LIGHT HOUSES.

Cape Sable Seal Island Light.—The first Light in approaching the Bay of Fundy is on the South Point of the Seal Island. This is a plain White Light, elevated about eighty feet above high water mark, and may be seen on approaching the Island from any point of the compass. A very dangerous rock, under water, but upon which the sea always breaks, called *Blonde Rock*, lies about $3\frac{1}{2}$ miles S. by W. by compass, from the Light House. Between this rock and the Island, there are some dangers—the ground is rocky throughout, and large vessels, therefore, ought not to attempt passing between them.

Brier Island Light.—In advancing up the Bay, the next Light is situated on Brier Island, about half a mile N. E. from the N. W. point thereof—a plain white light.

Digby Gut Light.—The next light on the coast of Nova Scotia, is placed on the West side of Digby Gut—from Brier Island North Eastward. The coast is very bold, and not indented; the light is therefore chiefly intended as a guide into Digby Basin—a white light.

Gannet Rock Light.—This light is intended to warn vessels of their approach to a very dangerous range of shoals and ledges, which extend from the Old Proprietor to the Seal Islands, off Machias, a distance of about twenty miles. It is a light of the Fourth order, Holocephal system—fixed white light 45 seconds, eclipse $5\frac{1}{2}$, flash $5\frac{1}{2}$, eclipse $5\frac{1}{2}$. The Light House is painted in stripes, vertical black and white.

Bearings and Distance by Compass from the Gannet Rock Light House.
This Light bears from the Light House on Brier Island, N. N. W. \pm W., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Old Proprietor, E. \pm S., distance 7 miles.
From the Gannet Rock to the Black Rock, off White Head Island, N. E. \pm E., 7 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the South West Head of Grand Manan, N. N. W., $6\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

From the Gannet Rock to the Northernmost of the Murr Ledges, N. W. \pm N., $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To the Southernmost of ditto, called Saint Mary's Ledge, W. S. W., 2 miles.

From the Gannet Rock to Machias Seal Island, W., and by N. \pm N., $12\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

Note.—Between the Northernmost and Southernmost of the Murr Ledges, there is a range of dangerous rocks and shoals, many of them always above water, and which extends Westward from the Light House about four miles; from this range, farther Westerly, about six miles from the Gannet Light lies a dangerous breaker, called the Bull. This may be avoided by keeping three remarkable headlands near the S. W. end of Grand Manan, open.

From Brier Island Light to the Old Proprietor, N. and by W. \pm W., $18\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

The Blonde Rock from the Southernmost point of the Cape Sable Seal Islands S. and by W., $8\frac{1}{2}$ miles distant.

Machias Seal Island Lights.—There are two fixed white lights upon the Machias Seal Islands, elevated about forty-five feet above high water, and bear from each other E. S. E. and W. N. W., distant about 200 feet, by which circumstance of two Light Houses at the same station, they will be immediately distinguished from all other lights upon the coast (British or American.) Both the buildings are painted white. The following are the bearings from them, viz:

To the Southernmost Murr Ledge (St. Mary's) E. S. E., easterly,
Gannet Rock Light, E. by S. & S. 13 miles,
Southern Head of Grand Manan, E. by N. & N.
Northern Head of Grand Manan, N. E. & E.
N. E. Rock, distant 2 miles, N. E. by N.
Little River Head, N. by W.
“ Libby Island Light House (American), N. W. by W.

Vessels standing to the Northward, between these Lights and the Gannet Rock, should tack or haul off the moment they bring these Lights in one, as they will not then be more than three-fourths of a mile from the Murr Ledges, if more than five miles to the East of the Lights.

[It is recommended that the Ships' Compasses should be well compared and adjusted, particularly in new ships, before they leave Partridge Island, as serious errors have frequently occurred from want of attention on this point; and as the variation in the Bay of Fundy is seventeen degrees Westerly, (or 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ points), it will be found by the latest published Admiralty Charts, that the course from Partridge Island down the Bay, South Channel, between the Old Proprietor and N. W. ledge, is S. W. 45°. but the course to be steered must depend on the direction of the wind on leaving Partridge Island.]

Head Harbour Light.—Next in order, after passing Grand Manan and the plain white Light (American), on West Quoddy Point is Head Harbour Light. This is placed on the North East extremity of Campobello, and is a guide to vessels entering the main channel to West Isles, Moose Island, and the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; it enables vessels also at all times to enter Head Harbour—it is a fixed white light. The building is painted White, with a red cross on it.

Point Le Preaux Lights.—Upon this projecting head land, two lights are placed, one above the other, in the same house, and distant 28 feet. Both lights can be seen from every point of the compass, where they may be useful—both are fixed, and white. The Light House is painted red and white, in stripes of five feet broad each, horizontally.

Partridge Island Light.—This Light at the entrance of the River and Harbour of Saint John, having been established upwards of forty years, requires no particular notice, further than that it is a fixed white light, and that the Light House is red and white, in vertical stripes. The Steam Whistle on this Island is sounded ten seconds in every minute during foggy or thick weather.

Beacon Light.—Within Partridge Island, and upon a Spit or Bar, which extends about half a mile S. S. E. off Sand Point, and which dries at two-thirds ebb, stands the Beacon Tower. Upon this tower a light is established, which is eminently useful to the coasting trade of Saint John, and to all other vessels having pilots on board, as it enables them to enter the harbour at all hours of the night. A fixed white light. The house is white and black, in stripes vertically.

[This Light House was destroyed by fire, January 1867. It will be rebuilt early in this year—1868.]

Quaco.—A revolving white light is placed on a small rock off Quaco Head, showing twice full, and twice dark in a minute, but this light can be seen from any quarter where a vessel can approach. The Light House is painted white and red, in horizontal stripes.

Cape Enrage Light.—On the Point of that name, in Westmorland, nearly opposite Apple River Harbour, N. B. A plain white light house is painted white, and is about 120 feet above tide mark.

West Quoddy Light.—This is an American Light, and is placed on the West side of the entrance into the St. Croix by Lubec and Eastport.

Cape Forchu Light.—On Cape Forchu, on the Western side of the entrance to Yarmouth (Nova Scotia) in lat. $43^{\circ} 39'$, N. long. $66^{\circ} 8'$, W. It exhibits a plain, revolving light, visible one minute and a quarter, and invisible half a minute. The building is painted white, and is elevated 235 feet above the level of the sea.

Grindstone Island Light.—An Octagonal Tower, 60 feet above the level of high water on Grindstone Island, in Chignecto Bay, in lat. $45^{\circ} 43' 13''$ N. Long. $64^{\circ} 37' 25''$ W. The Tower is painted white, as is also the Keeper's House, one story, situate about 59 feet to the Eastward of the Tower.

Bearings and distances of several places from the above Light House are as follows:

Cape Enrage Light, by compass, S. $61^{\circ} 1'$ W., 10 1/2 miles.
Highest Point of St. Mary's Ledge, by compass, N. $40^{\circ} 11'$ W., 6 1/2 mile.

The point of low water off the Light House, by compass, S. $78^{\circ} 11'$ W., 2 1/2 miles.
Jones' Ledge, N. $10^{\circ} 11'$ W., 3 1/2 miles—it dries at low springs; and this about 2 1/2 fathoms on it at half tide.

A Sand Bank, S. $15^{\circ} 11'$ W., 6 1/2 miles; it has 12 fathoms on its shallowest part at low water springs.

Grand Manan.—There is a Light House and Keeper's house at the "Swallow Tail," on the North Eastern part of the Island of Grand Manan, in the Bay of Fundy. The Light is 45 feet from base to Deck; the point on which it stands is 103 feet above high water, making 148 feet elevation. This is a conspicuous mark in the South Channel between Briar Island and Grand Manan. Both houses are painted white.

Richibucto Head Light.—This is a fixed White Light, situated on Richibucto Head, Northumberland Strait, in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence. The light is placed at an elevation of 70 feet above high water, and should be seen in clear weather from a distance of 14 miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric or by lenses of the fourth order. The tower is square, about 50 feet high from base to vane, painted white, and stands in lat. $46^{\circ} 39' 40''$ N. long. $64^{\circ} 43' 30''$ W. of Greenwich.

Point Encumineac Light.—This Light House is situated in Miramichi Bay, north latitude $47^{\circ} 4' 30''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 50' 30''$. It is a fixed bright light, elevated seventy feet above high water.

Miscou Island Light.—This Light House is situated on Birch Point, north latitude $48^{\circ} 1' 00''$; west longitude, $64^{\circ} 30' 00''$. It is a fixed red light, elevated seventy-nine feet above high water.

Shediac Light.—On Point DuChene Wharf, in the summer, north latitude $46^{\circ} 14' 6''$; west longitude $64^{\circ} 81' 5''$. It is a fixed light.

One Ball close, for one square-rigged vessel.

A Pendant under a Ball, for six vessels.

The above are displayed at the East or West yard-arm, according to the direction in which the vessels are at first discovered; and as soon as they are can be distinguished, descriptive Colours will be hoisted at the mast-head, in the following order:

A Union Jack, for a Flag Ship, with or without a squadron.

Do. with a Red Pendant over, for a two-decker.

Do. with a Blue Pendant over, for a Frigate.

Do. with a White Pendant, for a small armed vessel.

A Blue Pendant, for a Merchant Ship.

A Red Pendant, for a Merchant Brig.

A White and Blue Pendant, for a Foreign Vessel.

A White Pendant [without a Ball], for a Topsail Schooner or Sloop.

A Blue Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from St. Andrews or Eastport.

A Red Flag, pierced white, for a Steamboat from Digby.

A Red Flag, with a white square, for a Steamboat from Boston.

A Ball at the mast head—vessel is on shore, or in distress.

Time for going Through the Falls.

The Falls are level or still water at about three and a half hours on the flood, and about two and a half on the ebb, so that they are passable four times in twenty-four hours, about ten or fifteen minutes each time. No other rule can be given, as much depends on the floods in the River Saint John, and the time of high water or full sea, which is often hastened by high winds, and in proportion to the height of them.

RATES OF PILOTAGE.

RATES OF PILOTAGE,

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John, passed 3d August, 1848, by the Hon. H. A.

One dollar per foot for bringing any Ship or Vessel into the Harbour of Saint John, and mooring her in a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside of one of the wharves; and One dollar per foot for removing or taking any Ship or Vessel out of the Harbour.

In cases where Pilots shall be detained on board of vessels, under and by virtue of the Quarantine or Health Laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from Masters of such vessels, the sum of Two Dollars per day, for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance aforesaid.

Coasting Vessels, going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British Steamboats or British Vessels, drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates: For Vessels not exceeding one hundred tons, One dollar and Fifty cents; for vessels over one hundred, and not exceeding two hundred tons, Two Dollars; for vessels over two hundred, and not exceeding three hundred tons, Three Dollars; and for all vessels over three hundred, and not exceeding four hundred tons, the sum of Four Dollars, and twenty-five cents additional for every fifty tons each Vessel may measure over four hundred tons.

First Distance.—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing North West, One dollar per foot.

Second Distance.—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing North West, One dollar and Twenty five cents per foot.

Third Distance.—From Point Le Preaux to North Head of Grand Manan, bearing North West, or North Channel, bearing South East, One dollar and Fifty cents per foot.

Fourth Distance.—From the North Head of Grand Manan, or North Channel, as aforesaid, to Machias Seal Island, bearing South, or Brier Island, bearing South South East, One dollar and Seventy five cents per foot.

Fifth Distance.—Any where outside the aforesaid distance, Two dollars per foot.

On vessels of 30 and under 50 tons, 2s. 6d.; vessels of 50 and under 75 tons, 3s. 9d.; 75 and under 100 tons, 5s.; 100 and under 150 tons, 6s. 3d.; 150, and under 200 tons, 7s. 6d.; 200, and under 300 tons, 10s.; 300, and under 400 tons, 12s. 6d.; 400 tons and upwards, 15s.; decked vessels under 100 tons, owned and registered at Saint John, and all British vessels under that tonnage, trading within the Bay of Fundy, or arriving from ports to the Northward of Cape Odd, or the Westward of Cape Canso, or from any port in Nova Scotia to pay annually as follows: Under 30 tons, 3s. 9d.; over 30, and under 50 tons, 5s.; over 50, and under 75 tons, 6s.; over 75, and under 100 tons,

Other boats and vessels without decks, and having fixed or standing masts, and all scows to pay 80c. each trip, and 30c. additional per day, if suffered to remain over three days.

Carts, sleds, drays, and carriages, same as waggons.

The Ferry is leased from the Corporation for the space of ten years from July 10th, 1860, by Mr. John McSweeny. One boat runs at a time, and returns at night to the Eastern side. The boat runs from Ferry Landing, foot of Princess Street, on the east side, to Rodney Slip, Carlton, except at low water, spring tides, when the passengers are landed at Sand Point.

Rate of Tolls for Crossing the St. John Suspension Bridge.

For every foot passenger, (excepting children under five years of age, 4c.; horse, mare, gelding, mule, ass, ox, cow, or other large animal, 7c. each; elephant or camels, 50c.; carriage, sleigh, waggon, cart, sled, or other vehicle, drawn by one horse or beast of draught, with one person, with or without a load, 18c.; horse or beast of draught, more than one, with a carriage or other vehicle, 7c. each; sheep, calf, hog, or goat, 1c.)

Public Porters and Hand Cart Men.

For loading, carrying, and housing any goods, or any other article on any Hand Cart, from the Market Slip, in King's and Queen's Wards, or from any other place within the limits of the first district, to any other place within the said several five districts, the rates of prices are as follow: For the first district, 5c.; second district, 6c.; third district, 6c.; fourth district, 7c.; fifth district, 9c.

COIN USED BY JUDAS.—The “piece of silver,” thirty of which were paid to Judas, in his trade of betraying Christ, was considered a peculiar piece by the Israelites, and was always spoken of in their holy books as a holy shekel of the sanctuary. It was the amount which each Israelite between the ages of twenty and fifty, was required to pay into the public treasury, as a ransom for their delivery, during their sojourn in the wilderness. A shekel was worth about fifty cents of our money. The coin was somewhat larger than an American half dollar. On one side it bore the emblem of Aaron's rod, and the words, “Shekel of Israel.”

POSTAGE.

All Letters sent to any part of British North America, with the exception of Packet Letters, and Letters to and from the United States, are liable to a uniform rate of five cents per half ounce, according to the following scale:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight	\$0 05
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding one ounce	10
A Letter exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding one ounce and a half	15
A Letter exceeding one ounce and a half, and not exceeding two ounces	20
A Letter exceeding two ounces, and not exceeding two ounces and a half	25

And so on, adding five cents extra for every additional half ounce.

The same scale of reckoning by half ounces is applicable to Letters to and from the United States, but the rate on such Letters is ten cents per half ounce.

On Packet Letters to and from the United Kingdom, the scale of rates is as follows:—

A Letter not exceeding half ounce in weight	\$0 12½
A Letter exceeding half ounce, and not exceeding an ounce	25
And so on—adding 12½ cents for every additional half ounce.	

In all cases where a Letter is not specially directed to be sent by any particular route, the rate of Postage first mentioned is chargeable. It must also be understood that the rates given in the above Table for places to which the route is through the United Kingdom, are rates "via Halifax," by which route all such correspondence will be sent, if not specially addressed "via United States," or "via New York;" in which case an additional rate of 4½ cents is to be added.

Printed Books, Periodicals, Publications, or Pamphlets, under 48 ounces in weight, can be forwarded by Post in New Brunswick, at the rate of two cents for every four ounces; under two ounces, free.

Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Books, to pass at the above rates, must be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the sides or ends.

No words or marks (except the name and address of the person to whom sent), shall be written on any Newspaper, Pamphlet, Book, Periodical, Parliamentary or Government paper.

Any violation of these Regulations will subject such Newspapers, Pamphlets, Periodicals, or Books, &c., to be treated in every respect as Letters.

REGISTRATION.—The system of registration is applicable to all description of letters without distinction, whether they contain articles of value or not. It also applies to parcels. The charge in addition to postage is 5 cents; to England, 8 cents.

PARCELS.—Parcels closed at the ends and sides can be sent by mail throughout the Province, at a rate of 25 cents per lb. The weight of each parcel is not to exceed 8 lbs., nor the size to exceed 3 feet in length or breadth; and 1 foot in thickness. The parcel must not contain any glass, liquid, or any substance liable to do injury to the mail, under the penalty of a forfeiture of the parcel if discovered. The parcel is not to contain any writing. Registration fee 5 cents. Parcels must be pre-paid by stamp. The sender, by writing his name on the outside, can have the parcel returned in case of failure to reach the person addressed.

POSTAGE STAMPS.—Postage stamps are provided at the respective values of 1 cent for Circulars; 2 cents for Drop Letters; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents per Ounard steamer, via Halifax; 17 cents via United States for England.

Patterns and samples are transmitted between this Province and the United Kingdom at the same rate as per book post. The pattern or sample must be open at the end or side, except in case of seeds, drugs, &c.; which can be sent in closed transparent bags.

The following statistics of Trade and Revenue, for 1866, of the following Colonies, is taken from the report of the Controller of Customs at Saint John, N. B.:

CANADA.—Estimated population in 1866, about 3,090,000; Customs, total revenue for the year ending 30th June, 1866, was \$7,582,412; deductions for collection and return duties, \$411,254; Net Customs revenue, \$6,921,158; cost of collection, about 5 $\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. Excise, \$1,888,576; Excise duties returned and drawbacks on excisable goods exported, \$46,008; cost of collecting the excise duties, \$109,882. The Bank imposts produced \$16,885, and bill stamps \$90,247. The gross revenue of Canada for the same year, without including debentures sold, was \$12,672,480; and the total expenditure, including interest on public debt, collection of the revenue, &c., was \$12,418,106, shewing a balance in favor of the year's operations of \$254,375. The direct funded debt of Canada on the 30th of June, 1866, was \$60,561,014, less accumulated sinking fund, \$1,645,222.

The value of the exports for the same year was \$54,711,494, including \$2,897,591 in coin and bullion; new ships built and exported, \$1,616,886; total, \$56,328,380. The quantity of new vessels built in Canada in the same year, was 9 steamers, 1,188 tons, 160 sailing vessels, 54,491 tons; total, 169 vessels, 55,674 tons. The value of the dutiable goods imported was \$33,275,276, free goods, \$15,385,201, coin and bullion, \$5,191,842; total, \$53,812,319.

NEWFOUNDLAND.—Value of imports, \$5,784,849; value of exports, \$5,694,306; Customs duties, \$588,489, less drawbacks, \$11,547; total, \$5,76,942. Excise revenue, \$488. Total revenue, including moneys borrowed under the Loan Acts, \$719,210. Total expenditure, including interest on public debt, and debentures paid off, \$670,862. The public debt, terminable, is \$680,437, permanent, \$238,143, floating, \$215,081, total, \$1,132,661. Amount expended for education and literary purposes, \$82,434; estimated population in 1866, 130,000. Number and tonnage of vessels registered in the Colony, 1,497, 83,204 tons; number and tonnage of vessels built in the Colony 107, 3,534 tons; steam vessels registered in the Colony 9, 1,229 tons; the number of steam vessels registered in the Colony and in other places engaged in prosecuting the seal fishery was 10 vessels, 2,484 tons.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.—Estimated population in 1866, 90,000; value of imports for 1866, £432,437 sterling; exports, £242,274; value of ships transferred, £136,292; total, £878,566. Import and Excise duty, £65,362; revenue from other sources, £80,080; total, £95,442 currency. The public debt on the 31st January last was £133,542. New vessels registered in 1866, 127, 22,505 tons.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Estimated population in 1866, 368,000; total value of imports, \$14,381,008; value of goods entered for home consumption, \$13,025,433; total value of exports, \$8,043,095. The revenue from Customs for the year ending 30th September, 1866, was \$1,226,398. Excise duty on 158,940 gallons ale, at 2 cents per gallon, \$6,178.80; Excise duty on 232,489 pounds tobacco, manufactured in Nova Scotia, at one cent per pound, \$2,324.89; total Excise duty, \$5,508.69. The quantity of new shipping registered in Nova Scotia during the same period was 300 vessels, measuring 50,955 tons register, valued at \$2,-

388,500. The total number of vessels registered at all the Ports in Nova Scotia on the 30th September last was 3,509, measuring 40,895 tons, valued at \$13,749,547. The total receipts of Nova Scotia for the year, including duties, royalty on coal, crown lands sold, railway revenue. (Treasury notes \$95,000,) mines, &c., were \$1,857,247.71, and the total payments, including railway interest and expenses, Militia, roads, &c., were \$1,961,348.28, shewing an excess of payments over receipts of \$104,100.57. At the commencement of the year Nova Scotia had a balance on hand of \$222,932.97, and at the close of the year it was \$118,332.40.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—Our population at the close of last year might be estimated at 295,000. Our Customs revenue for the year ended 31st December, 1866, was \$1,033,609.67, less drawbacks about \$58,040; value of imports, \$10,000,794; exports, \$6,373,705; value of new shipping built, \$1,812,480; total, \$8,186,185. The quantity of new shipping built was 118 vessels, measuring 49,925 tons; tonnage registered in the Province on the 31st December 1866, was 983 vessels, 233,945 tons. Gross revenue, including Post Office receipts, earnings of Railway, &c., in the year ending 31st October, 1866, was \$1,373,255.95, and the total payments, \$1,314,142.88; shewing a surplus balance of \$59,113.07. This balance in favour of the year's operations would be much larger if confined to ordinary transactions, as amongst the payments were included railway subsidies paid to St. Stephen's Branch, payments for construction of European and North American Railway, Provincial Debentures for ordinary debt paid, and reduction in debt to Savings Bank. The Auditor General estimates the real balance in favor of the year's operations, after deducting \$100,200 for debentures sold for all purposes, to be \$142,630.25.

The liabilities of the Province on the 31st October last, the close of the financial year, on account of railway debentures sold, was \$5,088.680, and on account of Savings Bank debt, \$725,601.26. During the last Session of the Legislature of New Brunswick a few changes were made in the tariff. The duty on rum and alcohol was raised from 35 cents per gallon proof and 3 per cent. to 70 cents per gallon proof and 3 per cent., which is a shade higher than the Canadian rate. The duty on iron, ships' materials, (except cordage and oakum,) and some other articles used for manufacturing purposes, was abolished, similar articles being free under the Canadian tariff.

The value of the following principal articles imported in 1866, for fitting out our new vessels, viz.: canvas, cordage, chains, anchors, copper, yellow metal, oakum, sails and rigging, amounted to \$610,742, duty received, \$22,262, against \$465,154, duty \$17,208, in 1865. The duty on nearly all these articles has been recently taken off, so as to put our shipbuilders at once in as good a position as the shipbuilders of Canada.

The value of all the haberdashery imported last year was \$2,509,072, duty paid, \$362,447, against \$1,571,194, duty paid, \$228,198, in 1865.

CUTTING TIMBER.—If oak, hickory, or chestnut be felled in August, in the second running of the sap, and barked, quite a large tree will season perfectly, and even the twigs will remain sound for years; whereas that cut in winter and remaining until next fall, (as thick as your wrist,) will be completely sap-rotten, and will be almost unfit for any purpose. The body of the oak split into rails will not last more than 10 or 12 years. Chestnut will not last longer, but no comparison to that cut in August. Hickory cut in August is not subject to be worm-eaten, and lasts a long time for fencing. When I began farming in 1802, it was the practice to cut timber for post fencing in the winter. White oak posts and black oak rails, cut at that time, would not last more than 10 or 12 years. In 1808 I began cutting fence timber in August. Many of the oak rails cut that year are yet sound, as well as most of the chestnut. If the bark is not taken off this month, it will of itself peel off the second or third year, and leave the tree perfectly sound. The tops of the tree are also more valuable for fuel than when cut in winter or spring. I advise young farmers to try the experiment, and if post fences do not last twice as long, I forfeit all my experience as worthless.

THE MOON.—The Royal Astronomical Society of Great Britain have appointed a committee of its principal members, to each one of which is assigned a section of the moon's surface, which he is to study every fair night, and report upon all changes observed. Dr. Schmidt, at Athens, has announced that the volcanoes are still in active operation. It has been thought by some that the moon was a defunct globe; that its fires had gone out, and it had become a frozen, barren mass, wanting only the final conflagration. Dr. Schmidt has noticed the action of the crater Linne, which is similar to lunar observers. This, like other craters in the moon, as to its depth, together with the height of the mountains, has been measured. Two thousand of these mountains have been counted averaging higher than the Alps in Europe. Thirty-nine of them would overtop Mont Blanc. The craters are very much larger than any of those on our earth, some of them having a diameter of more than a hundred miles, and a depth of two or three miles.

CANNING FRUITS.—The annexed method of canning fruit was furnished at the New York Farmers' Club, by Mr. Powers, of Oswego Co., New York:—"I will suppose your fruit and glass cans all ready. I prefer cans with glass covers. I scald the fruit in a large tin pan with juice or water to cover it. Put half a tea-cup of cold water into every can, and fill up with hot water. Put the covers and rubbers also into hot water. Now empty a can, and fill up with hot fruit, and then another. Let them stand open till the hand can be held upon them without burning. As soon as filled cut writing paper the size of the can, one for each, and when cool slip one over the fruit entirely, and fill up the can on the top of the paper with boiling juice, and seal at once. Ladies, try this: the fruit will never mould, and keep any time, if you don't eat it. The papers keep the fruit from rising to the top of the liquid. There is no use of setting cans into water to heat them, or of putting them into quilted bags: it is too troublesome. I let the fruit shrink, and then fill up to the cover as close as possible. Ladies must be governed by their own common sense. Men attempt to give directions, but their wives have to tell them, and they are likely to forget." —*Rural New Yorker.*

Table for Foretelling the Weather through all the Lunations of each Year.

This Table, and the accompanying remarks, are the result of many years' actual observation; the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon, in their several positions respecting the Earth, and will, by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of its quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom found to fail.

Observations.—The nearer the time of the Moon's change to noon or midnight, the more nearly will the result accord with the prediction.

It is also said that less dependence is to be placed on the Table in winter than in summer.




