HARTLAND BALL TEAM DOING GOOD WORK

Victorious Over Crack Fredericton Team and Wins From Island Falls

During the past week Hartland ball team distinguished itself by some mighty good playing. Elsewhere is the Fredericton ball's report on the game with Y. M. C. A. of that city—a team that had previously lost but one game in 35. The score of 18 to 3 was a thing that helped spread Hartland's fame.

On Friday Hartland played the Impertinents and lost in a close fast game in which the score was 5 to 1.

On Saturday Hartland played McAdam in the first shut-out game of the season the score being 7 to 0 against them.

Tuesday evening Island Falls team came to Hartland and gave an exhibition of amputee ball that is seldom seen in small towns. There was no score until the last half of the fourth when Hartland scored six runs. There was no score in the fifth, and at this point the umpire would have called the game. The sixth was entered upon, however, and Island Falls scored 8 in the deepening dusk. Darkness made it impossible for the game to continue. According to rule 25 "if the umpire calls a game at any time after five innings have been completed, the score shall be that of last equal innings played." No exception to this rule. If the score at the end of the first half of the fifth inning, or any subsequent first half of an inning, is 1 to 0 in favor of the team second to bat, the latter wins. Technically Hartland won Tuesday's game 1 to 0.

A Distinguished Visitor From Ontario

Mr. Smith has been a guest of his cousins, G. G. Gray, M. L. E. McFarland and William McGee.

A Splendid Building

Next in attractiveness to the post office is the newly completed building of Hartland Clothing Co. Its gleaming white front makes a fine showing, and store, when lit up at night is still more pleasing. The building is 25x60 feet, two stories, with basement the full size. The whole of the ground floor is fitted up for the firm's big business and is not surpassed, if equalled, by any clothing store in the province. The work of building was superintended from start to finish by Percy Britton, and the building was made complete in 10 weeks with a crew averaging six men.

Joseph McGee Farm Re-Sold

G. Burton Nixon of Somerville has sold the property known as the Joseph McGee farm to David Shaw at a price close up to \$8000. Included in the sale is a pair of heavy horses just imported from Ontario. This well known farm is directly opposite Hartland bridge, the western approach and road having been a part of it, and Mr. Shaw has an all down-hill haul clear from his back field to Hartland station. The farm is 40 rods wide and runs back from the river more than a mile and a half. At present prices of produce there is a fortune every year in a property like this.

AUTO ACCIDENT NEARLY FATAL

Turned Upside Down on Swim Mill and Scott Hallett Was Caught Beneath

Yesterday Scott Hallett met with an automobile accident that might easily have cost him his life. He was on the Swim Mill the other side of Coldstream and had with him his cousin, Elverton Hallett, and his little son, Donald, Kenneth and Barrie, and was returning from a blue-berrying trip to Cloverdale. In negotiating the hill the brakes proved defective and the car ran up the side of the bank and turned upside down in the road. Scott Hallett was pinned beneath the wreck and was very painfully hurt. It was feared at first that his injuries were fatal, but no bones were broken and today he was brought to his home at Upper Brighton. He was badly bruised and jammed by the weight of the car and while his condition is serious, his chance for early and complete recovery is good. Elverton Hallett was slightly injured and the children escaped with nothing more serious than a bad scare. The car had the top, windshield and mud guard broken.

"AUNT LETTY" CRAIG

We record the death of dropy of Mrs. Letitia Noble Craig, July 31, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Nevers of Upper Woodstock, aged 96 years and 9 days. Sister Craig was born at Lower Brighton, July 22, 1824. Her father was Joseph Noble and the maiden name of her mother was Mary Ackerson, both of Lower Brighton.

In her early life she lived with her sister, Mrs. Levi H. Estabrooks of Rockland, where she afterwards married Deacon Jacob Craig of the F. C. Baptist church of that place, with whom she lived about 15 years. They had no family but adopted a little girl who is now Mrs. Frank L. Craig of Perth. After the death of Deacon Craig she made her home with her niece, who at this time was Mrs. Gen. Ackerson.

After the death of Mr. Ackerson, and her niece becoming the present Mrs. F. W. Nevers, Sister Craig still made her home with her for over four years, where she received every comfort and care that loving hands could supply, till her departure to her Heavenly home.

Mrs. Craig was converted in early life under the labors of Elder Grant an evangelist, and became afterwards a member of the F. C. Baptist church at Rockland. She was a sincere Christian and was always glad to converse on Salvation and to extol her precious Saviour. She bore her long and painful illness with resignation to the Divine will and looked forward with joy to her Heavenly home. She lived to a good old age, respected by all who knew her. HARTLAND'S BIG VICTORY OVER FREDERICTON Y.M.C.A. TEAM

Score Was 16-5—Hartland Doing the Heavy Hitting and Fredericton Making the Most Errors

(Fredericton Mail report)

Hartland and Fredericton Y.M.C.A. gave a terrible exhibition at the trotting park Thursday afternoon. The visiting team won 16 to 5. There was enough hitting for two or three games, and sufficient errors for more than that. Hartland had the heavy end of the slugging and the Y team the heavy end of the errors.

Y. M. C. A. did not look much like the York county champions, and playing as they did yesterday, would have been an easy prey for Fredericton City, the tail-enders. Wheeler started in the box. He was batted all over and "Bunny" Williams finished the game. He also was hit hard. Had he held, he would have been hit. Neither pitcher was well supported.

The Hartland team appeared in neat uniforms of gray with dark green facings. The visitors played messy ball but were no better and probably not as good as either Marysville or Y. M. C. A. when the County began to play good.

Hayward Paynter, who pitched with Y. M. C. A. early in the season was in the box for the visitors. The support given him was good, and he pitched a better game than he ever did for the local team. At that he was hit for nine by the Y team, one of them a three-bagger. That was enough to win any ball game, but the poor work in the field was what spoiled the Y. M. C. A. chances. Percy Fraser, also a former Y. M. C. A. player, was with Hartland, covering the second bag. Although producing a brace of errors, he looked up at the Hartland team. As might be expected he received a lot of attention from the crowd.

Hartland did not have its full team, filling in with Woodstock men. Y. M. C. A. also picked up players, Bill Bolster of Devon playing first base instead of Wheeler, and Burke of Marysville, being used at shortstop.

Y. M. C. A. had a lead in the game against Hartland. In the second they scored three runs on three singles. Hartland tied in the third, and Y took a one-run lead in the last of third. In the fourth the local team blew up. Hartland scored seven runs and more than batted through the order. After that there was nothing to it. Loose playing in the eighth let Y. M. C. A. score three.





Leverett Shaw, a well known farmer of Waterville, died last week of kidney trouble. He was about 54 years of age and a son of the late Stephen Shaw of Avondale. He is survived by one brother, C. C. Shaw of Centreville, and one sister, Celia, who lived with him.

Some farmers have potatoes about ready for digging. One of these yesterday told the Observer that while he had dug into his field only for his family use he would estimate that his 12 acres would average 100 barrels to the acre. The tops, he said, were dying down from maturity. Early planted potatoes will prove good, while those planted late will not be so good. The period of hot, dry weather was good for all crops, but many days like yesterday would cause rust and havoc.

VACCINATION OF EMPLOYEES

THE FOLLOWING IS PUBLISHED FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, GENERALLY AND ESPECIALLY OF THOSE DIRECTLY CONCERNED

1. "Section 30 of 'The Public Health Act, 1912,' being 8 George V. Chapter 36, is hereby amended by adding after the last paragraph thereof the following paragraph:

"No person shall be employed in any camp, ship, factory or other place wherein the employees come at frequent intervals into close and prolonged contact one with another, unless and until such person produces to the employer or the employer's representative a certificate, signed by a regularly qualified medical practitioner, of successful vaccination, or a like signed certificate, that he is immune to vaccinia as proven by three consecutive non-successful vaccinations, or that he is immune to small-pox by reason of having had the disease, or that he is immune to the infection of his sickness, and who has not completed or been required or been required to comply by said employer or employer's representative, with the foregoing provisions prior to his employment, then in such a case the employer shall be primarily liable to pay all such costs, charges and expenses as are necessarily incurred in or about the necessary precautions relative to, or immediately appertaining to any such case of small-pox, and such costs, charges and expenses may be sued for and recovered, with costs, in the name of the Chairman of the sub-district Board incurring the same, in any court of competent jurisdiction, within six months of the recovery or death of any such person. Such liability shall be in addition and without prejudice to any liability for any penalty provided for any violation of the provisions of this Act.

The terms and conditions of this section shall not become operative until the first day of July, A. D. 1920."


