Although the Germans Are Employing Fresh Forces of Reserves in Efforts To Hold Back the Allied Troops Who Are Pressing Them in Region of the Somme To the Oise, British, American and French Armies Continue To Make Progress.

Ground Gained At Various Points Along Battle- The Indications Are That Sub-Front of High Importance For Further Prosecution of Endeavors of Allies To Drive Out Germans From Old Amiens-Montdidier Sector-Bray, Proyart and Gury Taken.

(Undated War Summary By The Associated Press). Although the Germans are employing fresh forces of reserves in their efforts to hold back the Allied troops who are pressing them from the region of the Somme to the Oise, the American, British and French armies continue to make

Monday witnessed gains of ground at various points along the battle front of high importance for the further prosecution of the endeavors of the Allies to drive out the Germans from the old Amiens-Montdidier sector.

After an extremely bitter contest the Americans and British have gained a foothold in the important little town of Bray-Sur-Somme, on the northern bank of the Somme. A short distance across the river to the south the British have taken Proyart and midway of the line have pressed onto the east of Fouquescourt in a manoeuvre which has resulted in the further outflanking of Chaulnes from the south and of Roye from the north.

On their part the French in the rolling country immediately north of the Olse River have captured Gury, a position of great strategic value lying couthwest of Lassigny, and at several other points southward to the region of the Olse have advanced their lines further toward Noyon.

Washington. Aug. 12.—The German submarine operating off the Virginia coast was attacked by an American destroyer, which used 17 depth bombs in an effort to get the raider. The submarine did not resppear and oil was noticed on the surface of the sea. The date of the attack was not given in the report received today by the navy department. Washington, Aug. 12.—Using polson gas a German submarine attacked the coast guard station and lighthouse on Smith Island off the North Carollina coast Saturday night, the mavy department tonight announced. Six men were overcome by the gas.

The gas was released from the oil spread over the surface of the water by the submarine, the navy department announcement said. Three large areas of the oil, each larger than an acre, grounded near the Island. The gas, which appeared similar to mustard gas used in fighting on the western front, was effective about forty minutes. None of the six men overcome by the fumes died. Further Progress Made By The Entente Forces Announces Marshal Haig

London, Aug. 12-The Allied troops fighting today in the region between the Somme and the Oise made further progress east of Fouquescourt and on the south bank of the Somme and also captured the village of Proyart, south of Bray, according to Field Marshal Haig's communication issued this evening. Hundreds of Germans were made prisoners and the Germans also suffered heavy casualties.

The text of the communication follows:

"In successful fighting today in the neighborhood of the Roye Road east of Fouquescourt and on the south bank of the Somme our line has been advanced in each of these localities, and some prisoners have

"South of the Somme our troops captured the village of Proyart after sharp fighting in which the enemy lost heavily in prisoners and men killed. The fighting is continuing in this neighborhood.

"On the right of the British forces the French have taken Des Loges. On the remainder of the British front there is nothing to report."

Paris, Aug. 12-French troops have captured the town of Gury, about eight and a half miles south of Roye, according to the French official communication issued tonight. Two counter attacks against the positions held by the French and Americans on the Vesle river near Fismes have been repulsed.

The text of the communication follows:

Between the Avre and the Oise our troops have captured the village of Gury. We have made some progress to the north of Roye-Sur-Matz and Chevincourt.

"On the Vesle front we have repulsed two violent counter-attacks against our positions on the north bank of the stream in the region of Fismes."

The French war office in Sunday morning's statement announced that the French had reached the outskirts of Gury. This town is an important point on the Lassigny Massif, within two miles of Lassigny itself, which is the immediate French objective in this sector, possession of which would be likely to cause a considerable retirement by the Germans both to the east and the west on this end of the battle line.

CANADIAN TROOPS **WIN MORE LAURELS**

In Present Big Thrust They Have Captured More Than Nine Thousand Prisoners, Over 150 Guns and Gain More Than Thirteen Miles.

All Objectives Set Before Canadians Were Achieved and Held-Greatest Success in History of the Forces, Says Sir Edward Kemp.

London, Aug. 12—(Canadian Press despatch from Reuter's Ltd.)-Sir Edward Kemp has given out the following statement:

Reports up to last night regarding the work of the Canadian corps in the present offensive further emphasize and confirm the extent of their successes. The corps' prisoners now total 9,000 with over 150 guns captured. The depth of the corps' advance at its maximum point is over thirteen miles. The activities of the past three days have been on the scene of the old Somme battle ground where the ground is fully traversed by old trenches and other defensive works, making the operations of our tank units, motor machine gun companies, cavalry and infantry more difficult, thus accounting for the slowing down of the early advance. All ranks of the corps are in the best of spirits and in the words of the corps' commander, who is highly enthusiastic, they are

A NEW PEACE OFFENSIVE HAS STARTED AT MUNICH

WAR HAS BEEN SET ON FOOT

RECORD NOW DEAD

Remarkable Pitching Perform ance By Charles Bomar.

Charles Bomar, a pitcher who held a remarkable record for a continuous winning streak, died July 16 at his home in Dectatur, Ill., of consumption, aged 35 years. Pitching for the Decatur team of the Three-I League in 197 Bomar did not lose a game of the last 22 he pitched winning 20 and getting ties in the other two. In making his record he pitched as often as three times a week and he was going strong when the league season ended on September 9. The next year Bomar pitched for Des Moines in the Western League, but he could not agree with John J. Higgins, then owner and manager of the team and famous for his disputes with players, and he had an indifferent season and soon after he retired from baseball.

Bomar was a native of Tennessee and began his baseball career in the old Kitty League in 1905, going from that league to the Three-I. He was a right-hander and rather small in size but a hard worker and fair batter. The season he made his great record with Decatur he pitched in 60 games in a 140-game season. With Des Moines the next year he pitched in 40 games and played 20 in the outfield.

GERMANS MAKE MIGHTY EFFORT TO HOLD

THE BRITISH ADVANCE SLACKENS, BUT THEY TAKE BRAY VILLAGE

in the Centre Strong Enemy Counter-Attacks Seem To Have Held Up the Advance Against Vital Points Along the Line - Roye Said To Have Been Abandoned By the Germans -French Gain Ground Rapidly.

(By The Associated Press).

Mighty efforts are being made by the German high command to check the Allies' advance through Picardy toward Peronne, Roye and Noyon. On the northern end of the battle line the British have not been able to progress rapidly during the past night, although London reports un officially that the village of Bray has been entered.

In the centre strong German counter-attacks seem to have held up the advance against vital points along the line. There is an unconfirmed report, however, that Roye has been abandoned by the enemy.

On the right, the French are still gaining ground stead ily. They have reached the crest of the hills west of the Oise and have virtually cleared the Metz Valley of the enemy.

The battle is still confined within the limits fixed when the French extended the fighting area to the Oise. It has been expected that the :ombat might spread along the line, especially to the northward, but this development has not as vet been reported.

Interest in the Picardy battle now centres upon the German efforts to stabilize the front along the line from Albert south to Chaulnes and to check the French efforts to envelop the enemy's positions at Lassigny.

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

THE VICTORY ON THE SOMME LOOMS LARGER INDIGESTION AND

SITUATION SPLENDID IN SOUTH, **BUT LESS PROMISING IN NORTH**

Allied Prospects Never Brighter and Germany's Hope of Military Victory Is Fading Away Rapidly-Outlook Is Mighty Encouraging - Two Distinct Movements on the Front-Tanks and Cavalry Prominent in Great Advance.

Special cable to New York Tribune and St. John Standard. (By Arthur S. Draper).

London, Aug. 11-Haig's success on the Somme looms larger as the captured territory is more fully surveyed.

If the situation is filled with high promise in the south, it is no less satisfactory in the north, where the English and Americans stood off German counter attacks after taking the heights on the Somme.

There is some question whether the progress of the Canadians at Santerre heights is intended as a local operation. In fact, there is no such thing as a limited offensive, for in any surprise operation the attacking force must be ready to take advantage of every opening.

No better organized and executed remunerative operation was ever directed by Haig. There is no doubt now that the place of attack was a complete surprise to the Germans, who expected the drive between Arras and Albert. All threats to Paris are gone for the moment, if not for the rest of the war. The menace to Amiens is gone, and the road to Abbeville and the Channel lengthened. The Amiens-Paris Railway, by way of St. Just, is no longer under gunfire. Haig has already won a big victory, and future operations offer high promise.

The transition from gloom and anxiety to buoyancy and high confidence has been so rapid, it is difficult to keep the balance. If we remember four, three, or even two months back and compare our present emotions with those of the Germans we can appreciate what kaleidoscopic changes are taking place in this campaign.

The Canadians and Australians, who have been training as storm troops, have played a big part in this battle. The English cavalry, following close behind the tank squadrons, is having the opportunity, for which it has been patiently waiting and training. In this primarily British show, with British troops directed by a British Field Marshal they are vindicating themselves after the March disaster. The French are filling a role, relatively minor at first, but now becoming of major importance.

Probably the divisions which took part in the initial drive found some eight divisions in front of them. Though considerably outnumbering the enemy, the Germans didn't face such great odds as the British did on March 21. The defensive force, with the exception of the wings, was totally unprepared and the British nabbed prisoners so rapidly they were almost unable to handle them. A divisional general, taken before he could escape to the transports, miles behind the original positions, fell a victim to the small but smart tanks and armored motor cars. A second divisional head was taken at Lihons. In two hours positional warfare had given



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

CASUALTIES OF THE CANADIANS ARE MODERATE

Sir Edward Kemp Says Their Achievements Greatest in Corps' History.

London, Aug. 12.—(Canadian Associated Press)—Sir Edward Kemp, overseas ministed of militia, said today the official reports covering the Canadian operations until nine o'clock Saturday morning showed the achievements of the Canadians in the present offensive were the greatest in the corps history. The extent of their advance on August 8 and 9 was twelve miles. They went further in those two days than the Germans had progressed in the first two days of their March offensive. The frontage of the Canadian attack on August 8 was 7,500 yards, while the line held on Saturday was upwards of 16,000 yards wide with fighting of an open character. They captured 7,000 prisoners with over a hundred guns and machine guns by the hundred. On the first day the Canadians were opposed by four German divisions, every battalion of which was identified.

All four Canadian divisions, said Sir Edward, played a part in the attack, in addition to the cavalry brigade, which performed brilliant work, being on Saturday morning well in advance of the infantry, and in touch with head-quarters.

Sir Edward Kemp says our losses are moderate, "the smallest by a long way of any previous major operation in which the corps has been engaged, notwithstanding that the accomplish-ments in the present battle are the most gratifying in the corps history." Sir Edward Kemp sent General Currie a message of congratulation to himself and his corps.

A. A. Brown, of the Dominion Plant Pathological Department of Agriculture, with headquarters at Fredericton, was a visitor here yesterday.

Speaking to The Standard Mr. Brown stated that on account of the earliness in the season he had very little to report, having not at the present time in his possession many samples of vegetable disease sent into headquarters by the inspectors of this line.

"These inspectors," he added, "are at present travelling New Brunswick in an endeavor to locate any disease in vegetable crops caused by fungi growth or bacteria.
