CISNA AN IMPORTANT STRATEGIC

Are Also Advancing From Dukla Pass to Head of Line of Railway Rur

ion, April 5, 10.50 p. m.—The attention of the public for the time being is directed toward the great struggle Carpathian passes where the Russians apparently are making very steady progress despite the obstinate re-

The Russians are on the Hungarian side of both the Dukla and Lupkow passes, and with the aid of continual re-inforcements are gaining the heights which dominate Uzsok Pass. Even the Austrian official report admits that fight-ing is now taking place in the Laborcza Valley, which is south of Lupkow Pass, while the Russians tonight an-

The Russians also are advancing from Dukla Pass on Bartfeld, which is at the head of the line of railway running south into Hungary, and tighting not far from Mezolaborcz, another important railroad head. On Saturday and Sunday they captured in the Carpathians upwards of 3,000 prisoners. They also claim another success in Bukowina and the capture of another thousand prisoners, while the Austrians also assert that they repulsed a Russian force which attempted to cross the Dniester river.



NOTE TO GREAT BRITAIN

American Government Makes Mild Protest Against Rights of Allies to Place Embargo on All Commercial Intercourse Between Germany and Neutral Countries---The Feeling in England

Washington, April 5—The United States government today made public its rote to Great Britain, announcing that it "could not admit," either the right of the Allies or their claims for justification in placing an embargo on all commer-

"To admit it," says the communication, "would be to assume the attitude of unneutrality toward the present enemies of Great Britain, which would be obviously inconsistent with the solemn obligations of this government in the present circumstances, and for Great Britain to make such a claim would be for her to abandon and set at naught the principles for which she has consistently, and earnestly contended in other times and circumstances."

"We think that a good general answer to the apprehensions disclosed in the note has been given by anticipation in the British note. The object we have in view is as vital to us as the destruction of commerce with the confederate states was to the union during the civil war. We did not then stand upon technicalities with them, and we feel that we fairly ask them not to show greater jealously of their extreme legal rights, now that we are fighting for our exist ence, than we displayed then.


