LONDON IN THE LEGISLATURE. "The Act Respecting the City of Lon don," having successfully passed the Private Bills Committee of the Ontario Legisature, came up for a second reading in the

House last night. It was expected that the opponents of the measure, who are confined to those residents in London South that are to amalgamation with the city, would withdraw their opposition when it was shown that an independent water sup-ply, to be provided for by district assessnent, was out of the question; but Mr. Meredith informed the House that they intended trying their strength on the third reading of the measure. The bill was referred to Committee of the Whole House. As now arranged, the measure is not ma-

terially different from that originally presented to the House, but several important clauses were added in the Private Bills Committee. The bill provides for the amalgamation of the suburb on the basis of a reduction of 6 mills on the \$1 of assess ment, the provision of a water supply and fire and police protection, and the municipal privileges stipulated by the Joint The privileges asked for by E. Leonard & Sons are conceded, but the aggregate sum at which the business may be assessed in any one year for the next ten years is reduced from \$75,000 to \$70,000. Section 6 of the Waterworks Act is repealed, and power is given to borrow \$130,-000 for waterworks extensions, principally with the object of affording a supply to London South if the Legislature permits its amalgamation. Power is also given to borrow \$40,000 for school purposes without submission of a bylaw to the taxpayers.

The following additional clauses placed in the bill when before the Private

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Bills Committee: 21. Notwithstanding the provisions of any act or law the corporation may berrow for any period not exceeding twenty years such sums not exceeding in the worde \$90,000 as may by bylaw passed in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act be granted by way of bonus to any manufacturing establish-

ment.

22. The debentures issued for any of the purposes mentioned in sections 18, 19 and 21 may bear such rate of interest not exceeding 6 per cent, as the Council of the corporation of the city of London may from time to time determine. mine. 23. For the purposes of the next ensuing election of members of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario the said Ward No. 6 shall form a part of the electoral district of the East Riding of Middlesex.

Several times he has reiterated the statement that he had not seen Pickthall in New York. Twenty-Eight Men Buried in a Burning Building at Indianapolis.

Ten Firemen Killed and 18 Per sons Badly Injured.

The Voices of Other Victims Keard

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., March 17 .- This afternoon fire from a furnace in the base ment of the large book publishing establish ment of the Bown-Merrill Company reached some paper, and in an instant the flames were carried by the elevator shaft to the fourth story. The building—a fine stone and iron structure, fronting on Washington street—was stored with books and stationery of all kinds. This large stock was consumed and the building wrecked. At 5:30 o'clock the loss of more than \$150,000 on the building and stock was followed by the falling in of the roof, which carried

MORE THAN TWENTY PERSONS, including those who were working on the various floors. The fire at this hour had been driven to a corner between the ceiling of the fourth story and the cornice. Parts of the fire companies were on the roof working their way down to the fire. The roof seemed sound, and the walls substantial, but suddenly the walls yielded. A man threw up his arms and sank into the seething ruins below. Another man dropped, and then the whole roof with fifteen men on it, fell on the top floor where the fire was raging. Four men were on the upper floor under the roof. These were CRUSHED EENEATH THE GRINDING TIMBERS, and all the men hurled through the falling floor, which gave way beneath the weight MORE THAN TWENTY PERSONS,

floor, which gave way beneath the weight of the mass. One of the fireman on top of the adjoining structure ran to the front of the building and shouted to those below, "For God's sake throw water into the upper windows. Twenty men are buried

TERRIBE SCENES.

The scene on the heap of debris immediately after the collapse was dreadful beyond al! description. The limbs of men here and there were seen writhing, while the trunks to which they belonged were buried from sight. A ladder lay across the three men, and was weighed down by tons of bricks and timber. Another poor fellow, who was beyond all pain, lay close beside his fellows, a shapeless and mangled mass. The ladder lay across the stomach of one who was beyond all pain, lay close beside his fellows, a shapeless and mangled mass. The ladder lay across the stomach of one man, who was screaming with agony. Another man with a broken arm and twisted body lay next to him. As fast as willing hands could hurl away the bricks the weight was removed, but the ladder was too firmly held to yield. The man with a broken arm was dragged free and carried away. Under him, mute, but breathing, appeared the upturned face of a poor fellow not seen before. The mortar and dust were cleaned from his lips, but he was buried so deeply that no immediate help could come to him. On all sides blackened, bleeding faces, distorted with agony or dreadful in death, urged the crowd who had scaled the heap to assist them, to redouble their efforts.

We are, as the ADVERTISER has before ow stated, on the eve of a Provincial General Election, and all along the line the parties are getting ready for the day of battle by placing candidates in the field, laying down platforms, and defending records. The Government, with Oliver Mowat at its head, is about to be placed on trial by the people, as it has already been in the legislative halls, and the electors will be called upon to give a verdict according to the evidence. Such is the right of Canadian free men, and on their decision all Governments in Ontario must stand or fall. It is different in Dominion contests, as by the Gerrymander, the infamous Franchise Act and other devices the voice of the people in many constituencies is stifled. But in Ontario Provincial contests, it is the voice of the people which has been heard in the past, and the voice of the people will be heard in

the future, so long as Liberals sit on the treasury benches. Nothing has happened in the three and a half years which have elapsed since the electors were last heard from to impair the confidence which they then reposed in the Mowat Administration.
