

Continued from page 2. Humber Valley undertaking would replace the fisheries. That undertaking would, however, supplement and relieve the pressure on the fisheries. It had been suggested by gentlemen abroad that it would be a good thing could Newfoundland establish a close season for her codfishery. That, of course, was an impossibility. But Newfoundland could reduce the extent on which her fisheries were caractivities for a large number of her fishermen. That was the immediate and outstanding benefit of the Humber Valley undertaking. It took thousands of men from the fisheries ensured a smaller catch and better prices for those who remained at the ancient and staple industry of Newfoundland.

It was encouraging to note, too, rom the Speech from the Throne, that hand in hand with Humber Valley development was to go an immediate and complete settlement of our railway problem. As a matter of fact, and as stated by the prime minister in one of his public speeches the one development depended on the other. Without a railway settlement, there could not be a Humber Development and without Humber Development there could be no hope of the relief from the heavy burden of railway financial obligations so long carried by the people of Newfoundland. What that railway needed was the provision of additional and profitable business. That business, both freight and passenger, would be provided in connection with the Humber Industry: that industry would also make possible the solution of that other insistent problem of maintaining railway service in this country with great and continuous financial losses to the people of the country. The policy that made possible indusley was a great one and of immense and lasting benefit to the people of Newfoundland. That policy ensured a still greater and equally lasting benefit when it made conditional the rehabilitation of the railway under new and progressive management.

In 'conclusion, Dr. Mosdell asserted that he saw in the Speech from the Throne the announcement of the inception of a new era of industrial progress and prosperity for Newfoundland, and he congratulated the prime minister and his colleagues on the earnest, unceasing and able efforts that had made this high achieve future of the country.

The attention of Owners and Masters of British Ships is called

to the 74th Section of the "Merchant Shipping Act, 1894." 75.—(1) A Ship belonging to a British Subject shall hoist the proper national colors-

(a) on a signal made to her by one of His Majesty's ships, including any vessel under the command of an officer of His Majesty's navy or full pay, and (b) on entering or leaving any foreign port and

(c) if of fifty tons gross tonnage or upwards, on entering or leaving any British Port. (2) If default is made on board any ship in complying with this section the master of the ship shall for each offence be liable to

a fine not exceeding one hundred pounds. At time of war it is necessary for every British Ship to hoist the colours and heave to if signalled by a British Warship; if a vessel noists no colours and runs away, it is liable to be fired upon.
