Clarence's Remains An American Girl Captures a Live French Duke.

The Spurgeon Funeral Services. London, Feb. 10.—The first of the three services to be held over the remains of Rev. Mr. Spurgeon to-day opened in the Metro politan Tabernacle. The edifice was crowded. The children from the Stockwell crowded. The children from the Stockwell Orphan Asylum, in which institution Mr. Spurgeon was deeply interested, were present dressed in mourning and sang hymns. The Rev. Mr. Pierson, the American minister, who has occupied the pulpit of the Tabernacle since Mr. Spurgeon's illness, addressed the congregation after the singing by the orphans, and he was followed by a number of other speakers.

Disposal of the Duke's Remains. LONDON, Feb. 10 .- It is understood that one result of the visit of the Prince and one result of the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to Osborne is that the Queen consented to allow the coffin of the Duke of Clarence to be removed to Sandringham, where it will be buried in the churchyard in a grave adjoining that of the infant princess who died in 1871. The coffin is to remain in the Albert Memorial Chapel at Windsor until after the return of the court to the castle, as the Queen wishes to see it, and her Majesty will attend the service in the chapel, which will be conducted by the Bishop of Rochester and Canon Bulton. The Queen did not wish the coffin to be placed in the royal vault, but desired to have it buried in a crypt of the Prince Consort's mausoleum at Frogmore. The removal to Sandringham and interment there will be conducted privately.

The largest and best set of apartments in Kensington Palace have now been unoccupied nearly ten years. They were the residence of the Duke of Sussex, the Duchess of Inverness and the Duke and Duchess of Teck in succession. It is understood that the Queen for some time has contemplated having them reconstructed and redecorated in order that they may become the future London residence of Princess Eastrice and Prince Henry of Battenberg.

In chiers, through the bannereted streets of the metropolis—when suddenly and silently death stepped in, and in a few short days, lays the young Prince low, dashes the cup of nectar from the lips of the young Princess, frustrates all the bright plans and purposes and blights all the fond hopes of the royal families, and the bride-expectant, now the virgin-widow, lays her bridal-wreath upon the coffin of the Prince to whom she had been so recently and so happily espoused. The natione! heart is more than touched—it is deeply stirred by this tragic event. There is universal lamentation. Deepest sympathy is felt for the aged Queen (for this was her favorite grandson); for the Prince and Princess of Wales in the loss of their first-born by sterribly swift and unexpected a bereavement, and almost most of all, certainly tenderest of all, for the young Princess May, whose heart has been so sorely crushed at the very moment of intensest gladness. When they told her he was dead, she could not believe it; she implored him to speak to her once more; and as they bore her tenderly out of the chamber of death, she cried out. Cardinal Manning, too, was held in very high respect for his true catholicity of spirit and for his practical and lively interest in the welfare of the working classes. A noteworthy fact in connection with the A noteworthy fact in connection with the present is that almost all persons past 60 years of age who have been attacked with influenza have succumbed. Of course, this is easily accounted for. The mention of this age, however, reminds me that our Tory Government, at the instigation of Mr. Tory Government, at the instigation of Mr. Chamberlain, the coming leader of the Dissentient Liberals, is about to launch a decoy duck to attract workingmen's votes at the election, which is not many weeks off. I refer to a scheme of national insurance in the interest of the masses, and also of the poor law. It has been found that the great majority chargeable on the poor law provision of workhouses consists of men and women over 60 years of age. It is extremely difficult for such persons to get employment, and if they have not saved anything they are utterly destitute, and are driven by want to the workhouse. Many philanthropists have propounded a remedy in the shape of compulsory or voluntary insurance from early life. Mr. Chamberlain has considered these schemes, adopted their best points and formulated a plan which proposes (1) a preliminary deposit, (2) §50 a year or about 10 cents a week, (3) at the age of 65 allowance of §65 a year to begin. I need not give all the details, but such are the main proposals. It will, if adopted, be of immense advantage in the encouragement of thrift and the consequent diminution of poverty.

Yet this self-confidence is a whole diameter away from self-conceit. The latter is an invariable sign of weakness, the former of strength. And when a man has faith in himself and the people have faith in him you have the most favorable conjecture for success. Barring all accidents, he is sure to win. Now, Sir Edward Watkin is just that kind of man. He has personal magnetism about him. He inoculates others with his own faith. He is of Methodist ancestry. He was brought up in a Methodist New Connexion Sunday school at Stockport, near Manchester. He is now the managing director of great railways. He is doing his best to gain access for the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire Railway to London. We have now five great railways to and from the provinces—the Great Western, the Great Easiern, the Great Western, the London and Northwestern (the most powerful of all), and the Midland. Mr. Paterson is a self-made man, who began life by driving a baker's wagon, and by indomitable perseverance reached the front ranks as a manufacturer and as a manager of public affairs. He has never asked any Government aid to run his business, and he is an earnest advocate of the freest possible trade relations with our neighbors. Moreover, he can rank in the lists of his supporters nearly every one of his fellow-townsmen who are engaged in manu. facturing. In the contest of less than a year ago he was actively supported by the following manufacturers in the city of he had the support of the majority of his Brantford: A. Harris, Son & Co., employing 400 hands; the Waterous Engine Works Company, employing 215 hands; J. O. We ask that the same measure be meted out to the Dominion Government as Governor Angers has meted out to the Quebec Government. The London Free Press says that each Minister at Ottawa shall not be responsible for the money thus illegally collected and corruptly expended. Why not? Was any member of the Quebec Gov-Governor Angers has insisted on at Quebec, minus the straining of the constitution. It would be a nice condition of affairs if we were to adopt the view of the Free Press, expressed in these terms:

"If Sir A. P. Caron has done more than "II Sir A. P. Caron has done more than this, if he has taken money from McGreevy for his own personal ends, or the advantage of anyone, apart from seeming political necessity, he will have to suffer the full consequences."




