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## ECLIPSES OF 1844.

There will be five Eclipses this year, three of the Sun, and two of the Moon, in the manner following :-

1. A total Eclipse of the Moon on the 31st of May, when she will rise about sunset, partly Eclipsed; end of the Eclipse, 7 h .50 m .
2. A partial Eclipse of the Nun on the 15th June, invisible in New Brunswick, It will be visible in the South Pacific Occan.
3. A partial Eelipse of the Sun on the 10th of November, visible only in a small part of the groat Southern Ocean.
4. A total Eclipse of the Moon on the 24th of November-when she will rise partly eclipsed. Beginning 5h. 16m.; middle, 7h. om. ; end, 9h. 2m.
5. A partial Eclipse of the Sun on the 9 th of December, beginning at 3 h .40 m .; greatest obscuration. 4 h . 26 m .; end, 5 h .-Digits Eclipsed, 2.51 on Sun's Northera limb.

## LIGHT HOUSES.

Commissioners for Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy.-John Ward. Senior, Robert W. Crookshank, John Ward, Junior, J. Wilsor, J. Allanshaw, 'I'. Wyer, Lauchlan Donaldson, W. F. W. Owen, and I. Woodivard, Esquires.
L. Donaldson, Esq., Surveyor of those Light Houses in the Bay of Fundy belonging to New Brunswick; and also of those belonging ts Nova Scotia, which are partly supported by Now Brunswick.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.-The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy, is on the Sonth Point of the Scal Island. 'This is a plain white Light, elevated about 80 feet above high water mark, and may be seen in approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerons rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called Blonde Rock, lies about 2 miles S. S. W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers- the ground is rocky throughont, and large vessels, therefore, onght not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.-In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof. A plain white light.

Dighy Gut Light.-The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia is placed side of the Digby Gnt-from Brier Island N. Eastward. The coast is very bold and not indented; the Light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin. The Lamps and Lanterns were renewed in the Spring of 1835, and reflectors furnished, so that this Light is in high order.-A white Light.

Gannet Rock Light.-This Light bears from the Light on Brier Island, N. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. 21 miles. It is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles.

" Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, (dry at two thirds ebb), N. W. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.
" Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, (always out of water), S. W. by W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.
" Machias Seal Island Lights, distant about 13 miles, W, by N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N.

Note.-Between the Northernmost and Sonthernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extend Westward from the Light House abont four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about eight miles, lies a dangerous breaker called the Roaring Buall. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the $\mathbb{A}$.

Vessels standing into the Northward, between these lights and the Gannet Rock, shonld tack or hanl off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then he more than three fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if !nore than five miles to the East of the lights.

Hend Harhour Light.-Next in order after passing Grand Manan. and the plain white Light, (American) on West (Rnoddy Point, is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the Norti, liast extremity of Campo Bello, aud is a gnide to vessels entering the main Chamel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels at all times tọ enter Head Harbour-it is a fixed uchite light.

Point Le Preau Lights. - Upon this projecting head land two lights are placed, one above the other, and distant 28 feet.- Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be use-fil-both are fixed and volite. In consequence of orders from the Home Government, this Light was, in 1840, painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally, in order that it may be seen more distinctly at a distance.

Partridge Island Light.-This light, at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed $u$ hite light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes.

Beacon Light.-Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or bar, which extends abont half a mile 太. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this Tower a light is established, which is eminemtly usefnl to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on hoard, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The House is white and black, in stripes vertically.
Cape Forchu Light.-The Light Honse on Cape Forchu, on the W. side of the entrance to Yarmouth, (Nova-Scotia,) in lat. $43,39, \mathbf{N}$.

Jong. 668 , West, was put in operation on the 15 th January, 1840, and exhibits a plain revolving light-visible one minute and a quarter, und invisiblo half' a minute. 'Tho building is painted white, and is olevated 133 feet ubove the level of the sca.

Quaco.-A revolving white light is placed on a small rock of ' Quaco Ifead, showing twice full und twice dark in a minnte. 'Ihis light can ber seen from any quater where a vessel cam approach. The Light House is puinted white and red in horizontul stripes.

C'ape Enruge.-A new Light Honse, nearly opposite to Apple River llarbour. A plain white light. The Honse is painted white, and about 1 E0 teet above tide mark.

The half of the expense of the Cape Suble and Brier Island Lighte is paid by New Brunswich, as they are so highly useful to vesselstrading with this Province.

West Quadly Light.-This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the Saint Croix by Lubec and EAstport; a new light house has lately been erceted here, and the light much improved.

Liveryool-Coffin's Island, month of Liverpool Harbonr-one revolving light.
Canso-Islaud, Gut of Canso, two Lights, one above the other.
Hulifinx-Meagher's Beach, Halifax-one Light.
Pictou-Entrance to Pictou Harbour-one fixed Light, for eight months in the year.
Cross Islund-Cross Island, near Lunenburgh. Low Point-Entrance to Sydney Harbour-one fixed Light.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard arm, aecording to the direction in which the Vessels are at first observed, and as soon as their rig can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast head, in the following order:

A Union Jack, with a white Pendant over, for a small armed vessel.

A blue Pendant for a Merchant Ship.
A red ditto, for a Merchant Brig.
A white and blue ditto,'for a Forcign Vessel.
A white ditto, (without a ball,) for a Topsail Schooner or Slopp.
A red Flag pierced white, for a steamboat from Saint Andrews and Eastport.
A Ball at the mast head, Vessel is on Shore or in distress, $[J$ Should immediate aid be necessary, guns to be fired.

In foggy weather a gun will be fired from Partridge island, in return for each heard at sea. Should a vessel require a Pilot her descriptive Poudant will be displayed at a yard arm in the place of a Ball.

TIME FOR GOING THROUGH THE FALLS (near St. John).
The Falls are level (or still water), at about 34 hours on the flood, and aboat $2 \frac{1}{2}$ on the ebi, which makes them passable four times in twenty four hours, about 10 or, 15 minutes each time.-No other rule can be given, as mueh depends on the floods in the River Nit. John, and the time ot high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in priportion to the height of them.

## RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Iavo or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of Saint John-passed July, 183\%.
Fivo Shillings per font, for loringing any Ship or Vesvel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or herth, or securing har alongaide of one of the Wharves; and. Five Shillings per fuot for removing and taking any Ship or Vessel ollt of the IInrbour.
In eases where Pilots shall be delained on bonrd of Vessels, nnder and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such Vesmols, the anm of 'l'eu Shillinge per day. for evory day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforessid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British or Foreign Steam Boats, or British Vessels drawing under six feet of water, ure not compelled to take pilots; when onployed, they are to be paid necording to the rate above mentioned.

For removing Vesse!s from any innoring ground to any Wharf, or from one Wharf to anotherWharf, and seeing them properly mnored, or necured, the following rates: For Vessels not excoeding One Hundred Tons, Seven Shillings and Sixpence; for Vessels over One Hundred and not exceeding Two Hundred Tons, Ten Shillings: for Vessels over 'T'wo IIundred and not exceeding 'Ihree Hundred Tons, Filieen Shillings; and for all Vessels over Three Hundred Tons, the sum of Twenty Shillings.

First Distance.-I'rom Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head. bearing North Wnst, Five Shillings per foot.

Sccond Distance.-From Musquash Head to Point LePreaux, bearing North West, Six Shillings and Threepence per foot.

Third Distaxce -From Point LePreaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North Weat-or North Chanuel, bearing South East, Seven Shillings and Sixpence per foot.

Fourth Distance.-From the North IIead of Grand Manan-or North Chamnel as aforesaid-to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, Eight Shillings and Ninepence per foot.

Fifth Distance.-Any where antside the aforesaid distance, Ten Shillings per foot.

## RECIPES FOR PLAIN COOKING.

Apple Bread.- A very light pleasant bread is made in France, of a mixture of apples (when pared, cored and buked, or stewed with a very litile water,) and flour, in the proportion of one part of apples to two of flour, employing the usual quantity of purified yeast, which must be bent up in the flour with the warm puip of the apples. The sponge may then be considered set. Let it rise eight or ten hours, then make it up, and bake it in long loaves like rolls. Little or no water is necessary.

Potatoe Bread -'To fourteen pounds of good sound flowr, either coarse or fine, take five poinds of potatoes, pared and washed very clean ; boil them in a proper quantity of water till quite soft; mash them, and rub them throngh a wire sieve into the middle of the flour, addiug water sufficient to make it of a proper hent, and some salt; when well mixed, add a due proportion of yeast; let it tise an hour or more in the sponge ; and then knead it well. Let it stand to rise an homr or longer, according to the quantity, and bake it in the usnal manner.

Clap Brend.-Mix well some oatmeal and water, of aboint the same consistence as common dough; then roll it into cakes as thin as possible ; bake them on a stone or iron plate of a moderate heat over the fire; when baked on both sides. set them on one edge before the fire till perfectly dry. This bread will continue good many weeks, if kept in a dry place.

Bread Pudiling.-Take a loaf of white bread, cut a hole in the bottom, add as much new milk as it will soak up; tie it in a cloth, and hoil it an hour.
Ancther.-Take three pints of milk, one poand of baker's bread, fomr large spoonfuls of sugar, and three of molasses; put in a layer of bread cut thin, then a few raisins, then bread, \&cc.; pour on the milk and sweetening. If baked one hour and a lalf, it is sufficient. If boiled, two or three hours. Boil it in a till pudding boiler.

Newly invented Pulding.-Take some good sweet apples; wash and corts, but do not pare them ; chop them as fine as cranberries, put them in a kette, and put in just onough of good milk to cover them, and if you choose add a little salt; some even add a little cinnamon or ginger. Next, proceed to scald them, but without burning them, und while sealding them, stir in fine Indian meal enough to form the milk into a thin batter; then put the messinto a deep pan, set it into an oven or stove, woll heated, and bake it about six hours.
Potatoc Pulding.--Two pounds of potatoes boviled and mashed, one pound of wheat meal and a little salt: mix well together into a stiff paste; tie it in a wet cloth, dasted with flour. Boil it two hours.

Arrone-root Jelly.--Stir a table spoonful of arrow-root powder into half a cup of water, pour it into a pint of boiling water, and let it eook six or eight minutes. Sweeten it to your taste.

Rice Jelly.--Boil a quarter of a pound of rice flour with half a pound of loaf sugar, in a quart of water, tiil the whole beconaes a
