FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of

Pounds sterling, to be raised and paid for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements, or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements; for which Legaey the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

* * Bequests for charitable or benevolent purposes, of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personality, not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

I. This Society shall be designated THE NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.

II. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, or of the Established Church of Scotland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's System.

III. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary or Secretaries, and also of Governors, and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.

IV. Each Subscriber of One Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.

V. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for Life.

VI. Each Subscriber of Five Pounds annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.

VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its Officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than Twelve; of whom Nine, who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.

IX. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered *ex-officio* Members of the Committee; the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every month.

X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of equality of votes, the Chairman shall have a second or casting vote.

XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.

XII. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held in London annually, on the Second Wednesday in May, when the Proceedings of the foregoing year shall be reported, and the Accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.

XIII. A Special General Meeting of the Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter addressed to the Secretary.

XIV. Ten days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society who reside within the limits of the Three-penny Post, shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron, or, in his absence, the Vice-Patron, or, should he be absent, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present, or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer, and, in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed, or altered, nor any new Law established, but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. That the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America Society for educating the poor, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed, to be called "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of," for the purpose of co-operating with that Institution.
 2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum, or upwards, or Five Guineas or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.
 3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than Members; and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.
 4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.
 5. That this Auxiliary shall furnish the Parent Society, on or before the first week in March in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.
 6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

1. That we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the Newfoundland and British North America Society for educating the poor, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this Association be denominated "The Association."
2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per annum, or making a donation of One Guinea or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.
3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.
4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener, if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that three Members be empowered to act.
5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.
6. That this association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society, on or before the last day of February in each year, with an Abstract of its cash account, &c.
7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

On the Motion of John Labouchere, Esq., seconded by the Rev. R. Monro, M.A.,

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY,

1. That the Report, of which an Abstract has been read, be received and printed under the direction of the Committee; and that this Meeting desires to acknowledge with gratitude the continued goodness of God manifested towards the Society during the past year.

On the Motion of Joseph Wilson, Esq. seconded by Mr. William Jeynes.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY,

2. That this Meeting have heard with much satisfaction of the prosperous state of the Schools in Newfoundland, as well as of the increased support afforded them in the Island.—And they would regard it as an additional appeal to the Mother Country to increase her exertions in behalf of her long-neglected Colony.

On the Motion of the Rev. Thomas Harding, M.A., seconded by Percival White, Esq., F. P.

RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY,

3. That this Meeting, contemplating with lively interest and Christian sympathy the great moral and spiritual necessities of the rapidly growing population of the British Provinces in North America, feels deeply convinced that one of the most effectual means, under Divine Providence, of meeting those wants and promoting good order and happiness among the people, is, the

introduction of that System of Education which has so happily succeeded in Newfoundland; and that, therefore, it is the duty of this Society to establish its Schools in the Canadas, as soon as adequate funds can be raised for that purpose.

THE

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY
FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.

IN presenting the Report of their proceedings during the past year, the Committee gratefully acknowledge the blessings with which it has pleased God to prosper their labours, though He has seen good to try them by great pecuniary difficulties.

Your Committee will follow the order pursued in former reports, and begin with the proceedings of the Society abroad.

It is with unfeigned gratitude to the Divine Disposer of the hearts of all men, that they state the increased prosperity of the Society in Newfoundland. His Excellency the Governor, Sir T. Cochrane, has continued to prove himself the warm and cordial friend of your Society. A more decided proof of this cannot be given than the following extract from his opening address to the New Legislative Assembly, at their meeting in January last.

"With the exception of that institution called the St. John's School, established in the year 1804, by his Excellency Lord Gambier, few establishments worthy the name of Schools existed in Newfoundland until the year 1824, when, through the instrumentality of an enterprising individual, a Society was formed, now called the 'Newfoundland and British North America School Society,' which commenced in 1825, with a School in this town, and since that period has extended its operations to various other places, and now employs 22 Teachers,

who give instruction to 1756 children and 242 adults. It is difficult to say which most to admire—the persevering endeavour of this gentleman to uphold what he so laudably commenced, or the kindness and good feeling with which the British Public have answered his solicitations."

The Judges on the circuits have likewise manifested a very kind and favourable feeling towards your Schools established at the places they visited, either personally inspecting them or publicly speaking in their favour, as occasion arose.

The Bishop of Nova Scotia, during the last year, made his Episcopal visitation of Newfoundland, and was pleased to visit several of your Schools, and expressed himself satisfied with what he saw.

Indeed, nothing can be more gratifying to the Committee than the unanimous testimony borne to your Teachers, and the Scholars under their care, by all the persons in authority, as well as by the Merchants, Planters, and other residents, which has come unsolicited, and therefore shows the impression generally made upon those who both have the opportunity, and also take the trouble, of examining for themselves.

The amount of receipts in the island, for the year 1831-1832, ending May 25th, 1832, was 475*l.* 1*s.* 3*d.* currency; being a larger sum than has been received in any preceding year. And there is much encouragement to believe that this sum will be exceeded in the current year.

The Committee have deemed it advisable to introduce this amount, and the corresponding expenditure, into the general balance-sheet of the Society, in order to present as accurate a view as possible of the full extent of the Society's operations. They have also ordered to be printed the Account sent over from Newfoundland of the Disbursements there, which they trust will prove satisfactory to the subscribers and friends of the Society.

Your Committee will now proceed to report the state of the Schools, beginning as usual with the central School at St. John's.

ST. JOHN'S.

Mr. and Mrs. Jeynes have long had permission of the Committee to visit England on their private affairs, rendered necessary by deaths among their relatives. Their visit has been delayed for two years, solely on account of the interests of the Society not allowing them to leave earlier. Through the kind providence of God, they arrived at Falmouth in safety on the 12th March, having left the charge of the Schools with Mr. and Mrs. Netten.

Mr. Jeynes reports that the daily attendance at the Schools in St. John's has increased during the past year, and the progress of the children has given him much satisfaction. They are also more docile and tractable. The parents have likewise intimated in various ways their approbation of the Schools.

The Branch Schools at Quidi Vidi and River Head have been suspended during the last few months. The necessity for re-opening them will be manifest from the following extracts from the Teacher's Journal. Sunday.—“ Visited one of the Branch Schools—observed some persons spreading fish, others at work in their gardens, and others caulking a boat on the beach,—spoke to them on the sin they were committing, and distributed many tracts.” The Governor has granted a plot of ground at this place for a School-Room, but the extreme poverty of the people has hitherto prevented the erection of the building.

The Branch at Portugal Cove has been regularly kept. Mr. Jeynes frequently visits and examines the children, and he reports the School to be in a prosperous condition. On one occasion the first Class repeated two chapters of St. John, and the second Class two chapters of St. Matthew. Their advance in Scriptural knowledge was manifested by the answers which they gave.

HARBOUR GRACE.

Mr. and Mrs. Kingwell continue to labour at this station

with much advantage to the people; and they report that the improvement in the children is very gratifying. The attendance has been variable, owing to local circumstances and the severity of the season. The Bible Class is found to be increasingly useful, not only to those who attend to receive instruction, but also to the Teachers themselves. The parents of some of the children appreciate the privilege of the School so much as to induce them to subscribe cheerfully towards its support. During the last autumn your Teachers and the School premises were most providentially saved from total destruction. On the 18th August, at two p. m., a fire broke out in Harbour Grace, which consumed the Church and ninety dwelling-houses, besides extensive stores and wharfs, in less than two hours. The Society's buildings were at one moment in imminent danger, being situated within seventy feet of the Church; and the fences around the ground, extending to within twenty feet of the same, were in part burnt; but just at the very moment when it was expected that the fire would be communicated to the School-Room, the wind most providentially changed from W. to N.W., which conducted the great body of fire from the Church clear of the School premises and the Parsonage-house, which are close together. As it was, the tar which had recently been put on the roof was quite melted, the whole of the paint-work in front blistered, and the front door actually scorched. Mr. Kingwell states that when he saw the Church kindling, he assembled his family together, and by a solemn act of devotion committed them all, with every thing belonging to them, into the hands of the Lord; and within a few minutes after he had done this, the wind changed. Mr. Kingwell was deeply impressed with this event, and writes concerning it, "I believe the Lord gave the faith, and answered the prayer, and therefore to Him we give the praise. Amen."

The Branch School at Upper Island Cove has had upwards of fifty Scholars in attendance during the past year. Their

improvement has been very satisfactory. A School-room is much wanted here, and the inhabitants have got out of the woods above one hundred sticks for erecting one; but the further means are yet wanting to proceed with it.

At River Head a Branch School was kept during the winter.

SPANIARD'S BAY.

Spaniard's Bay was formerly a branch of Harbour Grace; but the inhabitants having built a School-room, a Principal Teacher, Mr. Griffin, was placed among them as stated in the last Report. Mr. G. states that the attendance at the School, particularly at the Sunday School, has been very good, and the improvement of the scholars highly encouraging. The attendance at the Day School was not equal to that at the Sunday School, for want of shoes, and owing to the severity of the weather. On the Sundays parents and children flocked to the School-room and filled it to excess, so that the Teacher on one occasion was compelled to request some of the parents to return. But they urged in reply, that they wished to hear the word of God, for they could not read, and they had no teacher but himself; therefore they hoped he would allow them to remain and listen to the instruction he was about to give to the children.

In a more recent communication Mr. Griffin states, that the desire of the people, both children and adults, for instruction, continued unabated, and that a decided improvement had taken place in the Bay since the opening of the School. One of the most pleasing effects is the improved observation of the Lord's Day. And Mr. Griffin adds, "proofs of the power of the Word of God are not wanting in awakening the conscience to a sense of the evil and danger of sin." There are at this place no other means of religious instruction than those afforded by your School and Teacher.

PORT DE GRAVE.

Mr. and Mrs. Lind report that the Schools have gone on regularly and with much encouragement during the past year. The mutual attachment of the Teachers and children has increased, and the former hope that the good seed has been sown in the hearts of the latter, and will bear much fruit to the praise and glory of the Lord. Several instances have occurred in which the children have read the Scriptures to their aged relatives, who were themselves unable to read. Mr. Lind has suffered severely in his health during the last summer, in consequence of the severity of the preceding winter. He was, however, considerably better at the date of his last letter.

The Venerable the Archdeacon of Newfoundland, accompanied by the Rev. C. Blackman, visited the School, and on taking leave expressed himself "much gratified with what he had seen and heard."

The Books in the Loan Library are eagerly sought after and read by many. The Sunday School has attracted much notice and given general satisfaction.

The Branch at Bareneed continues to prosper, and the children give proofs of much improvement by their general conduct. At Cupid's, thirty-six children have been admitted since the School was opened, of whom twenty remain under instruction.

The School-room which was building at Bay Roberts has been completed; and at the Teachers' last meeting it was placed under the care of Mr. John Burkitt, who went out with Mr. Willoughby last spring. The merchants and planters received Mr. Burkitt with much kindness, and the parents of the children manifested a pleasure in doing any thing for him. The attendance at the School, however, has not been good; and as the winter set in, it decreased in consequence

of many families removing into the woods, as is customary during the winter months.

WESTERN BAY.

It was stated in the last Report, that Mr. Fleet had removed from Trinity Harbour, and it was expected would settle at Bay Roberts. But on his arrival at that place he found the School-room was not ready; he therefore proceeded to Western Bay, where he was immediately provided with a large room, in which he opened a School and kept it with much advantage for the year. He admitted eighty-four children, of whom sixteen were able to read, having previously attended a Sunday School. The senior scholars learnt, while under Mr. Fleet's instruction, three chapters in the Old Testament, the first nine Psalms, nearly the whole of Dr. Watts's Hymns, besides many portions of Scripture which they were expected daily to repeat. An Adult School also was kept during the winter. Tracts and religious books were freely circulated among them. Several adjacent places were occasionally visited and Tracts distributed; and there is every reason to hope that a most beneficial impression was made upon the people generally. Among those admitted into the School there were three great girls, almost young women, who evinced a great willingness to learn.

BRIGUS.

Brigus is situated on the western side of Conception Bay, and of late years has very considerably increased both in size and population. The population, according to the last returns, amounted to 1216, of whom two-thirds are Protestants.

The people were so intent upon having a School, that they erected at their own expense a good room with a suitable Master's house, on the condition that this Society would supply them with a Teacher. The buildings being completed and the station important, it was resolved at the General

Meeting of Teachers last May, that Mr. and Mrs. King should take the charge of this establishment ; and that Mr. B. Fleet should succeed them at Green's Pond. Accordingly, in August last, Mr. and Mrs. King arrived in Brigus, and opened the School on 3d September. On the first day thirty children were admitted, and the number of applications both of boys and girls daily increased ; so that up to the 19th December last no less than 159 had been admitted into the Daily, Sunday, and Adult Schools. Though the School has been opened so short a time, yet Mr. King states that he perceives a decided improvement in the children.

On a Sunday Mr. King visits Burnt Head, about three miles distant from Brigus, where he has a small School of fifty-six children. At this place he has Divine service in the School-room, where the parents as well as children attend, and manifest a great desire to know the truth. Many of them come a considerable distance.

TRINITY HARBOUR.

The Schools in this place, under the care of Mr. and Mrs. Martin, are proceeding very satisfactorily. The Teachers report, " We are happy to discover in our Scholars an increasing attachment to the School, as also an evident improvement in their acquaintance with the Word of God, and we are thereby encouraged to sow in hope that God will sanctify his word, and make it life and light to our youthful charge."

On opening the Adult School for the season, on four nights in the week, the Scholars requested permission to attend the other two also.

The Bible Class excites much interest, is regularly attended, and the Scholars manifest peculiar seriousness and attention.

There is also an increasing desire for books to read, both among the children and adults ; at times the applications have been more numerous than the books in the library could supply.

Mr. Martin has adopted the practice, now extensively pursued in this country by the District Visiting Society, of lending Tracts, and has been encouraged by finding they have been much valued and have proved eminently useful. His visits also to the sick and dying have been attended with much good. One poor woman whom he had frequently visited, being near death, expressed herself, with much effort, thankful for his visits, and exclaimed, "Ah! what should I do, a poor sinner, without the Saviour! I trust he will soon release me from this world and take me to himself." Mr. Martin states his conviction, that her hopes were well-grounded, resting alone on the merits of Him who died to save.

The five Branches connected with this School are visited as usual by Mr. Martin, and found to be very useful in the places in which they are opened. In the Branch School, on the South Side, there were thirteen who last May could read well in the New Testament, who, in December 1830, when the School was opened, did not know the alphabet. Mr. Martin also observes, that of the 162 Scholars attending these Branch Schools, more than half the number can read the Scriptures with tolerable accuracy, which they would not have been able to do without the instruction afforded them by this Society.

BONAVISTA.

The Teachers, Mr. and Mrs. Meek, at this place, state in their last Report, "By the good providence of God, we have been enabled to prosecute our labours through another year, and feel bound to acknowledge with thankfulness the success with which we have been favoured." Mr. Meek continues to suffer from the crowded state of the School-room. Indeed it is very commonly so full as to prevent the children from going through their exercises with regularity or comfort. The number on the books is 259.

The Adult School was well attended until the people's cir-

cumstances were such as not to afford to supply the necessary candles.

The Bible Class has been very numerously attended during the winter, when the weather would permit, and much interest and attention manifested.

One of the Scholars, a youth of thirteen, died during the past year, and left very pleasing and satisfactory evidence that to him "to die was gain." He had been very attentive at School, and was making rapid progress. During his last illness there was an evident change wrought in his mind, which gave his Teacher the best reason to believe that he fell asleep in Jesus. In closing his last Annual Report (made in May last year) Mr. Meek states that the sufferings of the inhabitants of Bonavista had attained a fearful height. In consequence of the failure of the seal fishery, the protracted winter, and the entire stoppage of all navigation by the ice, multitudes must have perished through want, had it not been for a timely arrival of relief from the government, and a change in the weather.

It is with deep concern your Committee have to add, that, according to the latest accounts, the last winter had set in with greater severity, and there was every prospect of greater distress, than that of the preceding one.

GREEN'S POND.

It has been already stated that Mr. and Mrs. King have been succeeded in the charge of this School by Mr. B. Fleet.

In Mr. King's last Report on giving up the School, he observes that the Schools have gradually proceeded, the attendance has been regular, and the children have manifested an earnest desire to improve the means of instruction afforded them. The Loan Library books have been widely circulated. Bibles and Testaments have also been distributed in almost every part of the Bay. In one place an individual sold no less than one dozen copies of the Holy Scriptures.

The Branch School at Fool's Island has given much satisfaction.

Just before Mr. King left, Mrs. King and himself as well as their two children were very unwell. Before they took up their residence at Brigus, however, their health had greatly improved.

In conformity with the arrangement already reported, Mr. B. Fleet arrived at Green's Pond about 8th August, and re-opened the School on Sunday, the 11th of the same month.

TWILLINGATE.

It is with unfeigned sorrow that the Committee report that they have not been able for want of funds to fulfil their engagements with the people resident at this place. From the time of Mr. Flint's departure up to the present moment, this School has been without a Teacher. Yet one is much required; the people also are most earnest in their applications, and have even provided a store of firewood for him against his arrival. The Committee sincerely hope that this School will not be much longer destitute of a Teacher—more particularly as they have reason to hope that, ultimately, the School in this place will nearly support itself.

PETTY HARBOUR.

In Mr. Bradford's Report made last May, he states that he took charge of the School here on the 12th August, 1831, after the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Martin—that he had about fifty little children in the School until the winter, when the numbers were diminished. The Sunday Schools were pretty well attended, but the Bible Class and the Adult School had very much fallen off.

It was proposed that Mr. and Mrs. Netten, who accompanied Mr. Willoughby last spring, should be placed at Petty Harbour, and Mr. and Mrs. Bradford proceed to Twillingate. But circumstances having arisen which made it necessary for Mr. and Mrs. Bradford to return to England, they accord-

ingly applied to the Superintendent for permission to do so ; which, under all the circumstances of the case, he considered it his duty to grant.

Mr. and Mrs. Netten re-opened the Schools here on the 9th July. They were very kindly received by the people, who expressed their hope that they would continue with them a long time. The manner in which they entered on their duties is very pleasing and satisfactory.

LITTLE PLACENTIA.

The Governor, Sir Thomas Cochrane, has for some time past urged upon the Committee the importance of opening Schools in the South of the Island, particularly in Placentia Bay. An opportunity presented itself during the past year of attempting a little in that neighbourhood, which they did not like to lose, though they felt it was very uncertain whether it would be in their power to continue a School there. A merchant connected with Little Placentia offered liberal assistance towards the opening of a School, with a promise of an annual subscription. It was also intimated that there were others in the place who would assist. It was therefore determined that Mr. W. Walker should proceed thither immediately after the last Meeting at St. John's. Mr. Walker states he was very kindly received, and, having obtained the use of a suitable room, opened a School on the 1st August, and by the last returns had admitted eighty-two Scholars into the Day and Adult Schools.

There continues in all the stations a demand for Bibles and Testaments, Prayer Books, and the publications of the Religious Tract Society. Mr. Jeynes has brought over with him the following sums of money for books sold in the Island during the year, viz.—

Before your Committee close the Report concerning Newfoundland, they beg particular attention to the fact, that there

are now three School-rooms unoccupied, which the inhabitants provided on the understanding that this Society would supply the Teachers—these are Twillingate, Bareneed, and Lower Island Cove. There are also buildings commenced at several other places, but the people, seeing no prospect of Teachers, have not proceeded with them.

On summing up the whole of what the Society has been permitted to do since its commencement, your Committee find that it has opened fourteen Principal and twenty Branch Schools; of which there were open, at the making up of the Returns in December last, eleven Principal and fourteen Branch Schools, three Principal and six Branch having been unavoidably suspended.

The total number admitted into the Daily Schools is 4844, Sunday Schools 3067, Adult Schools 1046. And there were on the books in December last, in the Daily Schools 1762; Sunday Schools 1697; Adult Schools 246. The number of individuals who have thus been admitted to receive instruction is 5989; of whom 2371 were on the books in December last.

It was stated in the last Report, that Mr. Willoughby had instructions to visit **UPPER** and **LOWER CANADA** with a view of ascertaining where Schools were most required, and what probability there was of obtaining local support for them when once established. The Committee have just received from him his first Report. In consequence of the protracted winter in Newfoundland last year, and the fearful ravages of cholera in Canada in the summer, it appears that Mr. Willoughby did not leave St. John's, Newfoundland, till the 12th October, 1832. He was very kindly accommodated by William Johnston, Esq. with a free passage to Halifax, where he arrived, through the kind providence of God, in safety on 21st of the same month.

After delivering his letters of introduction to the President of the government, (the Governor, Sir P. Maitland, being

at the time on his way to this country,) and obtaining as much information as he could in Halifax, he directed his course at once to York, Upper Canada, visiting on his way various towns in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Lower and Upper Canada, through which his route lay.

From what Mr. Willoughby had thus observed, he was well satisfied that he could immediately locate fifty pious Teachers, who would be cordially received and most usefully employed. The expenses of sending them out, and their chief support for two or three years, must be supplied from this country; but there appears every probability that ultimately they would be wholly maintained in the colony. The Government, as well as the House of Assembly, in Upper Canada, feel a lively interest in the subject of Education generally, and are disposed to encourage the formation of Schools.

Mr. Willoughby proposed to return by the same way he went, visiting Montreal and all the places of moment right and left, till he should reach Quebec. He also intended to visit Cape Breton and Prince Edward's Island, and hoped to return to Newfoundland in April or May.

The population of Upper Canada, according to the census taken by order of Government, and made up to spring 1832, is 259,787. And from that time up to January 1833, it is estimated that not less than 40,000 have arrived in the province with a view of settling there.

It is manifest, even from this short and partial report of Mr. Willoughby's examination, that there are numerous openings in Canada where religious instruction for the children of the poor is greatly needed, and would be very kindly patronized. Your Committee cannot, therefore, be otherwise than deeply concerned that the state of the funds will not permit them to send a single Teacher, at present, to this much-needed part of our colonial possessions, inhabited, almost exclusively, by emigrants from the British Isles; and they feel this the more, because every month's delay tends to habituate the colonists

to their present destitute condition, and thus to make the work of education more difficult.

HOME PROCEEDINGS.

Your Committee will next give an account of their proceedings at home, and state the result of their exertions. The receipts of the past year in the United Kingdom amounted to 2100*l.* 19*s.* 11*d.*, which, added to the balance in favour of the Society at the preceding audit, made the sum at home at the disposal of the Committee 2220*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.*; to which may be added the receipts in Newfoundland 403*l.* 16*s.* 1*d.* sterling, which your Committee have introduced into the general balance-sheet for the first time, this year, making the total amount of 2624*l.* 9*s.* 5*d.* available for the purposes of the Society. The payments during the same period, however, have exceeded this sum, amounting to 2750*l.* 10*s.* 9*d.*; hence on the 31st March there was a balance due to the Treasurer of 126*l.* 1*s.* 4*d.* There were also on that day bills accepted by the Treasurer but not due, and outstanding accounts, to the amount of 649*l.* 9*s.* 6*d.*; but on the other side there were various remittances from the country, which ought to have come in before 31st March, amounting to 284*l.* The difference of these amounts, added to the sum due to the Treasurer on 31st March, shows the deficiency upon the year to be 491*l.* 10*s.* 10*d.* Great as this sum is, the Committee desire to be thankful that it is not more, considering the check given last year, by the fearful ravages of the cholera, to all benevolent exertions, which did not regard the immediate neighbourhood.

As soon as practicable after the last anniversary, your Secretary visited Taunton, Wellington, Exeter, Teignmouth, Brixham, Dartmouth, Totness, Plymouth, Doncaster, York, Hull, Harrowgate, Leeds, Huddersfield, Manchester, Birmingham, Hereford, Cheltenham, Poole, and Southampton. And although, from the peculiar excitement of the country in conse-

quence of the prevailing disease, the anticipations of aid which your Committee had formed were in many instances disappointed; yet they have abundant reason to offer their grateful acknowledgments to those kind friends who took a lively interest in behalf of this Society, and afforded no small encouragement to the Secretary in his work.

In these exertions he was assisted by the Rev. H. Budd, and Samuel Codner, Esq. The former joined the Secretary at Manchester, and afterwards visited Liverpool alone. The latter met him at Exeter, and accompanied him to Teignmouth, Brixham, Dartmouth, and Totness.

Mr. Codner also spent some time in the autumn in promoting the interests of the Society in Devon. He succeeded in forming at Barnstaple a new auxiliary, called the North Devon and Barnstaple Auxiliary, together with Ladies' Associations at Barnstaple, Bideford, and South Molton. He also held meetings at Ilfracombe, Lymouth, Tiverton, Crediton, and at the latter place formed a New Association in connexion with the South Devon and Exeter Auxiliary. In these exertions he was aided by the Rev. J. W. Watts, B. A., Curate of Thorne Falcon, Somerset; and many other kind friends. The Rev. J. W. Watts also advocated the cause of the Society in Newport Chapel of Ease and Pilston Church.

Mr. Codner likewise visited Exeter a second time, and procured the patronage of the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Exeter, and the assistance of a great number of the clergy in that city.

These exertions of Mr. Codner, as well as those of the Rev. H. Budd, produced considerable additions to the funds of the Society; and the Committee cannot sufficiently acknowledge their kindness in thus renewing their exertions in a cause in which they have laboured so long and so much.

Your Committee also thankfully acknowledge their renewed obligations to the Rev. D. Nantes, Rector of Powderham; who attended meetings at Exeter, Teignmouth, and

Plymouth; the Rev. J. W. Watts, for the services already named, as well as for his exertions at Wellington and Taunton; and to Captain Miller for attending the meeting at Totness. The Rev. H. Stowell, of Manchester, Rev. S. R. Capel, of Salisbury, and Rev. W. R. Payne, R. N., have likewise advocated the cause of the Society, and are entitled to their sincere thanks.

The Committee feel that the grateful acknowledgments of the Society are eminently due to all, both clergy and others, who have aided the cause either by opening their Churches, or procuring public meetings, or soliciting subscriptions, being aware that these are the means alone by which the Institution can be upheld or enlarged.

The City of London Ladies Auxiliary, and the Camberwell Ladies Association, have continued their kind and valuable labours. A new Ladies Association has been formed this Spring, denominated the Tulse Hill, Stockwell and Brixton, which promises to be a useful branch of the Society.

The Committee have further to acknowledge the receipt of several liberal donations.

In an early part of the year, your Committee requested the Rev. H. Budd to accept the office of one of their Vice Presidents on his retirement from London and vacating his seat in the Committee.

The Committee, having now endeavoured to discharge the pleasing duty of acknowledging the obligations they are under for the aid afforded during the past year, cannot close their Report without appealing to their friends to make new exertions for obtaining enlarged funds, and more particularly in the form of annual subscriptions. They would fain believe that if every member of the Society would kindly undertake to state its claims to their several friends many new members might be

procured, and the efficiency of the Society be maintained or even increased.

There is one feature in the claims of this Society at this time, to which the Committee beg particular attention; this is the amount raised in the Colony in behalf of the Society. In the first year the receipts in the Colony only amounted to $58l. 6s.$ In the year ending 25th May, 1832, they were $475l. 1s. 3d.$; and it is expected they will exceed that sum this year.

Thus the benevolent exertions of this country in behalf of her Colony has induced the inhabitants themselves to join in the work, and every succeeding year has brought additional support from that quarter; so that there is ground to hope that the time may not be very distant when some of the Schools may be wholly maintained by the inhabitants of the place in which they are located. With this prospect it would be exceedingly painful, as well as ungrateful, considering the obligations of this country to Newfoundland, to withhold that measure of aid which they at present require for the support of existing Schools.

Your Committee, therefore, entreat most earnestly your renewed exertions and prayers in behalf of this Society; and they call upon those of their fellow Christians who have not yet joined them in this work and labour of love, to co-operate with them without delay; and they feel they cannot do this better than by employing the language used in an appeal made a few months ago by the North Devon and Barnstaple Auxiliary to this Society. " You acknowledge the duty of sending the Scriptures to the heathen; you recognise the general principle of instruction in all your charities; will you not extend the application of it to our own Colonies—our own by possession, our own by consanguinity? Shall the remotest regions of the globe come within the excursive range of our benevolence, and shall those of our own empire, living under the same laws, and bound to us by the closest ties, be over-

looked ? We would not restrain the smallest portion of that love which is now going forth unto the uttermost parts of the earth : we would only beg it to take in the hundreds of thousands of our own kindred, who are daily perishing for lack of knowledge in the wilds of British North America ; and as there is no other way of remedying their wretchedness, but by laying the foundation of moral and religious education, let this Society become the object of your support ; and suffer not the tenantless School-Rooms, which the poor Newfoundlanders has raised in faith, to be emblems of the void in British hearts, and to proclaim the coldness of our love and zeal. Every argument that is used in support of the circulation of the Bible, of religious education, of missionary zeal, of philanthropic energies, precisely applies to the objects of this Society. Help them, therefore, to extend the blessings of education, and to impart a blessing beyond all physical improvements of the country—the blessing of the knowledge of those Scriptures through which the Sun of Righteousness may rise on the benighted shores, and springs of living water may break out in the desert."
