NATIONAL PROVISION FOR OLD

The National Provident League Great Britain, under the presidency of Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, has been lately discussing the subject of a national pro vision against old age. Mr. Chamberlain himself is an energetic supporter of the movement. He has no idea of establishing a national insurance against sickness or accident. The insurance he considers should be against old age alone. The scheme involves a voluntary deduction of a certain percentage from the wages of young workmen, the sums thus gained being placed for the benefit of the contributor at compound interest so as to form a fund to secure him against pauperism in old age.

Therefore, he claims provision should be made for them, to which they should be induced to contribute. In most cases that would be asking a man to make a very slim breakfast and dinner so he would be sure to have something in the house for supper. For it is unbelievable that utter failure should erown nearly half the hard-working lives of a nation as the result of shiftlessness, drunkenness or vice. The trouble, in some respects, arises from the landlord-made laws that have in the past diverted into the pockets of the controllers of the soil too large a slice of the receipts from the labor expended in its cultivation or in the mining of the under-surface minerals. On this continent we have less pauperism than is found in the old world; but that fact can be traced to two causes. We have no expensive army and navy to keep up and we have as yet plenty of avail-able vacant land, which tends to make the lot of the workingman easier than in old world lands, where the soil has all been ap-propriated. Whether our people will be any better off than those in the old world when the natural opportunities are circum-scribed through the increase of population will depend upon whether we take care to avoid what is objectionable in the old

world systems.
The insurance scheme which Mr. Chamberlain proposes would be tried as an optional measure at first. Probably it may finally be made imperative for all to contribute to lt, and thus make it a scheme of a socialistic character; but we presume that the British Government will await the trial of a similar experiment which has been decreed In France before it makes even a move in that direction. COMPETITION IN HORSE BREED-

As the ADVERTISER recently indicated, light horses are now enjoying an inning in Canada. A very considerable increase in the supply of carriage and saddle horses may therefore be expected in the near future. In view of the great development of light harness horse breeding in the United States, we also cautioned Canadian breeders that in seeking an outlet for their surplus stock in Great Britain they would probably meet United States competition. Testimony is already to hand indicating the correctness of our fore-cast. The Farmers' Review of Chica-

go has been making special inquiries upon the subject, and the result shows that the "American roadster" is attracting a great deal of attention abroad. Reports come from France, Italy, Germany and Austria that American trotters are making a favorable impression this season, especially in the last-named countries. roadsters being exported are clean-limbed, high-stepping, rapid-moving horses of good size, standing, as a rule, fifteen hands or over in height. The business of exporting them is said to have begun with the men who bring out heavy draughts to Chicago on speculation, and being desirous of making a profit both coming and going, very naturally turned their attention to the American driving horse, hunting or saddle horses being common in Britain, and stylish drivers scarcer and higher priced. The leading exporters have been paying from \$150 up to \$600 for suitable rses, and claim that the prices received for them after crossing the Atlantic have averaged \$400, while such high figures as \$4,500 have been realized in a few cases Probably over 500 have gone to England and Scotland during the past year. As to color, the buyers on the other side prefer bay or brown, and one exporter states that geldings are wanted, not mares, as "no gentleman in England would be seen driving a mare. Shipments are also going forward to France for driving and breeding purposes. These facts give renewed emphasis to the suggest tion expressed in these columns that our breeders and farmers who are looking to the old world for a market must be prepared to meet competition, and should aim to produce only that which is strictly first-class. It is also apparent that if everybody, as is often the endency, rushes helter-skelter into breeding light horses many mistakes will be made and too many nags of one type produced all of which would have a tendency to depreciate prices. It is the part of wisdom that breeders should take a fair view of the situation and govern themselves according ly for the present, at the same time re-membering that in the event of readjusted

No increase will be given Misses Johnston, Evans, Macklin and Hall.


