GERMAN LINE IN RUSSIA



CROSS HALF MILE OF NO MAN'S LAND, CANADIANS CARRY OUT THEIR MOST SUCCESSFUL RAID YET

Prisoners Taken, Enemy Killed, Dug-outs Blown Up and Much Damage Done Hun Positions—A Glorious Surprise Attack

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, Mar. 17.—(By W. A. Willson, Special Correspondent of the Canadian Press)—Nineteen prisoners taken; twenty Germans killed by rifle fire or bayonet; others blown up in their dug-outs, and an indefinite number wounded—such is the record of twenty-five minutes' work of our infantry in front of Orcourt this morning. In addition, an enemy machine gun was captured; his forward rear assembly area and communications shelled and gassed by our heavy; his field guns swept by our machine guns and shelled by our trench mortars. The raid was one of the most successful in Canadian history. Our men, in moving to the attack, had to cross half a mile of No Man's Land. This difficult manoeuvre over the machine gun swept area was carried out with complete success. Just before the raiders attacked a regular pitched battle was waged only 300 yards from the Canadian patrol by an enemy raiding party of double strength. When the miniature battle

machine guns were unusually quiet during the operations. Our raiders encountered scarcely any opposition in advancing to the enemy outpost positions. They then moved up a hostile trench to the Bosche, "a living line" where the party bombed their way along more than a quarter of a mile of trenches north and south. Enemy dugouts were blown up and the men who offered resistance were killed or captured or driven out, and some of the raiders went forward until they had penetrated to a depth of more than 200 yards behind the enemy line, making a total advance of more than 1,000 yards. One of our men, after three members of the enemy machine gun crew had been killed, ran up and bayoneted a fourth, put his gun over his shoulder and then tramped back over 800 yards of No Man's Land to the officer commanding his regiment, to whom he presented the gun as a memento.

Every detail of the morning's operations worked like clock work. The men, who had been carefully trained before the attack, were in the finest fighting form. Their only regret, as that of other raiders earlier in the week, is that the Hun did not make a better fight of it. During the retirement our men had passed through a very heavy barrage, but the whole operation, from beginning to end, was carried out with few casualties, the majority of them slight wounds. At daybreak, when all had quieted down, and the Hun was coming up from his dugouts, etc., all our guns along the front opened simultaneously with two minutes of gun fire, shot fast as guns could be worked. This hail of lead sent the enemy's front line of supports, reserve assembly areas, communications, and must have caused many orders taken and confusion. Prisoners were taken in great numbers, and the attack, and say that a careful plan had been made in the event of such operations, but the whole scheme failed at the test this morning, the enemy having been thrown into confusion. With the exception of one non-commissioned officer, the prisoners are poor specimens, having nothing like the physique or morale of our own troops.

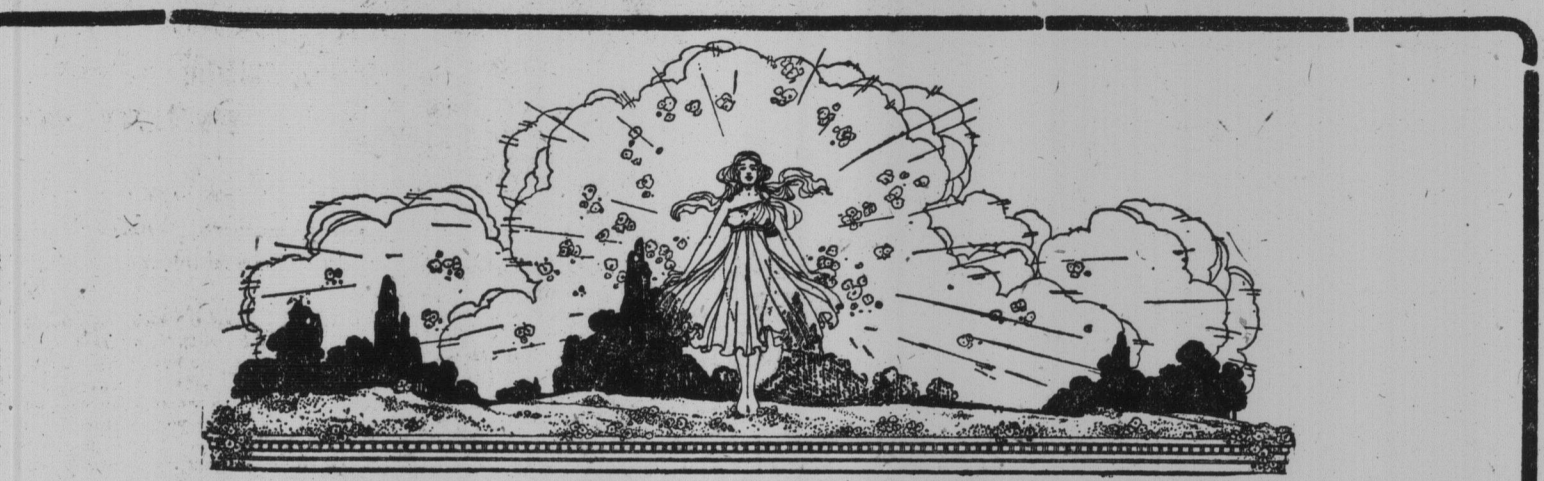

NO SILVER SPOON FOR BALL PLAYERS

Taxis, Late Mornings in B. and Other Luxuries Taboo in National League

Stars Denied Privileges—Recruits, Plodders, and Hard Workers Get Equal Recognition Under New Rules

New York, Mar. 14.—For the first time in the history of baseball, all players in the National League will be treated alike this season.

Hereafter the players will have to stop at the hotels designated by the clubs or their expense money will be with-hold.

There is one rule which is sure to bring forth a storm of protest from the superstitious players.

There is still another rule which says: "No player will be permitted to be included in public gross misconduct, including in public fighting, quarrelling, indecency or scandalous conduct."

The new rules hit the player pretty hard in the pocketbook, because there is provision that the players who are unable to perform their duties properly because of injury or illness not incurred in the discharge of their duties will not receive their salaries, or any allowance incident to such injury, for time incapacitated.

The rules relating to the firing of players will be strict. When a player is fired for using obscene language during a game the fine must be paid by the player and will not be refunded under any circumstances.

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THE WAR IN THE AIR

(Bangor Commercial.) There has of late been much activity in the air on the western front and behind that front.

While the Germans are hurling bombs from the air upon London and Paris the Allies have not been idle but have sent their airmen into Germany to attack the fortified places and those of military importance.

There is one distinct difference between this last raid of the Allies and those of the Germans. The Allied raid was made in the daytime, those of the Germans at night, a fact that demonstrates the superiority of the Allies in the air, and demonstrates this most clearly.

The air raids of the Allies are being carried on with a definite purpose, or rather two definite purposes. One is the destruction of important railway centers and depots behind the German lines in order to retard the dispatch of munitions and supplies to the front; the other, by assaults upon the airbases on the Belgian coast to hamper the air attacks launched by the Germans upon Metz and Tross, Bruges and the section around it, are the principal points of attack, and, according to dispatches from the front these are being attacked to good purpose.

It is reported that many railroad stations have been destroyed and the difficulties of Germany in regard to transportation have been greatly increased thereby.

There is no question that the railway facilities of Germany are steadily falling. By official orders the passenger traffic has been restricted to a minimum in order to afford relief to the freight congestion but it seems that there has been little relief.

That raids can be continually carried out at definite points known to the Germans, and some of these raids made in the daytime, thoroughly demonstrates the air superiority of the Allies. The raid upon London are of a different nature. They are undertaken in the night and only under the most favorable conditions.
