German Troops Begin Evacuation of Brussels

Civilian Population Are Not Being Driven Out
Guns From British Ships Trained on Retreating Huns in Belgium; French Cavalry Reported at Outskirts of Ghent; Thiel is Won

Amsterdam, Oct. 19.—(By the Associated Press)—The evacuation of Brussels by the Germans has already been begun, according to M. Heinrich, an Activist Belgian deputy.

With the Allied Forces in Flanders, Oct. 18, 10 p.m.—(By the Associated Press)—French cavalry were reported tonight to have reached the outskirts of Ghent. There is no official confirmation.

The reports indicate a continuation of the rapid Allied advance in the Belgian coast sector. The British are meeting with little opposition in the Lille salient and to the northward.

London, Oct. 19, 1 p.m.—(By the Associated Press)—The Germans were still holding the outskirts of Zebrugghe this morning, although the Belgian forces in their eastward advance had reached the Zebrugghe-Bruges Canal.

WARSHIPS SHELL FLEEING ENEMY
With the Allied Armies in France and Belgium, Friday, Oct. 18.—(By the Associated Press, 10 p.m.)—British and American troops southeast of Leateau captured 1,200 prisoners and 120 guns to-day and have advanced about four miles since the attack began yesterday morning.

The speed with which the German armies are retreating from Belgium and Northern France makes it appear that they are twice as anxious to get out of the country as they were in 1917.

FRENCH CAPTURE THIELT
London, Oct. 19.—The French have captured the town of Thielt, in Belgium, west of Ghent, and have passed on 2,000 yards east of the town.

GAINS NEAR LECATEAU
London, Oct. 18.—The British are continuing their advance in Flanders north of the Sambre Canal, to Field Marshal Haig announced today. Southeast of Leateau, where British and American troops are operating based and Manstein have been captured.

LINE FROM DOUAI TO LILLE
British Headquarters in France, Oct. 18.—(Reuter's)—British troops hold an almost straight line north and south between Douai and Lille this afternoon.

FRENCH REACH SAMBRE CANAL
Paris, Oct. 19.—The French continue successfully their advance south of Wasigny and east of Guise, according to the war office statement today.

ENEMY LOSSES ENORMOUS AS THEY FLEE FROM BELGIAN COAST

Allies Pumping Shells into Narrowing Bottle Neck
HUNS NOW KNOW WAR IS LOST

Documents Found Show Feeling of Despondency—Jubilant in Lille Duplicated Throughout the Free District—German Officers at "Peace" Dance When Courtrai Taken

With the Allied Armies in Belgium, Oct. 18.—(By the Associated Press)—Lille is fast being left behind by the advancing fifth British army.

Today has been fine and clear and the Belgian airmen have again come into their own. The Belgian sky has been literally full of them and they have worked great havoc with bombs and bullets among the enemy forces fleeing through the gap between Bruges and the Dutch frontier.

More than 1,000 prisoners were taken last night and today they have been purging the bottle neck through which the Germans are retreating.

The number of Germans killed in this area is, of course, undetermined, but from the amount of explosive projectiles, large and small, dropped on them, their losses must be tremendous.

Paying High Price. The German army is paying a high price for its attempts to retain its hold on the city of Belgium.

Count Von Waldersede of the 9th regiment, who was killed in action, was reported to have been killed in the assault referred to in the preceding paragraph.

Cases In The City Now Number 400

More Likely Added Before Night
REPORTS FROM OUTSIDE

Twenty Districts Heard From, Out of 140, and Show More Than 1,500 Cases.—The Health Act—Chairman, Daniel Speaks of Matter of Special Hospital

An even four hundred cases of influenza have been reported to the Board of Health up to lunch hour today, and it is understood there are yet numerous cases to be entered upon the record before three o'clock.

This new number today makes a 24-hour jump of sixty-eight cases. Still St. John is far below what is considered a proportion of cases in keeping with the sweep of the disease in localities large and small.

The vital statistics of this week for this city give a total of thirty-four deaths. Of this aggregate only five were due to influenza and nine to pneumonia.

Chief Health Officer Melvin was this morning almost inundated with letters and reports from the various sections of the province.

It is significant to learn that out of twenty districts compiled by noon hour today, the total of cases in eight exceeds 1,500.

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Wilson Reply To Dual Monarchy

Must Satisfy The Aspirations of People
THEY TO BE THE JUDGES

Resignation of Baron Burian Reported—Report Says Germany Will Deeny Cruelty Charges—Hope to Continue Negotiations

Washington, Oct. 19.—President Wilson has rejected the Austro-Hungarian government's offer to conclude an armistice and negotiate peace on principles enunciated by him and has given notice that mere autonomy for Austria's subject nationalities is no longer acceptable.

Washington, Oct. 19.—President Wilson has answered the peace note of Austria-Hungary with a declaration that the Austro-Hungarian government must satisfy the national aspirations of its own people and that they, the people, shall be the judges of their rights and destinies.

The reply was made by Secretary Lansing yesterday through the Swedish minister in Washington. It calls attention to the tenth condition of peace enunciated by President Wilson on Jan. 8, which says the people of Austria-Hungary should be accorded the freest opportunity of autonomous development.

The note calls attention to the recognition by the United States of the Czech-Slovak national council as a de facto belligerent government and states that the United States has also recognized the justice of the nationalistic aspirations of the Jugos-Slavs for freedom.

Basel, Oct. 18.—Baron Burian, the Austrian premier, has resigned, according to Vienna newspapers.

Copenhagen, Oct. 19.—Germany's reply to President Wilson, it is said by the Politiken will demand the president's accusation of German cruelties and declare the submarine warfare cannot be stopped so long as there is no agreement as to an armistice.

Copenhagen, Oct. 19.—The German war cabinet met at 8 o'clock last evening to decide the definite form of the German answer to President Wilson.

Berne, Oct. 18.—The German reply to President Wilson will not be completed and dispatched for several days, according to the latest Berlin advices. It is expected that the Reichstag will be summoned to meet on Tuesday.

The grand admiral of the fleet and the chief of the naval staff have arrived in Berlin for consultation.

It is believed that the reply will be neither a full acceptance nor a refusal but worded so that the door will be left open for further negotiations.

Paris, Oct. 18.—German artillery and German airplanes entered Paris this morning but they were drawn by French horses or piloted by French aviators.

In the Place de La Concorde these tangible proofs of Marshal Foch's victorious offensives are to be seen. More than fifty cannon with the mud of the Year or the chalk of Champagne still clinging to their wheels are being exhibited to enthusiastic Parisians.

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THE CANADIANS FIRST IN DOUAI

Fog Helped Enemy in Retreat Movement
CROSSING SENSEE CANAL

Cavalry Seeking Germans Found Them in Full Retreat—Only At One Place Was Resistance Reported Serious

With the Canadian Forces, Oct. 18.—(By J. P. B. Lysons, Correspondent of the Canadian Press)—The anticipated withdrawal of the Boche from this sector took place yesterday forenoon and by evening we had pushed in several miles in pursuit.

Either by luck or through his excellent meteorological service the enemy was favored with the same conditions of fog that enabled him to make his famous retreat of 1917.

The enemy put up an admirable piece of bluff when, at 5 o'clock yesterday morning, he made a false attack on the line of the Canal de La Senne we held south of Douai, employing large numbers of machine guns, to which we replied with a counter-barrage.

Another Canadian division on the right crossed at Brunmont and east of Frechain and by night we had established a line well to the east which today we pushed on his way to far off Siberia.

There was in Prussia, in 1866, a radical party, but the war with Austria, which added more territory to the duchies of Schleswig-Holstein, already taken from Denmark, completely dashed its hopes.

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THE APPEAL TO CANADA. The Dominion of Canada, in order to do her duty in the war, and also keep business conditions at home in a condition of prosperity, must raise \$500,000,000.

Canada cannot be placed in England or the United States, for those countries are under the same burden of necessity arising from the war.

Canada is spending vast sums now to guarantee their future from spoliation by the Hun.

But Canada can borrow this money from her own people. They have it, for they are very prosperous.

It is a question of making them see the need and the urgency of it, and their fidelity to the men who are offering or have given their lives for Canada will ensure the subscription of the whole amount.

It is not as if the government were embarking upon an enterprise that might be deferred. The money must be raised. The war will not wait.

The Victory Loan offers a good return to the investor, and the Dominion of Canada as security. It will not be enough, however, for people to invest merely the surplus they may have been thinking of investing here or there.

They must pinch themselves a little, in order to be able to buy another Victory Bond. It will always be to them a source of the highest gratification that they did this for Canada, for the men at the front, and for the cause of civilization. Now is it itself-denial. It is good business.

ENEMY LOSSES ENORMOUS AS THEY FLEE FROM BELGIAN COAST. (Continued from page 1) This officer ordered all auxiliary services in the assistance of the infantry in the line "which needs all the support imaginable." Count Von Waldseeer discloses some German ideas relative to the gaining of time in which to prepare defence that may be valuable in view of Germany's efforts to secure an armistice or peace.

"Wherever defences are of a temporary nature," he said, "they must, if the enemy leaves us sufficient time, be continually improved and strengthened in accordance with the principles laid down for defensive fighting."

"The enemy's greatest successes have strengthened his consciousness of superiority," this commander very frankly said. "The strength and condition of our troops cannot be unknown to him, and there is no doubt that he possesses the means to overcome the difficulties which confront him."

Know War Is Lost. It would appear from documents that the German army knew that it had lost the war and is blue over the fact. German soldiers on the battlefield have shown unusual consideration for civilians. No one in French and English has been found at Dignes informing civilians that they would not be moved east of the money railway. Of course the Allied guns would not fire on towns known to be full of defenceless civilians.

TAKE OPEN AIR TREATMENT FOR INFLUENZA

The Massachusetts department of health has introduced a revolutionary system of hospitalization for the treatment of persons afflicted with influenza and pneumonia, which has reduced the mortality from forty per cent to less than thirteen per cent in a four weeks' battle with the worst epidemic which has ever ravaged that state.

This new and successful remedy is very simple. Open air and sunshine are its chief components. Twelve days or so ago, at points where the epidemic had the tightest grip, the state health authorities established camp hospitals employing this treatment. The patients are being cared for in tents and airy wooden shacks, with not more than two to a section. During the hours of daylight, the cots are carried into the open and the results are marvelous. Patients, whose temperatures ran from 102 to 104 while in indoor hospitals, have soon returned to normal after being taken outdoors. Respiration and pulse-rate have shown similar improvement. It is believed that this new hospitalization plan will serve as a model for other communities fighting the disease. Its efficacy has been completely proven at the Camp Brooks Emergency Hospital, Corey Hill, Brookline, at the Receiving Ship, Commonwealth Pier, at Lawrence, and at Gloucester, which was virtually cleaned up. Public sentiment at first condemned the new treatment as barbarous and cruel, but results have made it very popular.

The situation as viewed by Massachusetts State Commissioner of Health Kelley is summarized in a statement as follows:

least population was stricken within forty-eight hours. The principles of open air treatment are in full operation there and their mortality of less than 7 per cent of those attacked was wholly confined to patients who also were in advanced stages of their original malady.

The most striking feature of outdoor treatment has been the almost constant drop in the patient's temperature to normal within a few hours. A series of charts taken at random from the records of open tent hospitals shows a practically universal drop from 102 deg. or 104 deg. to 97 deg. after a few hours of sunshine and fresh air.

The increased number of patients suffering from influenza at the military hospital on Partridge Island and the illness of one of the nurses made it necessary to call in the help of two more of the V. A. D. members of the local St. John Ambulance brigade yesterday.



SPENT NIGHT IN CELL,
DIED THE NEXT DAY

A series of tragic circumstances preceded the death of George Hartley Kimball, an employee of the Standard, which occurred on Thursday night. Several weeks ago Kimball was taken to the hospital suffering from a self-inflicted wound in the neck. He was discharged from the hospital on Wednesday morning to have the wound dressed again. Leaving the hospital, he proceeded to the police station to secure the keys of his trunk. Here he was detained until the ordinary business of the court was completed and then was taken before the magistrate on the charge of attempting to take his own life. When he was remanded to jail, Kimball asked that a doctor be summoned as he was not in condition to stand confinement in the cells. A telephone message was left for Dr. Bishop, which the doctor has said he did not receive. On Thursday morning Dr. G. O. Baxter was summoned and, after examining the prisoner, he certified that the jail was no place for him. Kimball was released on Thursday afternoon and returned to the home of his brother-in-law, H. S. Reid, Main street. Soon after he had retired that night he came from his room, apparently choking, and made signs for a drink of water, which he was unable to swallow when it was offered. The ambulance was summoned to convey him to the hospital, but he died as the vehicle reached the institution. An autopsy is being made to determine the cause of his death.

FASHION ARMOR FOR TROOPS
IN ANCIENT SHOP

For several months the armor workshop in the Metropolitan Museum of Art at New York, which dates to the fifteenth century and was brought to this country from France in 1851, re-assembled, has been a busy place, says the November Popular Mechanics Magazine. There, surrounded by tools, anvils, and armor of the early centuries, a French armor maker, Daniel Tachaux, whose forbears for generations have clung to the dead trade of the armorer, is working under the supervision of the ornamental department. He is endeavoring to develop practical armor that will turn machine-gun bullets. Already twenty-five different types of experimental armor defenses for Yankee soldiers have been patterned. Even arm and leg guards are included in these defensive devices, all of which are adaptations of designs worked out in the days when knights wore suits of steel.





Busy in Army Kitchen When German Shell Struck the Place

Mrs. Rees Thomas of Drury Lane, who was advised recently of the death of her husband at the front, has received through the records office in Ottawa, fuller details of the circumstances surrounding his death. The official record is as follows:

"Private R. Thomas was cooking in company kitchen in the vicinity of Mercate front on June 26, 1918, when a shell came into the kitchen, killing him instantly."

"When he met his death, Private Thomas was serving with the New Brunswick infantry battalion."

DUTCH READY TO CARE FOR FUGITIVES FROM BELGIUM

Amsterdam, Oct. 19.—The Dutch government is prepared to care for fugitives entering Holland from Belgium, according to a statement made by Premier de Borenbrouck, in the chamber yesterday. He added that the government would feed, clothe and care for these victims of the war.

BOY SHOT; IS IN HOSPITAL AT POINT OF DEATH

Two Men Sent Bullets Into Barn Where Geo. Rogers Was Working

TRAGEDY IN BARNESVILLE

Warrants Out and Constable Seek John Verner and Hugh McDermott—Shots Were Fired From Vehicle on Road

George Rogers, aged thirteen years, lies at the point of death in the General Public Hospital as the result of shooting at his home in Barnesville, Kings county, on Tuesday afternoon. The young lad is suffering from the effects of a rifle shot wound, the bullet having entered the hip and passed into his abdomen, lodging there. Meanwhile, constables are searching for the miscreants who shot him.

The information received by the Kings county authorities makes the case appear a most peculiar one.

On Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock the boy was at work in his father's barn threshing buckwheat. While he may not have been visible to passersby on the road, which is about 100 yards distant, it is said that there could be no doubt that the noise of the threshing operations could be heard so clearly that any one passing must have known that he was there.

The shots, one of which took effect, were fired by two young men who were driving past. Without any known motive, they are said to have raised their rifles, one a Mauser and the other a .243 bore rifle, and each fired two shots at the barn. Without stopping to investigate the results of their act, they drove along and disappeared.

The victim of this wanton attack is the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Rogers. His father is seriously ill and is not expected to recover, and the boys have been carrying on the work of the farm. Some time after the shooting the boy was found by his brother in the barn, suffering from the severe wound. He was carried into the house, where his wound was stanchied and the next day he was driven to Hampton, where the case was treated by Dr. J. Newton Smith. Owing to the seriousness of the case Doctor Smith advised that the boy be brought to the hospital in St. John. The trip was made in an automobile, the injured lad, accompanied by his brother, Joseph, arriving at the institution at midnight.

Immediate action was necessary in order to save life and Dr. A. E. Macaulay and Dr. Henry Hedder, superintendent of the hospital, operated. It was found that the bullet had penetrated the left hip and entered the abdomen but had not seriously injured the vital organs. At the time the lad's condition was so critical that no hopes were entertained for his recovery but since then he has been a slight improvement and he now is said to have a fighting chance.

On his return to Kings county, Joseph Rogers laid information against John Verner, aged twenty, and Hugh McDermott, aged twenty-three years, both of Great Hill, St. John county. Arrangements were complete yesterday and today constables are searching for the boys. Information received at Hampton by Magistrate Frank Maclellan indicates that they still are in the neighbourhood and it is expected that they will be apprehended before the day is over.

ST. JOHN YOUNG MAN IS DEAD IN CUBA
Harold Bruce McKendrick Dies in Attack of Influenza—Had Brilliant Business Career

The news of the death of Harold Bruce McKendrick, son of Dawson McKendrick, assistant superintendent of the railway mail service here, was received this morning by cablegram from Cuba. Although he had been away from St. John for a considerable period Mr. McKendrick still had many friends here who will mourn his death with deep regret and in their bereavement his family will have the sincere sympathy of all who know him. He was a bright young man of fine character and disposition, with prospects of a brilliant future, and his death at the early age of twenty-nine years comes as a great shock.

Influenza, which is prevalent in Cuba, was responsible for his death and he passed away at a town in the northern part of the island, where he had gone on a business trip. During his illness he was attended by Mrs. Moore, wife of the senior member of the firm with which he was connected, who remained with him until the end and from whom the advice of his death was received.

The announcement that he had passed away was the first intimation his family had of his illness. A letter was received from him only a few days ago and at the time of writing he was in unusual health. In this letter he told of assisting the British consul in Cuba in recruiting the British consular in Cuba in military duty.

Mr. McKendrick has cable instructions to have the body sent home if possible, but it is understood that the health regulations of the island republic will make this impossible and that the interment will be made in Cuba.

After graduating from the local high school Mr. McKendrick entered the employ of the Royal Bank of Canada. He was with the St. John office for several years and then was transferred to Montreal. Five or six years ago he was sent to the main office of the bank in Havana, Cuba, and afterwards acted as manager of branches in Camaguey, Cienfuegos and Santiago. Later he went to Cienfuegos to open a branch and remained there a year.

Serving his connection with the bank, Mr. McKendrick joined the staff of Moore & Reid, a firm carrying on extensive lumber operations in Cuba, and had been a valued member of the staff until the time of his death.

Besides his parents, he is survived by one brother, Lieut. Roy H. McKendrick, now overseas with a siege battery, and one sister, Miss Marion at home.
