

CITY MANAGEMENT.

The Advertiser makes no excuse to it space to-day with the opinions of citizens regarding the best means for managing civic affairs.

Reform in present methods is the question of the day, and the ideas of all classes and conditions of men have been sought. The result so far is an overwhelming preponderance of opinion in favor of the following changes:

1. If there must be wards, then fewer

The Municipal Act provides that the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council shall have power, on application, to reduce the number of wards in a city to three.

2. If there must be aldermen, then fewer aldermen.

The number of aldermen under the present law can be reduced to 12. Formerly we had 7 wards with 21 aldermen. When the number was last reduced we had 4 wards with 12 aldermen. Then London East came in, with 3 additional aldermen. Now, with London South added, we have 6 wards and 18 aldermen. But, if the taxpayers desire it, the wards can be reduced to 3 and the number of aldermen to 12.

3. But the large majority of those interviewed seem to favora more radical change. They believe that it would be in the best interests of the city that the ward system should be abolished, and the aldermen elected, as is the mayor, from the whole city. That is, if the aldermanic system is to be continued. Many of those interviewed would prefer the management of ordinary civic affairs by paid commis-sioners, who would devote their best energies to the work.

The discussion of the suggestions contained in these interviews cannot fail to see to is that the men who come forward for aldermanic honors are favorable to every needed change that increases the prosperity of the people.




