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# LAWSAND REGULATIONS <br> OF THE 

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I. The designation of this Society shall be the British and Foreign Bible Society, of which the sole object shall be to encourage a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment : the only copies in the Languages of the United Kingdom, to be circulated by the Society, shall be the Authorized Version.
II. This Society shall add its endeavours to those employed by other Societies, for circulating the Scriptures through the British Dominions ; and shall also, according to its ability, extend its influence to other countries, whether Christian, Mahometan, or Pagan,
III. Each Subscriber of one Guinea annually shall be a Member.
IV. Each Subscriber of ten Guineas at one time shall be a Member for life.
V. Each Subscriber of Five Guineas annually shall be a Governor. VI. Each Subscriber of Fifty Pounds at one time, or who shall by one additional payment, increase his original Subscription to Fifty Pounds, shall be a Governor for life.

VIl. Governors shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.
VIII. An Executor, paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, shall be a Member for Life: or of One Hundred Pounds, a Governor for Life.
IX. A Committee shall be appointed to conduct the business of the Society, consisting of Thirty-six Laymen, Six of whom shall be Foreigners, resident in London or its vicinity ; half the remainder shall be members of the Church of England, and the other half members of other denominations of Christians. Twenty-seven of the above number, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election for the ensuing year.
The Committee shall appoint all officers, except the Treasurer, and call Special General Meetings, and shall be charged with procuring for the Society suitable patronage, both British and Foreign.
X. Each Mefber of the Society shall be entitled, under the direo tion of the Committee, to purchase Bibles and Testaments at the Society's prices, which shall be as low as possible.
XI. The Annual Mreeting of the Society shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, when the Treasurer and Committee shall be chosen, the Accounts presented, and the Proceedings of the foregoing year reported.
XII. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be considered, ex officio, Members of the Committee.
XIII. Every Clergyman or Dissenting Minister, who is a Member of the Society, shall be entitled to attend and vote at all Meetings of the Committee.
XIV. The -Secretaries for the time being shall be considered as Members of the Committee ; but no other person deriving any emolument from the Society, shall have that privilege.
XV. At the General Meetings, and Meetings of the Committee, the President, or in his absence, the Vice-President, first upon the list then present; and in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer ; and in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose,shall preside at the Meeting.
XVI. The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in every month, or oftener, if necessary.
XVII. The Committee shall have the power of nominating such persons as have rendered essential services to the Society, either Members for Life, or Governors for Life.
XVIII. The Committee shall also have the power of nominating Honorary Menbers from among Foreigners who have promoted the objects of the Society.
XIX. The whole of the Minutes of every Gencral Meeting shall be signed by the Chairman.
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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

I. This Society shall be called The Bible Society of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies̃ ; the object of which shall be the same as that of the British and Foreign Bible Society, viz. :-To encourage the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment, and to furnish copies of the Scriptures gratis to the indigent, and at reduced prices to those requiring them.
II. The business of this Society shall be conducted by a Presiden:, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary and Committee.
III. In order to give effect to the design of this Institution, benefactions and subscriptions shall be solicited, and books opened for receiving the names of benefactors and subscribers.
IV. Every person contributing annually Ten Shillings at one time, or a donation of Ten Pounds, shall be considered a Member of this
Society.
V. A general meeting of the Members of this Society shall be held every year, before which shall be laid the accounts and proceedings of
the preceding year.
VI. The whole of the subscriptions and donations, after deducting incidental expenses, shall be remitted annually, in aid of the funds of the British and Foreign Bible Society.

## VII. Every Member of this Society shall be entitled to purchase,

 under the direction of the Committee, Bibles and Testaments, at the reduced prices of the Society, which are as low as possible.VIII. The Committee shall be authorized to meet for the purpose of conducting the business of the Society, as often as may be necessary, and shall have power to add to their numbers, as occasion may require.

attention. The peculiarly unsettled state of the government had greatly impeded the work of the agent whom they had employed for so many years. A course of opposition to Bible circulation had commenced, and many and various had been the grounds alleged for recalling or discontinuing the authorization of the colporteurs. There has however, they observe, been one notable fact brought out by these difficulties, viz., the unquestioned excellence of the personal characters of these devoted men. This has beell attested by many Mayors and Prefects, and by the concurrent testimony of large bodies of persons in the districts in which they live. So strong have these representations been; that they have ended in a permission to prosecute their labours, often granted exclusively to them by military commanders. They report that in consequence of the difficulties referred to, the circulation of the scriptures during the past year had been seriously diminished. But yet amid the trials of his situation the agent mentions many encouragements.

The stagnation of business, he writes, has been attended by a good result, which I certainly ought not to pass by in silence. It is as follows:-Work being suspended, the work people have had a greater amount of leisure; this suspension of work was necessarily accompanied by a suspension of wages-it was consequently impossible for the greater number of them to seek recreation in the public-houses and other places of amusement. They were therefore compelled to stay at home, and, as I have been informed by colporteurs, in some places a Bible, in others a New Testament, purchased in more prosperous times, but which had been neglected for the very reason that the facilities for earning and spending money were so great, has been taken up and read by way of diversion. To this it is owing that a very large number of persons are met/with who at length make good use of, and seriously profit by the precious purchases which our colporteurs have caused them to effect, at a period perhaps long since passed by.

The agent further states that the fact has been now revealed that in France there are a number of persons, infinitely more extended than is imagined, who without epenly declaring what they really are, have been led to render to God the only worship which is agreeable to $\mathrm{Him}_{\text {, }}$ and this solely by the reading and study of the Holy Scriptures. A fact of this nature, he says, was recently communicated to me, and in cornection with it there was this circumstance, which will be, no doubt, of peculiar interest, namely, that the Bible which had become so precious to the family in question, was purchased some eighteen of twenty years ago of one of the agents of the society. The agent goes on further to observe, that it must not be forgotten, that the origin and immediate cause of those religious movements which during the last few years have'taken place in different parts of the country, must without exception be attributed to the distribution of Bibles and Nelt

Gospel are vigorously opposed, and that daily, by the literary hosts of Germany, and by that universally spread rationalism which has infused its baneful poisons into the last two generations, and is still malignantly active in all classes. We know howerer that the Word of God will gain the victory at last, though many years may be required to bring about this salutary change. In most of the schools the teachers are still infidels, and when the minds of the young have been systematically imbued with rationalism, the effects even of orthodox teaching from the pulpit, by a small proportion of the clergy, are comparatively little observed. At the same time, continues he, when I compare the present state of Christianity among the Protestants of this country with what it was in 1814, when I first visited Germany, there is a great change; then it was midnight darkness, now we have the morning dawn, and the number of those who hail it with gladness is daily increasing; and it is to the dissemination of the Word of God, under the teaching of the Divine Spinit, that they all look for bringing about a new Reformation.

Two colporteurs, who had been labouring in Franconia, were arrested at Bamberg, and finally expelled from Bavaria, so that now there remains but one in that kingdom, who is stationed at Augsburg: they left behind them 8,250 copies, ere their work was closed.

The Committee refer to Austria and Hungary with conflicting feelings. In the year 1850 an Agent was specially commissioned to superintend the renewal of the Society's work in these countries. No sooner had he reached Vienna than he put himself in communication with the properauthorities and sought to begin the business of distribution. The Government was unwilling to permit him to use his personal efforts in the work, but they allowed him to avail himself of the book trade and other legitimate channels. With this license he proceeded to primt several editions in the German, Bohemian, and Hungarian languages, and in the first six months of his residence be dispersed nearly $\mathbf{7 , 0 0 0}$ volumes. He continued his efforts both in printing and circulating until in the course of eighteen months upwards of 36,000 volumes had been distributed, besides 25,000 copies remaining unfinished.

The people were most eager to oblain the Word of Life, so eager that their desire is described es a "rage," a "famishing," but alas! the opposition of the Authorities was soon awakened and the books denounced. Shortly after the Government interfered more actively, and the depots were closed at their several places. The Agent applied to the British Ambassador, and the Parent Committee appointed a deputation to wait upon Lord Malmesbury, the then Secretary for Foreign affairs, for the purpose of claiming an idemnity from the Austrian government for the joss they had sustained. Notwithstanding these efforts, the Austrian gevernment refused any compensation for the loss, but consented to resign the depots with all their contents, provided the books were withdrawn from the country; to which the Committee were obliged to nceede.

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In Switzerland and Italy the work continues amid many difficulties, particularly in the latter country. The Committee have appointed Lieutenant Grayden, who had been previously so conspicuous, as their regular Agent in these countries. In Switzerland the work of dissemination had been greatly curtailed; in but one depot, that at Neuchatel, had there been a decided progress. The depot at the Hotel Gibbon, in Lausanne, in the fifth year since it was opened, circulated more than 1000 copies of the Scriptures. The mention of this hotel suggests to the mind the striking contrast between the occupations of the illustrious author and sceptic, whose great work was written on this very spot, and those of the present proprietor, who is so willing an agent in the circulation of the Bible.

In Italy Lieutenant Grayden has had to contend with many and hood, and a rigid censorship prevents, in a measure, the transmission not permit to their proper destination. Notwithstanding all these violent measures, say the Committee, to repress the spread of the truth, we have the most satisfactory assurance that the numbers who are longing for emancipation from their present superstition and thraldom, and to have free access to the Scriptures, are greatly on the increase.

The work in Sweden, Norway, and Denmark is prospering. The system of colportage has been introduced into these countries, and has been attended with the same success, which has marked its progress elsewhere.
In Russia the Committee speak of encouragements. Active measures have been taken to continue the distribution of large numbers of the word of God in Finland, and much good has resulted in the increased love manifested by many of the peasantry. In Lapland a very remarkable religious revival has taken place, and the abandonment of many of the grosser sins in which they were wont to indulge, indicates the power of the word to correct and purify the heart and mind.
Spain and Portugal still continue closed against the operations of the Society.

The Agent for Malta and Greece has spent more than five months in the important work of visiting the several depots along the coasts of the Mediterranean, both Europein and African. Much good is anticipated as the result. The Agent had an opportunity of personally confer-
ing with most of the missionariee at Constantinople and in Syria, and seeing for himself the cheering and promising state of the Armenian and other Churches established within the last twenty years in those countries.

From Malta, he writes-" It is possible you may have heard of Count Guiccardini and six others, exiled from Florence on account of having been found one night reading the New Testament. Two of these men came to Malta. I found them on my arrival, and have had frequent communications with them. They appear to be taught of God-to teel that all these things will work together for good-and to bear all with exemplary patience and Christian resignation, without any mixture of bitterness."

The next spot from which the Committee was addressed, after the Agent had visited'Athens, Smyrna, and Salonica, was Constantinople. His letters from this metropolis are deeply interesting, as showing the labours which are undertaken by the American and other Missionaries in furtherance of the Redeemer's kingdom.
Leaving Constantinople he reached Nicomedia, once so celebrated in the days of the early Christian Church. "But what interested me most," says the writer, " was the modern Christian Church, composed of living stones. These are generally called Protestants. Of the whole 250 in this place, about 150 make a creditable profession of religion. I was present at their services on Sunday, which were conducted with all the solemnity and-propriety observed in the best regulated Christian congregations, and the people sang hymns in their own language to tunes used, in England and America.

The first Armenian Protestant Church was formed at Constantinople in 1846. Bitter persecution was then raging against those who had left the ancient Armenian Church both in Constantinople and Asia. But the work of the Lord went forward, and in process of time, through the instrumentality of the British Ambassador, Sir Stratford Canning, a firman from the Turkish Government was procured, which established their privileges and defended them from persecution on the ground of their religious principles. They are now acknowledged as Protestants, and perform all their rites separately.

There are at present in Asia. Armenian Protestant Churches established at 21 different places. These are superintended by 16 American Missionaries, six ordained native pastors, and one licensed preacher. "If the question should now be asked", says the agent, "what have these things to do with the Bible Society? My answer would be 'much every way.'" The first impulse was occasioned by reading the Word of God, and the work is carried on by the same means, for it continues to be the power of God to salration, and to work mightily in them that believe.
The Auxiliary Societies in India continue to furnish gratifying scoounts of their success. The Calcutia Society states that the sub-
scriptions, the sales, and the gratuitous issues of their Auxiliary have again been largely augmented; and they rejoice to add that their communications from various mission stations have confirmed their hope, that the Bible Society is not sending forth the Word of Life in vain, The employment of colporteurs in the several Auziliaries bas assumed considerable importance. It appears that 7,803 portions of Scriptures were issued to colporteurs at Madras, and put into circulation, while a total of 12,784 portions were forwarded to colporteurs in the interior, The accounts received of the results of their labours have been most

From China the Committee report, that although the differences among the translators of the Bible relative to the translation of certain words still continue, yet they have been making great efforts to bring into the hands of the teeming myriads of this country the oracles of God.

The Committee report many interesting facts from the several Auxiliaries in Australia, from which it would appear that they are fully alive to the importance of their position in view of the recent gold discoveries. The system of colportage in the interior is under consideration, and an agent has been sent by the New South Wales Society to the mines in that colony.

Further remittances have been received from the South Sea Islands, amounting to nearly $£ 300$ in return for Bibles and Testaments supplied to them.

Turning our attention to the home operations of the Parent Society we find that their receipts have been $£ 108,4490 \mathrm{~s}$, 10d., being an increase as compared with the last year of $£ 511 \mathrm{~s} 18 \mathrm{~s}$. 2d. The receipts for Bibles and Testaments have amounted to $£ 51,76512 \mathrm{~s}$. 9 d . being an increase of $£ 2,23017 \mathrm{~s}$. I1d.
"The most striking feature," say the Cômmittee, "in the actual receipts is the item of Free Contributions from Auxiliary Societies which have reached $£ 34,10019 \mathrm{~s}$. 0 d . It should be Borne in mind that this is the more important, as it best proves the hold the Society possesses on the public mind."
The expenditure of the year has amounted to $£ 103,9309 \mathrm{~s} .10 \mathrm{~d}$. and the issues of the year have amounted to $1,154,642$ copies, showing an increase of 17,108 copies over the preceding year. The total issues have now amounted to $25,402,309$. The present number of societies in England and Wales is stated to be 3,249, all of which are suecessfully engaged in the Bible cause. The colportage system has been found to work exceedingly well, particularly in the large cities and towns. Liverpool and Manchester are mentioned as having received great benefits from the introduction of the system.
Ireland continues to furnish information of an interesting nature. The Hibernian Bible Society is carrying on the good work by distributing the Scriptures and by aiding similar Evangelical Societies. TheParent Committee have not only assisted the Sunday School Soeiety
of this country, but they have also aided in their own peculigr depart ment the important operations which have boen carrying on amongst the Roman Catholics, or converts from the Church of Rome, especially in the Western districts of Ireland.

Your Committee having thus glanced at the operations of the Parent Society, would now refer to the progress of our own Auxiliary during the past year.

As stated in the last years Report, a new arrangement had been entered into with our agent, Mr. Smith, by which the Committee had secured his services for half of his time at one half of his previous salary. Agreeably to this arrangement Mr. Smith proceeded in his tours and visited the several Societies in the Eastern part of the Province, and he would bave continued his tours to the Westward of Halifax had he not been detained in this city by the Annual Meeting taking place at a somewhat earlier period than usual. He has furnished your Committee with a statement of his proceedings during the year, from which we learn that both by his personal visits, and by correspondence, he has ably assisted in keeping alive among the Branch Societies that attachment to the British and Foreign Bible Society, which so happily prevails among them. From his statements your Committee ascertain with pleasure that the several Branches and Associations connected with our Auxiliary may be considered not only. as permanently established, but as also likely to increase in numbers and in usefulness.
