Harrison Masceau Nearly Exhausted When Rescued

PERILIOUS TASK

Mildred Meade and Mary Donovan, Pulled From Water, Suffer Little

WILLIAM BACON, a young man of Belleview avenue, in the Indiantown district, was the means of saving the lives of Mildred Meade, aged 18, also of Belleview avenue, daughter of Harry Meade; Mary Donovan, a companion of the Meade girl and daughter of Patrick Donovan, Belleview ave as well as Harrison Masceau of Spar Cove road, fireman on the steamer Majestic. All three were rescued yesterday from the waters of Indiantown Creek, the ice of which had been

eemed strong enough for skating.
There were about 20 people skatng at the time on this narrow width of ice between the rocky hills of Spar Cove Road and the rear of Victoria cove Hoad and the rear of victoria street, what is known as the Lower Milldam, a creek considerd dangerous for skating purposes because of its proximity to Indiantown harbor, depth of salt water and the influence of flowing and ebbing tides upon the stability of the surface.

John Lunney, a resident of Spar Cove Road, had crashed through the ice at a point near his own home and William Bacon was hurrying towards his friend to help him out of the water, which was shoulderhigh at this point. Noticing that Lunney was wading ashore unassisted, Bacon skated upstream again. As he approached the Upper Milldamhe noticed Mildred Meade disappear through a hole in the ice and in sinking clutch the outstretched hand of Miss Donovan. Both girls were immediately immersed in nine feet of water.

Mr. Masceau, who happened to be near the girls when they went through, skated close to the edge and reached towards them as far as he could. The strain upon the ice in his efforts to save the girls caused another collapse of the surface and Masceau too was also soon struggling in the water. In these few seconds of danger Bacon rushed to the large hole and, lying down, reached with a three-foot stick to save the girls.

The Competitor, 2,216 tons, was bound from Port Natal for Las Palmas, Canary Islands, and on Saturday, was sending out S. O. S. calls about 75 miles south of Algoa Bay. A vigorous search is proceeding.

Somebody shoved a plank offshore and the almost helpless man wrapped his arms around it and thus drawn to safety.

A Happy Marriage is What Every Human Heart Craves, an d While Few May Be Lucky Enough to Find Their Ideal Mate, Yet Imperfection and the Consolation Prize of Children are Worth the Gamble.

"IF YOU want to be happy, is it better to marry or stay single?" asks a correspondent.



In spite of the fact that marriage has in it the potentialities of heaven or hell, and that one marriage out of every twelve ends in divorce, the risks are worth taking.

This is what every heart craves. It is what every man and woman seeks, and a few are lucky enough to find. It is because the capital prize in the matrimonial lottery is so great and rich that it makes it worthwhile to take a chance in the greatest gamble on earth.

BUT even those whose matches were not made in heaven, even those who get a pretty poor sort of makeshift, husbands and wives are, as a rule, happier than they would be single. The Creator, looking upon the first bachelor, saw that it was not good for man to be alone. Paradise was not paradise for him unless there was a woman in it, and so Adam was given a wife equipped with all the faults and virtues that have characterized wives ever since.

She lost the man his Garden of Eden home, and yet he was happier working and earning his bread by the sweat of his brow and blaming all of their troubles on her than he was as a rich and carefree single man living a lonely life of luxurious ease.

AND that state of affairs is typical still of the old maid and the old bachelor. The men and women who do not marry play safe. They take no risk on getting uncongenial husbands and wives. 

ALL THINGS MUST START WITH GOD

Science Fails to Tell Whence Thought and Its Growth

Declaring that evolution traced back the history of the world to the beginning but that it failed to explain that beginning, Rev. Dr. Clarence Mackinnon, president of Pine Hill Col'ege and President of the Maritime Conference of the United Church of Canada, gave an interesting address yesterday afternoon at a men's meeting in the Y. M. C. A. on the subject, "Evolution and the Uni-

John McKinnon, chairman of the religious work committee of the Y. M. C. A., presided. The scripture reading and prayer were offered by Rev. H. A. Goodwin and Rev. Hugh Miller gave the benediction. C. R. Mersereau sang a solo.

Rev. Dr. Mackinnon, in opening his remarks, likened some rudimentary organs, or vestigia, to the unused buttons on the back of dress coats, in that both had once had uses. It was the place of science to trace back from these things to find the history of things as they were at present.

present.

He called on his hearers to remember that, although this theoretical history might be accurate, it was not an explanation of how things began. To get such an explanation they must go back to God.

Dr. Mackinnon divided his remarks into three branches, those of matter, life and man

THEORY EVOLVED. In speaking of matter, as the earth itself, the planets and other material inorganic things, scientists had now evolved a theory that, in the beginning there was nothing but hydrogen and that atoms of this hydrogen had combined in various numbers and formations to make other elements and chemical combinations that had led to the earth, planets, sun and other things as they were known now.

This was all right as a history, he said, but did the people believe that these atoms sorted themselves into their present shapes. There must have been in the original atom all the votentialities to make the splendid outcome. Who had put them there, he asked, if God had not.

Life was said by the scientists to have been the outcome of one life germ which, in the struggle for existence, had spread out and divided in a manner similar to that which the single cell of a rose embryo increased and divided until it became a plant.

NEW RAILWAY METHODS FOR CHINA



Forecasting a new period of industrial activity and commercial enterprise in the bac'cward, old world country of China, several brilliant Chinese students are in Montreal at present at the head office of the Canadian Pacific Railway investigating the systematic organization which is to be introduced into China.

Efficient transportation is now considered a vital factor in the development of the country and the Chinese Government Railways have given the students instructions to study all branches of railroading. The thirteen Chinese have divided between them their tasks consisting of learning the various branches of mechanics, accounting, freight and passenger traffic, operating, stores and supplies. They will remain here for about a year and a half, having arrived on September 14.

Many of the methods used in this country are certain to be impractical in China, but it is understood that of the vast store of railroad knowledge these students will acquire, they will be able to pick out many plans adaptable in their country. From Canada they intend to go to the United States for a few weeks, then to Europe for two months, before returning to their home where they will take up allotted tasks in the service of the Government Railways.
