General Agent, Originator of the Century Fund and Chief Financier of the Denomination's Many Interests, Succumbs After Long lilness.







ROSEN ANDTAKAHIRA SIGN RATIFICATIONS OF TREATY

final Chapter of Bloody Russian-Japanese War Enacted Saturday at Washington.

Washington, Nov. 25 .- Without formality the final chapter in the bloody war between Russia and Japan was enacted in the diplomatic room of the state department this afternoon, when at 4.05 o'clock Baron Rosen, the Russian ambassador, and Mr. Takahira, the Japanese minister, on behalf of their respective sovereigns exchanged ratifications of the treaty of Portsmouth, which was signed sept. 5 last. The only witnesses were Prince Kudachoff, the secretary of the Russian ambessador, who was with him at 19410 when the war began and again served when the war began and again served as one of the omean secretaries thruout the peace conference at Portsmouth, and Mr. Host, counsellor and secretary of the Japanese legation.

Five minutes before 4 o'clock Baron Rosen reached the department, accompanied by Prince Kudachon, bearing the ratification of the Emperor Nicholas. Three minutes later Mr. Takania arrived with Mr. Hioki, who carried the ratification of Emperor Mutsunito. arrived with Mr. Hioki, who carried the ratification of Emperor Mutsunito. They met in the antercom of the diplomatic reception room, where they shook hands cordially and then passed into the office of the second assistant secretary of state, Mr. Adee, to whom they paid their respects, going thence into the diplomatic room. Seated about the long table Baron Rosen and Mr. Takahica at once fell to work, signing the protocol of the ratifications in duplicate.

While Baron Rosen was signing the Russian and French translations of the Russian ratification, Mr. Takanira was affixing his signature to the Japanese and English copies. Mr. Takanira signed with the pen he had used in signing the treaty at Portsmouth. Baron Rosen used one he found on the table especially placed there by Mr. Baron Rosen used one he found on the table, especially placed there by Mr. Adee's messenger. This pen is known as an "Old Glory" pen, the handle being painted red, white and blue. Mr. Takahira preserved his pen, that used by Baron Rosen was lett in the diplomatic room.


