MINISTER SUCCEEDS IN SCALING McKINLEY

Archdeacon Stuck Reached Summit on June 7 — Height is 20,500 Feet

Kinley reached the sumit of the highest \$9,000 peak of the great mountain June 7, according to a private cable despatch re-

cording to a private cable despatch recivied here today.

The message which was ent by Archdeacon Stuck, from Fairbanks, said:

"Expedition successful. Accomplished first complete ascent of Mount McKinley June 7. H. P. Karstens, R. C. Tatum, Walter Harper, and I reached top of south (the highest of all peaks) on a clear day when it was possible to read all the angles of the mountain and other points and make certain that the peak we had conquered was the highest of all.

"We carried a mercurial barometer to the top and made complete readings and observations which with simultaneous readings at Gibben, should permit a close approximation of the true altitude when proper corrections are applied.
"Water boiled at 174.9 degrees. The present estimate of the summit's height is upwards of 20,500 feet.
"We were able to read angles on all prominent points. With field glasses we clearly saw the flag pole erected in 1910 by the Thomas Lloyd expedition on the north peak, (the lower of the two main peaks.)

RIBBON POTATOES

Ribbon potatoes are made by paring the potatoes round and round and frying like Saratoga chtps.

JELLY ROLL

Three well-beaten eggs, three table-spoonfuls sweet milk, one tablespoonful lemon extract, pinch of salt, one cup flour sifted with one teaspoonful baking powder bake in a thin sheet. When done spread with jelly and roll while still warm, then wrap in a clean cloth and set away until quite cold.

MOCK ANGEL FOOD

Set one cup sweet milk into a pan of boiling water and heat to boiling point. Into a sifter put one cup flour (no more), one cup sugar, three teaspoonfuls baking powder; sift all togther three times. Into this pour the cup of boiling milk and stir until smooth, then fold in the well-beaten whites of two eggs. Flavor with one-half teaspoonful each of lemon and vanilla extract. Do not grease the tin in which it is baked. Ice with simple white icing. Boil one cupful granulated sugar with one-half cupful of water until it spins a thread; pour over the beaten white of an egg. Beat till smooth.

Chesapeake Bay-Only One Res-


