

**DR. WILLIAM RAMSAY**Dean of Regina College 1934-1940



DEDICATION

Dr. W. Ramsay, Dean Emeritus of Regina College, who received his B.A. from Queen's University in 1902 and his Ph.D. in the Greek Language and Literature from the University of Chicago in 1927, taught for thirty years in this province, from 1910 until 1940. In Noember of 1961 the degree of Doctor of Laws, Honoris causa, was conferred on Dr. Ramsay, teacher extraordinary.

In 1916 Dr. Ramsay was invited to join the faculty of Arts and Science of the University of Saskatchewan as Professor of Classics, and in 1934 he was appointed Dean of Regina College when it became part of the University. He served in that capacity until 1940. Here Dr. Ramsay faced a situation fraught uncertainty and insecurity among the staff, and tensions within the administration all heightened by the general economic stress of the nineteen thirties. His very human approach to the problems and his warm personal interest in faculty, staff and students was probably more effective in allaying fears and producing a unity of purpose than an impersonal administrative approach could have been.

To Dr. Ramsay the human mind was the most rewarding garden to cultivate because it produced the finest fruits. The individual was of supreme importance and he showed this in his deep personal interest in students, staff, friends and social contacts. Regardless of the situation, his devotion to teaching and the

development of mental discipline was always apparent. Even a slice in golf was considered to be the result of inadequate mental discipline.


He often said "the great thing in teaching is to identify yourself with the student" and those who came under the spell of his teaching will testify that he achieved his objective. People from all walks of life — business, professional and academic — speak with warmth and enthusiasm of the powerful influence he exerted upon them in the classroom. His was the ability "to lead the student out of his own locality into a world of universal truths." Truly it can be said that contributed tremendously to the development of that uniquely human attribute, the human mind.

# EDITORIAL


Student life is a product of people and their ideas; its character is a total of these personalities. Because of this, the individual finds in campus life whatever he expects.

# Pioneers of Progress -John MACOUN Helped Change a Railroad's Route

John Macoun came west in 1872 with the Fleming expedition surveying a transcontinental railroad route through central Saskatchewan. For ten years he studied the flora and fauna, particularly in the southern regions of the province. He wrote enthusiastic reports of the boundless possibilities for agricultural development. So factual and convincing, so completely different to previous pessimistic reports, Macoun played a large part in the decision to change the route of Canada's first transcontinental railroad from central to southern Saskatchewan. Today, the land Macoun recognized as rich in agricultural production shows new promise as the minerals beneath the soil add a new dimension to the Saskatchewan economy.
