





Have you ever tried to imagine the impressions of the seranger on his way to ictoria as, while pacing the hurricane deck of the Princess Victoria, glass in hand, his eye is attracted by the foreshore of Oak Bay. It is one of the calm, balmy evenings peculiar to this coast. Previously he has been admiring the numerous islets of the Gulf, among which the steamer has been patiently winding for the past few hours. He wonders how much longer the journey is going to last but, at the same time, expresses the silent hope that it will continue, at least. until twilight shuts out the beauty which is to be found on all sides. Just now a rocky point is cleared, and he sees a wide stretch of sea, unruffied but rolling with a swell, which he knows must have originated in the vast Pacific. Thus he recognizes the Straits of Juan de Fuca while, far off in the distance he sees the snow-clad Olympics, forming a background to a scene unrivalled in its grandeur. Then, as his vision circles the horizon, ha observes the low lying shores of Van couver Island. Now, for the first time. he sees Oak Bay.




