FIFTEENTH YEAR

NO MORE CARS BAN
 But the Mayor Was Accused to Breaking the Law.

HIS WORSHIP AND HIS HIRED COUPE
 A Police Court Case Will Be the Outcome.

Mayor Kennedy rode in a carriage driven by a man who was furnishing his everyday calling on the Lord's Day. Citizens Kelly also threaten an action against the Mayor for breaking the law. The Police had made extraordinary preparations to stop the cars running, but their services were not called into requisition.

Mayor Kennedy was the first citizen to break the Lord's Day Observance Act yesterday. He telephoned for a coupe and drove down to Police Headquarters to see that the police did not detain him.

An information has been laid against his driver, and Mayor Kennedy will be put in the box to prove the charges. When the box Mayor Kennedy will be asked if he did not ride on the street cars on Sunday in Chicago last year!

So much for the glorious reign of hypocrisy and tyranny that now sits over this pious town.

Next, halt the police force was detailed to arrest the offending street cars should they emerge from their lair within the Woodbine gate. All sorts of elaborate preparations were taken. And they will have to be taken constantly for within three weeks horse cars will be on the streets on Sunday.

The Offending Busses.
 And the offending busses of Toronto, now that they are being generally abused by tyrannical rule, were not surprised to see that long-legged tyrant Inspector Archibald jump out of a buggy, order a policeman to seize Kennedy's coupe, and head and thrust them with what he would think they didn't give up their names. Had this Overzealous Hamburg been on duty early in the morning he could have done the same thing. Mayor Kennedy's hired coupe. For the Mayor, too, was a law-breaker.

Citizen Kelly's Sunday cars did not run. The busses did their best to accommodate the public, but thanks to the gentle offices of the police the cars were tied up.

Mr. Kelly fully intended to run his hotel service, but the police intended otherwise. In full force they turned out and carried their point.

Since Sunday the four private cars have stood on a switch at the Woodbine gate. Early in the morning a detachment of truck officers proceeded to take possession of the unnumbered cars and took possession of them in a body. Sergeant and Acting Inspector Hain were general in command, and also Officers Irvine, Allan and Guthrie were the privates of the command. Along King-street skrimishing was kept a sharp lookout for the enemy. Although on Sunday the men on duty at 8:45, yesterday, were all well, a reserve force of 24 men for the prohibited horse cars.

The Mayor's Hire Street Coupe.
 Mayor Kennedy's hired coupe was a hired coupe at 8 o'clock and proceeded to Police Headquarters. Inspector "Jim" Stephen had been on the alert ever since the early hour of 6, but could derive no horizon no sign of a hired coupe. At 10 o'clock the cars were scheduled to leave. But when Citizen Kelly went to inspect them he found them garaged by Inspector Hain's force. The cars did not start.

Citizen Kelly Surveys the Situation.
 At noon Daniel Kelly went down to inspect the situation. He found the officers still on the watch, sitting in the cars, their belts loosened and their helmets resting on the seats. Mr. Kelly opened the conversation by telling the inspector that that was not a hard master to see that the police were in possession of the cars. Inspector Hain replied that if Mr. Kelly wanted the cars badly he could have them. This magnanimous offer was declined, and Mr. Kelly left the officers resting in the cars.

At 1 p.m. Constables Kennedy and Travis inspected the army of occupation and the guard over the relics of the horse-car line. Preparations had been made by the police for active warfare. All the men along the routes the cars were supposed to traverse were on duty. Watching and waiting for the trouble and horse cars that never came they said to themselves many things in disparagement of the extra duty.

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Police were charged with trespass. And now comes Citizen Kelly, who says that he will give the policemen a chance to take the matter before the courts. Last night he boarded the cars charged with trespass, and is confident that he will be sustained.

There was a little afternoon excitement in Queen-street near Spadina, when Inspector Archibald boarded a bus of the Kelly line. Ordering the driver to stop, he demanded that the driver furnish the police with his name. Saying that if they did not comply he would call the police, the driver refused to furnish his name. A crowd of 150 gathered, and finally Archibald threatened to pull the driver out of the bus. Kelly defied him, but mortal combat was averted by Mr. Lavery, who told the inspector who he was.

THERE WAS NO SUNDAY TRIP.
 The City of Windsor Was Unavoidably Detained at St. Catharines.

The anti-Sunday car advocates are not the only people who are charmed with the bylaw that Mr. Meredith drew up in 20 minutes last Tuesday, and that the Council, at Mayor Kennedy's instigation, legalised in less than five. The Toronto Railway Company prides the bylaw very highly. At a special meeting of the directors, President McKenna in the chair, the bylaw was read and accepted on behalf of the company. The document has been incorporated in the minutes of the company, and certain orders have already been issued by the president in conformity with the terms of the bylaw. They notified the city hall of their acceptance of the bylaw. Why the Railway Company is charmed with the bylaw because it specifically forbids the exclusive right to the tracks and to the franchise for running cars on Sundays as well as week days. During the fight last summer this exclusive right was the subject of dispute. Even if the vote had been in favor of a Sunday service the company would have had a lawsuit on their hands, because the Mayor and the City Solicitor contended the company had acquired no franchise for Sunday. At a meeting of the City Council, Mayor Fleming carried a resolution by reading the opinion of the City Solicitor, in which it was shown that the railway company had bought the franchise for six days only. The inference was made of this contention, why if the vote had been in favor of a Sunday service an additional suit if it got the right to operate a Sunday service. Here is an extract from the solicitor's letter to the Mayor:

Your letter of to-day's date received, enclosing the following questions and asking me to advise you as to the lawfulness of the agreement of Sept. 1, 1901, between the city and the Toronto Street Railway Company, in which the city granted the franchise for Sunday service. HIS BODY PIERCED BY A BALL.
 Lieut. Brown of the 43rd Battalion Rescued a Soldier from the hands of a Mad Dog.

Yesterday morning Lieut. William Brown of the 43rd Battalion was shot in the chest by a mad dog. The dog was a Bull Terrier, which had taken to the streets of the village of Listowel, and was especially limited by section 1 of the Act of Incorporation to all dogs kept in the city. The dog was shot by Lieut. Brown, who was in a sitting posture when he was hit in the chest. The ball entered the left side, passing upward through the heart, and coming out near the left shoulder. The Lieut. was found in such a position as to be impossible to be set off by his own explosion as the dog was shot by the Lieut. The fatality is regarded as purely accidental.

PORT COLBORNE, Ont., July 15.—The body of Albert Walker, a 37-year-old man who was drowned at Port Dover pier early this morning from the steamer City of Queen's, was recovered from the water this evening and was taken to his home in Humberstone.

A Carpenter's Fatal Fall.

London, July 15.—On Thursday next Mr. John Morley, Chief Secretary for Ireland, will move the second reading of the Evicted Tenants Bill in the House of Commons.
