CECIL RHODES KEEPS SILENCE

London, July 20.—The casualty lists received tonight at the War Office indicate that a party of South African Constabulary, which was ambushed near Petrusburg, July 26, that two members of the party were killed, one was dangerously wounded and 17 are missing and are believed to have been taken prisoners by the Boers.

The most general interpretation is that Lord Rosebery intended to appeal to the Liberal-Unionists and the Liberal-Republicans to form a new party, but there is no sign, as yet, of a spontaneous response.

View That Judgments of Courts of Friendly Countries Should Go In Ontario May Now be Changed—Bigamy Case That is Pending Put in Evidence.

RUSSELL BIGAMY CASE DECISION MAY AFFECT SOME TORONTIANS

The judgment in the Russell divorce case is causing some stir in certain Canadian society and other circles. Owing to the expense and difficulty of procuring a divorce from the Dominion of Canada, it is a number of instances, taken advantage of the United States Divorce Courts, where, on comparatively slight grounds in some States, divorce judgments are obtainable after a short residence for a moderate amount of costs. The view which has been taken by the courts of friendly civilized countries should respect each other's judgments. This goes-on-please system has resulted in some Canadians, after a few weeks residence in America, either procuring divorces, and returning to Canada, taking up their residence here in fancied security from prosecution.

Decision Anticipated.

New York, July 20.—(Special)—The leading problem connected with the Philippine administration is nearing a solution. The American state will be naturally conducting the case with much secrecy, but, generally speaking, its plan is to have the Spanish priests and brothers withdrawn, and American priests, who would be mostly of Irish and French antecedents, but in sympathy with American institutions, take their places. This, of course, will be done thru the church authorities. The Philippine people are not opposed to the Catholic Church, as such, but to the Spanish priest, and the native Catholic priests are held in high esteem. The withdrawal of the Spanish priests going to the island with the union of the American state will be acceptable. The Roman Catholic authorities realize that they must concede something to the American state, and are making inquiries, and they are understood to be well satisfied to withdraw their Spanish priests, and to have the American priests take their places.

INSIST ON MONROE DOCTRINE

United States Will Not Dictate to Pan-American Congress Except as to This.

Central and South American Countries Will Be Free to Reject All Other Proposals.

New York, July 20.—(Special)—It is officially stated that the United States government has no intention of trying to dominate the Pan-American Congress, which is to convene in the City of Mexico in October. The United States has formulated a tentative program merely, and Central and South American representatives will have the right to accept, reject or amend it. The United States representatives in the Congress will be on an equal footing with those of the other countries. The United States will insist on maintaining, and that concerns the Monroe Doctrine. The United States will not insist on any other country represented will oppose it.

THE PROPOSED MILITARY REVIEW.

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

RAPID MAIL TO EUROPE. One Who Experimented on the Washington Express for Final Disposition. Indianapolis, July 21.—Habiil Frey of Washab, who sent a letter to the Post-office authorities in Washington, offering to explain a method by which mail can be transmitted to Europe in two days, said today that he regretted that the authorities at Washington had not regarded his communication as confidential, because he had not intended to publish the matter until his offer was accepted and a test made.

MODERN SCHOOLS IN RUSSIA. St. Petersburg, July 21.—The Minister of Education has elaborated plans to modernize the intermediate schools. In accepting these plans, the Emperor expressed a wish that particular attention should be given to the study of the sciences, physical education, gymnastics, physical exercises, manual games, excursions and other practical training.

ON LONDON EXCHANGE. London, July 21.—The stock exchange, after beginning the week that has just passed with about the worst possible prospects, ended it with a decidedly more cheerful tone. Among the numerous dealers in the market, the morning and the early part of the week were the adverse reports from the United States, and the strike in the United States of Great Britain, the weak position of the South African war, and the capture of the correspondence from the Argentine.

RUSSIA'S STATE GIN SHOPS. St. Petersburg, July 21.—The extension of Russia's State brandy monopoly has caused the closing down of hundreds of distilleries and 15,000 private gin shops, mainly games, excursions and other practical training. The study of the classics will be curtailed, and more attention given to the study of the elements of law, instruction in modern languages and additional work in Russian history, mathematics, geography and natural science.
