HANGES IN SCHOOL BOOKS ANNOUNCED

to take effect in August—Prices to be reduced

FREDERICTON Feb. 15.—As a result of the meeting of the text book committee of the Board of Education in its city yesterday and the negotiations which have been in progress for some time, Premier Hazen made announcements as to changes in the school books. The changes will go into effect at the commencement of the next school term, in August next. The committee, adopted the recommendation of the text book committee of the teacher institute, and the Goggin's grammar will be used in the schools instead of the Melville's grammar. The latter has sold at 25 cents. The authorities believe as do the teachers at Goggin's grammar will prove much superior and it will be sold at 30 cents each instead of 25 cents, the present price. Extensive improvements will be made in the health reader. A chapter on the treatment of tuberculosis will be added, a much needed addition. The health reader text book have been considered, but it is now understood that no change will be made. The book at present in use will, however, be sold at a reduced price, of about 20 per cent. Other changes are under consideration and Premier Hazen and his advisers are carrying out their anti-inflation policy regarding reduced prices for school books to the letter. Provincial Secretary, Fleming who attended the meeting yesterday, returned home last evening. Premier Hazen will go to St. John tonight.

E. I. DESPERADOES, ON WAY TO DORCHESTER BREAK FROM JAIL

CHARLOTTETOWN, Feb. 15.—Shepherd and McDonald of Charlottetown, two prisoners convicted of robbery, jail breaking, etc., and sentenced to Dorchester penitentiary, have escaped from Pictou Jail and are still at large. They were taken over on Wednesday by Sheriff Coombs and Constable McKinnon and placed in jail. They fled the lock during the night and got clear of the cell, but there were other doors to force. When the janitor came in the morning to give the prisoners breakfast the desperadoes lay in wait, and seizing the janitor, shoved him into the cell and locked the door. When Sheriff Coombs learned of the escape he organized a search, telegraphed and telephoned in all directions had a man watch McDonald's home in Westville, but so far without success.

THE SPEED OF SPECIAL MAIL TRAINS

Subject of Number of Questions from Hon. Mr. Emmerson in Parliament

In the House of Commons, Hon. Mr. Emmerson has given notice of the following questions: February 9.—1. Have any instructions ever been issued by the Department of Railways or by the management of the Intercolonial railway, with reference to the speed of special mail trains, so-called? If so, what were such instructions? 2. At what rate of speed was the special train which recently met with disaster between Dalhousie Junction and Campbellton, when one of the locomotive engines of the train was killed and other injured, running? 3. Was the speed in accordance with the instructions or regulations in such cases? 4. What duty was it to direct as to the average speed to be maintained with the train in charge of such train or any of them? 5. Is it true that any engineers or conductors of such special trains have been penalized for not maintaining the average rate of speed, inclusive of stops, or excessive thereof? 6. Were any instructions issued as to the average rate of speed to be maintained by the train referred to? If so, what were they and by whom issued? 7. In the regulations, if any, provide for any difference to be made in the average rate of speed to be maintained by such trains as between winter and summer roadways and rail conditions?

ICE ALMOST STOPS NIAGARA FALLS

Only a Tiny Rivulet Flowing Over American Side and Whirlpool is Barely in Motion

NIAGARA FALLS, Feb. 15.—Only a tiny rivulet, not big enough to carry a pulp log over the brink, is flowing over the American side of the Niagara Falls. A strong northeast wind which has blown since Friday has held back the water and allowed the ice to gain a foothold. Two employees of the American reservation walked from Prospect Point in Bath last Sunday morning. They started from completion of the trip merely because they did not care to get their feet wet, a stream at one point being a few inches above the tops of their boots.

A great wall of ice runs from the

head of Goat Island to the American mainland through which only three streams are able to trickle. This wall has even crept over the Canadian side, extending out some 200 feet beyond the third sister island and greatly diminishing the flow over the Horseshoe. Only the very apex of the Canadian fall is left and that is robed of half its flow. The gorge below is choked and the rapids have lost their fury while the whirlpool is barely in motion.

This is only the third time that this

combination of wind and ice has been thus arrested since the white man came here. The other occasions were on March 25, 1848 and March 22, 1902.

FOUGHT LIKE BEASTS TO SEE MAN SLAIN

Revival of the Guillotine in Paris is Witnessed by Remarkable Scene of Despair

PARIS, Feb. 13.—The man Denvers, who was sentenced to death for the murder of his benefactors, was executed at Carpentras at 7 o'clock this morning, amid the same unpleasant popular hysteria which was seen at Bechupe a fortnight ago. An immense crowd waited for six hours to see the execution, and fought like beasts to get a glimpse of the man who had been sentenced to death. When the wagon with the guillotine arrived about four o'clock the crowd charged in and cheering wildly, attempted to force an entrance with it to the place of execution.

Men going to the guillotine, under the shafts, and to the wheels like bundles of human grass, and although M. Delber, the executioner, and his assistants, tried to beat them off, the wagon came to a standstill until a way for it was cleared by the soldiers. Denvers gave no trouble. When one of the assistants of M. Delber pointed out to him that he was putting on his boots without socks he merely laughed and jerking his thumb at M. Delber, said: "He won't give me time to get cold feet." He then heard Mass, insisting on smoking a cigarette while Denvers was going on, and a few moments afterward he had paid his debt to society.

It is most likely that his execution will be the last one in France to take place in public. Public opinion is strong in favor of future executions taking place inside the prison, and the scenes at Bechupe and at Carpentras have strengthened the feeling.

THINKS GIFFREY DIED FROM NATURAL CAUSES

Matapedia Correspondent Does Not Think Unfortunate Young Man Died From Exposure

Matapedia, Feb. 15th 1909 To the Editor of the Graphic. Please allow me space in your paper to make a few remarks about the death of the late William Giffrey, son of Robert Giffrey, who was found dead on the Upsalquich road on Friday, the 5th inst. I notice by the local papers that he had not been dead more than three or four hours, and that it had not the appearance of being frozen. One ear was undoubtedly frozen badly and was discolored, while the other was only slightly frosted. From particulars I have since learned that the young man could not have been more than three or four hours exposed to the cold, which with the amount of clothing he wore, would not be sufficient to freeze him, and I am of the opinion that the young man died suddenly.

I would like also to know if it is lawful to take the remains of any person from their home and take them twenty miles to a coroner, and then come again to the place of death, and then go to the place and hold the inquest, if such is necessary. I would naturally think the coroner should go to the place of death, and not the other way around.
