HANGES IN SCHOOL BOOKS ANNOUNCED

into Effect in August—Prices to be Reduced

FREDERICTON Feb. 15.—As a result of the meeting of the text book committee of the Board of Education in its city yesterday and the negotiations which have been in progress for some time, Premier Hazen made announcements as to changes in the school books. The changes will go into effect at the commencement of the next school term, in August next. The committee adopted the recommendations of the text book committee of the teacher institute, and the Goggin's grammar will be used in the schools instead of the Melville grammar. The latter has sold at 25 cents. The authorities believe as do the teachers at Goggin's grammar will prove much superior and it will add much to the value of the book. Arrangements have been made whereby copy books will sell at 3 cents each instead of 5 cents, the present price. Extensive improvements will be made in the health reader. A chapter on the treatment of tuberculosis will be added, a much needed addition. The new arithmetic text book has been considered. It is now understood that no change will be made. The book at present in use will, however, be sold at a reduced price, of about 10 per cent. Other changes are under consideration and Premier Hazen and his government are carrying out their anti-inflation policy regarding reduced prices for school books to the letter. Provincial Secretary, Fleming who attended the meeting yesterday, returned home last evening. Premier Hazen will go to St. John tonight.

THE SPEED OF SPECIAL MAIL TRAINS

Subject of Number of Questions from Hon. Mr. Emmerson in Parliament

In the House of Commons, Hon. Mr. Emmerson has given notice of the following questions:

February 9.—1. Have any instructions ever been issued by the Department of Railways or by the management of the Intercolonial railway, with reference to the speed of special mail trains, so-called? If so, what were such instructions?

2. Is it true that orders were issued at any time to the effect that such trains should run at a rate of speed not less than fifty-five miles per hour, and is the rate of speed authorized in inclusive or exclusive of stops at stations and at taking water?

3. At what rate of speed was the special train which recently met with disaster between Dalhousie Junction and Campbellton, when one of the locomotive engineers of the train was killed and other injured, running?

4. Was the speed in accordance with the instructions or regulations in such cases?

5. Whose duty was it to direct as to the average speed to be maintained with respect to the average rate of speed to be maintained in charge of such train or any of them?

6. Is it true that any engineers or conductors of such special trains have been penalized for exceeding the average rate of speed, inclusive of stops, or excessive thereof?

7. Were any instructions issued as to the average rate of speed to be maintained by the train referred to? If so, what were they and by whom issued?

8. In the regulations, if any, provide for any difference to be made in the average rate of speed to be maintained by such trains as between winter and summer road-conditions?

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FOUGHT LIKE BEASTS TO SEE MAN SLAIN

Revival of the Guillotine in Paris Witnessed by Remarkable Scene of Despravity

PARIS, Feb. 15.—The man Denver, who was sentenced to death for the murder of his wife, was executed at Carpentras at 7 o'clock this morning, amid the same unpleasant popular hysterics as was seen at Bethune a fortnight ago.

An immense crowd waited for six hours to see the execution, and fought desperately with the soldiers who kept them back. When the wagon with the guillotine arrived about four o'clock the crowd charged it, and cheering and shouting it forced an entrance with it to the place of execution.

Men going to the horses' necks, under the shafts, and to the wheels like bunches of human grapes, and although M. Debber, the executioner, and his assistants, tried to beat them off, the wagon came to a standstill until a way for it was cleared by the soldiers. Dappers gave no trouble. When one of the assistants of M. Debber pointed out to him that he was putting on his boots without socks he merely laughed and jerking his thumb at M. Debber, said: "He won't give me time to get cold feet." He then heard Mass, insisting on smoking a cigarette while M. Debber was going on, and a few moments afterward he had paid his debt to society.

It is most likely that his execution will be the last one in France to take place in public. Public opinion is strong in favor of future executions taking place inside the prison, and the scenes at Bethune and at Carpentras have strengthened the feeling.



FIELDING FLOATS LARGEST COLONIAL LOAN ON RECORD Finance Minister Back, Looking Well and Happy

HALIFAX, Feb. 14.—The Albanian Lusitania with British mails and four hundred passengers arrived this morning nearly nine days from Liverpool, the slowest passage of the mail steamer for this season. She brought 1700 packages of mail and 110 tons of cargo. Two hundred passengers were on board. The passengers were Hon. W. S. Fielding, Minister of Finance, who has been several months in Europe, during which time he conducted negotiations which will result in the signing of the French treaty and successfully floated the largest colonial loan ever put on the British market. Mr. Fielding was engaged the whole time in public business, but is looking well and in excellent spirits and health. He declined to make any statement regarding his work on the other side, beyond stating that he hoped the French treaty and new loan would be eminently satisfactory. Mr. Fielding will start for Ottawa on Tuesday. He was met here by his wife and daughter, and the Deputy Minister of Finance.



REPORT FAVORS THE ABSORPTION OF BRANCHES.

Commissioners Have Submitted Statement of Work To Parliament

DETAILED REPORT

OTTAWA, Feb. 15.—Hon. Geo. E. Graham, minister of railways, presented to the commons yesterday the report of the two commissioners appointed to investigate the question of the feasibility of having the Intercolonial Railway extended by the inclusion in the system of government railways various branch systems which tap the trunk line in the Maritime Provinces.

The Commissioners were Supt. Tiffin of the I. C. R. and D. A. Story. They made a separate report on each of the thirteen branch lines doing business in the Maritime Provinces.

In the general conclusions, the commissioners report in favor of the acquisition of the branch lines by the I. C. R. declaring that this would give a strong management and proper equipment to many systems which at the present time are not sufficiently equipped to be of much value to the district which they are supposed to serve.

Absorption Would Benefit All

In this regard Mr. Tiffin says: "We would express the unanimous feeling, as gathered from interviews with the people living along these lines, that great good to the country would follow the suggested absorption."

"There is not a dissenting voice amongst all the people we interviewed as to the good people would derive and there can be no question as to the good the country and its people would derive and there can be no question as to the impetus such action would have on business, that is now lagging away because of want of facilities for the proper conduct of the present traffic."

It is a well established fact that in nearly every case where branch lines have been absorbed by trunk lines, such a policy has proved to be of great value to the branch lines as well as to the main line and then becoming valuable feeders to them, as they increase the traffic and earning power of the trunk line.

"Hampered by lack of capital and insufficient equipment cannot be expected that the branch lines can provide the service or facilities needed for the development of the country which they profess to serve, and further, we are constrained to say the branch lines are today not in a position to give a satisfactory service and in fact we believe they have now almost reached the stage of being more of a hindrance than a help to the proper development of the country."

Each line is treated in detail.

New Brunswick Roads

The Kent Northern, twenty-seven miles long, could handle larger traffic in four and fish with better equipment.

The Richibucto & St. Louis, twenty miles long, could be profitably resented.

"Carquet & Gulf Shore, 33 miles, present condition of road poor, but serves a portion of great population. Regis & Havelock—Little prospect to develop freight business further, but passenger traffic might be increased.

St. Martin's Branch—Prospect for developing traffic.

Moncton & Beauséjour—Some prospect for increasing business under Intercolonial management.

Albert Southern—Not operated for several years owing to the collapse of a bridge.

Cape Tormentine Railway—Serves good country which should yield profitable.

Salisbury & Harvey—Reduction of rates could obtain traffic in plaster and would encourage operation in all seasons.

Nova Scotia Roads

Sable River railway from Point Lepreau to St. Peter's—Only through traffic owing to lack of settlement along line; no prospect of improvement in passenger or freight traffic; expense doubtfully warranted; road cannot feed Intercolonial to any extent and commissionaires fail to say whether an extension, westward from St. Peter's, would be profitable.

Perron Junction to Sunny Brae—Iron ore business ceased and traffic almost limited to lumber. Commissionaires doubt if it could be made a good business proposition.

Springhill & Parralboro Company—\$4,000,000 deficit in 1906 and 1907 and \$25,000 in 1907; no credit is given for hauling company's coal which at 20 cents a ton would show a surplus in operation. As this is a coal road its value to the Intercolonial would depend upon arrangements for freight with coal-owners.

Vias (Coal) Company Road—Local people claim present management does not afford siding and other facilities for their coal-trucks in vicinity to be developed, and favor Intercolonial management.

The reports discuss possibilities, but makes no recommendations.

The report is to be printed in full for the use of parliament.


Manitoba Liberals Accepted Roblin's Challenge in the Matter of the Stuffed Lists
