in town, but will not vouch for its accuracy, that the Rev. Mr. Darling had joined the Roman Catholic persuasion; at least my informant was told so by a member of that body. Such a step on the part of the Rev. gentleman would not surprise a number of people who have long regarded the reverend gentleman as entertaining notions more properly pertaining to the Romish than to the Anglican Church.

I am sure there will be a very general feeling of regret in your quarter to learn that the Rev. Dr. Panshona's only daughter, and who is married to Professor Rainer of Cobourg College, is about to be removed to the Southern States in order, if possible, to check the rapid progress of a consumptive attack, but grave doubts are entertained as to the desired beneficial results, first from the change of air, and secondly because her mother is said to have succumbed to the same insidious disease. It is said the Dr. himself contemplates visiting England early in the spring, but strong hopes are entertained that his preferences for Canada will become so decided an opinion that, during a short absence, he will return to settle in Canada. It is perfectly astounding, his friends say, the amount of enthusiasm of a practical nature he has evoked amongst the members and adherents of his own denomination, and it is not to be wondered at, therefore, that the amount of his splendid pulpit and platform gifts, the absence of such executive talent as his should be deplored.

Parliament has not been particularly busy during the past week; the Municipal Loan Fund and Surplus questions produced such a rush of deputations throughout the week that what was intended to be the great governmental scheme of the week has been postponed. Wellington was largely and influentially represented during the deputation "rush," and I have no doubt made due impress on the minds of the government. The night of the Wellingtonians were in a sense not a favorable one for parliamentary interest, most of the sitting being occupied by the discussion of legal subjects which are usually, as was the case then, superlatively uninteresting. "Charlie" Ryker has been particularly conspicuous during the past week in parliamentary annals, making prodigious headway, that wonderful scrap book of his. Possessing more courage than prudence, he seems to be very fond of going for "Big Thunder," who has promised to look up "Charlie's" antecedents, with a view to a well-deserved drubbing. I am told not a tithe of the Billingsgate that was uttered on the occasion referred to was reported. When Mr. Bethune's bill, having reference to habitual drunkards, was being debated, "old Calvin," as he styles himself, was on hand to deliver himself in its favor, declaring at the same time he had been a teetotaler for 30 years, and during that time not one drop of drink had gone down his neck. (Laughter.) He said he stood there a monument 75 years old, and had seen hundreds and hundreds of men in the same position of life he was in going down to the grave as drunkards, but more than the half of these were never understood to be drunkards. He said there were various definitions of drunkards; some said that a man was not drunk until he had laid down on the ground and held on by the grass. He had cured scores of men of drunkenness because if he saw a bottle in a man's pocket he took it out and broke it. (Laughter.) The old gentleman's second sound on the drunkard's limits whatever he may be on timber ones.

By the return of Registrars Fees just laid on the table, I find that the South Riding of Wellington fees for 1872 are \$1,683; North Riding do., \$3,152; Waterloo, \$3,504; Westwood, \$7,440; Bruce, \$5,579; Grey (N.E.), \$3,487; Grey (S.E.), \$2,504; Huron (N.E.), \$4,100; Halton, \$2,367; Peel, \$2,596; Perth (N.E.), \$3,297; Perth (S.E.), \$2,297. It must be born in mind that by a recent Act of Mr. Blake, a considerable percentage, varying according to amount, is returned to Government on all amounts above \$3,000; so that Toronto with \$8,000 of fees has, I understand, to return 50 per cent. thus netting the Registrar only \$4,000. It may be interesting to remark that the County of Wentworth have petitioned for separation from the city of Hamilton for judicial and registration purposes. There is a large total increase of fees, some \$15,000, I think, over last year, due in some cases to railway enterprise, and oil and salt speculations, but in the main to a general healthy state of prosperity resulting in the subdivision of several estates into town and village lots.

The papers connected with the Agricultural Farm have also been tabled. It will be seen that the Commissioners prefer Mr. Stone's to Mr. Wm. Hood's farm; the former has 550 acres valued at \$70,000, and the latter 400 acres valued at \$24,000. There is also an offer from Mr. S. McCuen included in the return, and I understand that more land can be got in the immediate vicinity of the Hood farm, if wanted. I did not observe that the Commissioners absolutely recommended any locality wherein to fix the site of the College. There is also appended a statement of the amount of expense connected with the Commissioners, and their little trips to the various localities, also the expenses of Professor Miles of Michigan, in connection with his examination of the Mimico soil, &c., which

It is—Cream of tartar, 3 ounce; Rhabarbar, 12 grains; Cold water, 1 pint. The dose is from a quarter to half a pint. In severe cases a half pint dose should be administered. In cases characterized by delirium, great benefit has been obtained by applying a bottle of hot water to the feet. Plenty of fresh air is important, and an out-door airing commended. When applied in the earliest stage, at the eruption the eruption is arrested, and suppuration prevented, without any serious result. The mixture should be well stirred or shaken immediately before administering it.
