



Some was sowed on light soil, and only harrowed in, and when the high winds came in March it loosened the roots, and a failure was the result Where the wheat was sown, and packed after it was sown, it invariably turned out a good crop. There do not appear to be any complaints about the fall wheat this spring. It is coming up fine, and the fields are looking green already, and if nothing unforseen happens we will have a big crop to harvest The oldest settlers here say that this spring is the earliest and finest they have ever seen in this country. Plow ing and seeding is general in this district, and the steam ploughs are being worked night and day. They keen two gangs-one for the night and one for the day. They have a large head light on the front of the ploughs, which shows them how to do their work. There is thirty per cent more breaking done this year than last year. The breaking up of large ranches into smaller areas, and devoted to mixed farming, was predicted to be the end of the cattle trade in this province. This prediction has not materialized, but the cause specified is shown to have quite the contrary effect. 1906 was called the "fat" year for the shipment of horses, cattle, sheep and hogs, but the year just ended has eclipsed them all, and if I had space and time I would only be too pleased to give figures to show that what I say are

I attribute this great change to hundreds of small farmers, who have each contributed a few matured animals, aggregating enough, apparently sufficient to more than balance the effect of the disappearance of the large

The Cattle Industry Mixed farming and stock feeding is nereasing so rapidly that in a year or two we hope to see the cattle industry more firmly established than it possibly could be under the old ranching system. The largest increase in live stock is where the rancher has been displaced for the longest period by the mixed farmer, and the districts becoming more thickly settled. This portion of Alberta has the largest number of small farms and ranches. It is therefore conclusive evidence that the stock industry is not being destroyed by set-

Butter and cheese factories have increased at the rate of 35 per cent. In regard to the prospects of Calgary, one of the best indications of its future is the bank clearings, which increased 48 1-3 per cent. during the week ending March 31, over the coronding week of last year, and the uilding record will further demonstrate the prosperity of the city. The value of the permits issued in March was \$415,680, and the number of permits was 148, as compared with \$94,-00, and 54 permits for the correspondmonth last year. The custo

BOSTON CITY WANTS A BIG CELEBRATION

Rejoicing at The Good Commercial Relations Between Canada and United

Boston, Mass., April 4.—An altogethgreement between United States and Canada has been conceived and will be put into execution by Mayor John Fitzgerald of Boston. The plan is to have the city of Boston, the Boston Chamber of Commerce, and Governor Draper of Massachusetts unite in sending invitations to the governor general of Canada, mayors of Canadian cities and leading business men across the border to come to Boston as guests of honor. In the letter to Governor Draper outlining the plan, Mayor Fitzgerald

and other Canadians of note has emphasized anew the closer relations that exist between Boston and New England generally, and our neighbors on the north. Now that all danger of economic controversy has been averted through the wise exercise of his disretionary power by President Taft, there is likely to be an increased exchange of products and more extensive commercial intercourse between the wo sections. I need not remind you of the desire long entertained by our business organization of making Boston ultimately the chief seaport not only of New England, but of the great and growing territory lying to the northwest. We are also familiar with the fact that both English-speaking and French-speaking Canadians have immigrated here in large numbers and have contributed largely to the development of our industries and to our

general prosperity."

The mayor's letter continues expressing hope that Governor Draper will join with him in inviting distinguished Canadians to come here, and offering them some graceful and special courtesy. It was Mr. Fitzgerald's first idea to simply ask Mayor Guerin of Montreal and a number of prominent Montrealers to come here but he now de-sires that invitations go to Earl Grey and others. 
