The Calvert Lithographing Company is one of the largest establishments of the kind in the world, employing over 300 hands, and its fame and clientage now reach to three continents, and its equipment is second to no kindred works on the entire globe. Mr. Thomas Calvert, the founder of the establishment, is an Englishman by birth, but is now an American citizen. The musician was accustomed to keep a reckoning with his washerwoman on pieces of stone, which were quite abundant in Munich, being obtained from quarties near Salenhopan, in Bavaria. The stone, having a smooth surface, was used for tablet; crayons were used in writing on it. While inspecting his "washing list" one day the stone slipped from his hands and fell into a kettle of greasy, oily, refuse water. On picking up the stone Senefelder was astonished to find that where the stone had been written upon the grease adhered. had been written upon the grease adhered but elsewhere it was clean and smooth This led to the investigations by the thoughtful musician, and out of this little incident the art of lithography was developed.

ink is applied to its surface, the ink will attach itself only to the lines made by the fatty crayon and will be repelled from the wetted parts.

In the latter the type is raised, and when the ink is applied to the roller it adheres to the face of the type, from where it is applied to the paper. In steel-plate work, the impression is cut into the steel plate, the ink is early into these decrossions only and ink is sunk into these depressions only and is thus applied. In lithography the surface of the stone is perfectly flat, and the imof the stone is perfectly flat, and the im-pression is obtained solely by the fact that

pression is obtained solely by the fact that the ink adheres to the greasy marks on the stone, and from them is impressed on the paper by the simple pressure.

NOW A CHROMO IS MADE.

We see tens of thousands of chromos, which are given away by every enterprising

business man, yet we venture the assertion that very few know how they are produced.

business man, yet we venture the assertion that very few know how they are produced. To properly produce a chromo the lithographer must be en rapport with the artist. He must analyze the picture, tully realize the combinations of colors and the spirit of the work. Having determined just how many basic colors enter into the picture, the artist commences his work by preparing a lithographic stone for each separate color. The artist commences his work by preparing a lithographic stone for each separate color. The artist commences his work by making a delicate and elaborate ink-tracing of the picture; not only lits general outlines, but the minute and intricate touches and shades of color of which it is composed. This tracing-paper is chemically prepared, so that the lines upon it can be readily transferred to stone. A press is employed to transfer the impressions on the paper to the stone, considerable pressure being used. The stone has a strong sflinity for both water and oil. The greesy or oily lines on the tracing paper are quickly absorbed and reproduced on the stone, and then a diluted wash of nitric acid and gum arabic is applied. The greasy reproduction thus becomes nitrate of lime and is impervious to either water or oil. Thousands of impressions can then be taken from this stone by simply running an ink roller over it.

sions can then be taken from this stone by simply running an ink roller over it.

The tracing thus transferred forms what is known as the key stone. Suppose there are twenty colors in the chromo. This number of impressions is taken from the key stone and each carefully dusted with red chalk. A dim effect of the entire tracing is then pressed on each one of the stones.

The drawing then begins, and often occupies many months. Each stone is to be printed in a separate color, and therefore must contain not only all that is necessary of that color in the picture to the minutest detail, but all of the compound colors, made by printing one or more over others. A variety of gradations of color from its full strength to the faintest tinting can be produced on each stone, just as in using an ordinary pencil or crayon on drawing paper. duced on each stone, just as in using an ordinary pencil or crayon on drawing paper.

up in black by the artist, and it is the printer who applies the colors. The lines on each separate stone are etched with the wash of nitric acid and gum arabic, and are

wash of nitric acid and gum arabic, and are ready for the presses.

The printer must be as skillful as the artist in applying his colors, and must fully realize the blending and effect of each color. As fast as each color is printed it is submitted to the artist, who has thus a progressive proof of the work.

It has been probably noticed that lines cross each other on the margin of a chromo.

It has been probably noticed that lines cross each other on the margin of a chromo. These are the registering marks; and enable the printer to place the sheet in the same relative position every time a new stone is used and a new color applied. These lines used and a new color applied. These lines are drawn in the original tracing and appear on each stope. When the first color is printed very small holes are punctured in each sheet at the intersection of these lines, very fine holes are also drilled in corresponding positions on each of the subsequent stones, and the holes in the paper are to correspond precisely with the paper are to correspond precisely with the holes in the stone, and thus as each additional color is put on a perfect register is secured and each color falls just where it

belongs.

The next process is to make the chromo have a rough surface like an oil painting. A stone is now prepared which has a rough surface, similar to canvas. The chromo is a surface, similar to canvas, the chromo is then laid upon it and passed through a press with heavy pressure. When it comes forth it is an exact imitation of the paint-

press with neavy pressure. When tooms forth it is an exact imitation of the painting. It is then varnished, and thus you have the chromo ready for the market.

LITHOGRAPHIC STONE.

The world is yet practically dependent on one quarry in Bavaria for its lithographic stone. Stones have been found in France, England, Canada and the United States, but none possess the qualities of the best German stones. A bed of lithographic stone has been found in Sequatchie Valley, not far from Chattanooga, and the investigations so far indicate that it will yield stone of a very fine quality. If it should prove so, it will be literally a gold mine. The finer quality of stone is to-day worth 13 cents per pound and is very scarce.



Albany, N. Y., May 9.—The remains of Carlisle W. Harris were buried in the rural cemetery here this afternoon. His last statement was given out this afternoon from the State Prisons Department. Harris says: "Evidence has come to light that my wife was for years before her death addicted to the use (or misuse) of the drug, from an overdose of which she died. I am sentenced to death on the supposition that I substituted a capsule containing five grains from an overdose of which she died. I am sentenced to death on the supposition that I substituted a capsule containing five grains of morphine for one of the harmless capsules I prescribed for her ten days before her death. Now, it is self-evident to any one having the knowledge of medicine that no one addicted to morphine could be murdered with five grains of that drug because, for such a person, five grains would not be a fatal dose. On this fact was based the motion for the new trial which Recorder Smyth denied, and later my plea for executive interference. In regard to the unanimous decision of the Appeal Court, and the Governor's refusal to interfere, Harris charges that the reason was that "The action of the court was not justified by the facts in the case, and hence public outery must be silenced by a seeming justification of the court cut-side of the facts." He concludes his statement by saying: "And now, face to face with the greatest mystery known to man, knowing that no concealment or untruth can mitigate my end, I solemnly declare that I am innocent of the crime for which I am condemned to die. I beg that those who think or speak or write of me in years to ome will do so as kindly as they can, not forgetting that when much proof of my innocence was found it was inhumanly thrust aside."

THE DUTY OF THE HOUR. There can be no longer any doubt that London and Port Stanley Railway affairs have drifted into a very unsatisfactory shape. Since the bargain with the Cleveand syndicate was entered upon the hope and belief was general that the railway was about to be managed successfully as an independent link in the land and lake traffic of the west, and that the new deal was backed by ample capital. At first there was some doubts as to the ability of the syndicate to carry out their projects, but when it was found that they were backed by the wealthy president of a coal company, with capital of many millions of dollars, and when that shrewd business man put up \$25,000 cash as security to bind the bargain, no one longer doubted that the deal was a good one for the city.

For various reasons, the arrangements entered upon with so much care have fallen through, and it is made evident that we must begin again anew.

Two views are entertained to a greater or less extent in taxpayer circles at present.

One holds the present mayor and a section of the council accountable for the collapse, because of their alleged unfriendly attitude to the members of the syndicate at a time when they were working hard to enlist the sympathy and support of cap-

Another section sedulously maintain, with some members of the council of 1893, that the late council was remiss in concluding a bargain so very favorable to the city. The argument is that the aldermen of 1893 ought to have rejected the bargain because it was altogether too good for the city to be genuine!

There is much that is erroneous in both

We are inclined to give the council of this year, as well as the aldermen of last year, credit for doing what they considered to be best for London. The council of 1892 was composed of some of the best business men of the city, and there is a concensus of opinion that they were justified in proceeding with a bargain so very much in the interests of London, backed as it was. The aldermen of 1893 must have concurred in this view, or they would not have aided the deal by carrying through the Parliamentary enactments

necessary to legalizing the lease. Here we are, however, with the railway on the hands of the city. The Cleveland millionaire who backed the syndicate, on a closer scrutiny of the bargain to which he is a party, has refused to aid in its financing, being willing rather to lose the \$25,000 forfeit than put up more money in the endeavor to make ends meet.

Surely, in view of this situation of affairs, the time for squabbling is past, and the time for united action has come. As Lord Bacon has well remarked: "That which is past is gone and irrevocable, and wise men have enough to do with things present and to come." There should be a complete cessation of disparagements. It is always well to use the memory of a predecessor fairly and tenderly, for the debt will have to be paid some time.

EMPEROR VS. PARLIAMENT. The latest speech by the Emperor William of Germany will not have a tendency to elevate him in the minds of people who

believe in constitutional rule-that govern

ment shall be by and for the people. Caprivi, who succeeded Bismarck as Chancellor of the empire, promoted in the German Parliament a bill having for its object a vast increase in the military forces of the country. This increase was held by the military men to be necessary, and by Emperor William himself to be imperatively urgent.

Not so, reasoned the staid represents tives of the people in the Reichstag. Fresh from their constituencies, the large majority of those popular representatives argued and voted against the expenditure as unnecessary and as too heavy to be borne by an already over-taxed people.

Then came the Emperor's opportunity. Strong in will, he believes that he can influence the populace to upset the Parliamentary verdict, and so he exercised his kingly prerogative to dissolve the Chamber and order a new election.

Now the Emperor has taken occasion to go before a section of the German army, and to denounce as lacking patriotism those who oppose the proposed increase in the military establishment. It is to be hoped that this address, which is reported to have caused a sensation, will have the effect of nerving the democracy to the point of resisting this demand by such a vote as will teach the Emperor and his associate warriors that the empire has other missions than that of grinding the taxpayers to the earth by military expenditures.

It will be observed from the Emperor's harangue that he threatens rebellion against the popular will if the electors decide by the representatives sent to the new Reichstag that increased military expenditures will not be tolerated. The Emperor will be ill-advised if he acts on this threat. He should recollect that when the issue becomes king against parliament it is generally the king that has to stand aside, in some cases, as in England, with the loss of his head. What is the use of the people voting, if the men that they choose to voice their views are to be treated by a hereditary ruler, none



THE SALMON'S ANNUAL MIGRATION.

Every year, as the summer season approaches, the salmon of the Atlantic Ocean leave their feeding-grounds in the northern seas and enter the clear, cool rivers of the extreme eastern United States and the Canadian Provinces. Impelled by a singular instinct, this noble fish, day after day, week after week, works its way toward the heads of the streams, up the swiftest rapids and through the quiet pools, leaping every obstruction. During the whole summer this great armypushes onward, dividing at the forks of a river and breaking up into still smaller bands where tributaries enter, Of the great multitude that left the ocean, every fish has reached the very spot, the very pool where it was born, and lived the first eight months of its life—except the many that never passed the eruel nets, and those that jumped at the beautiful flies which are tied to long silken lines, or else, dazzled by the gleam of torches, were pulled into canoes by men with spears. At length the object of their weary march is attained, and so the army disbands. The long journey has been conducted in a leisurely way, only a few miles each day, but with wonderful persistence. Enemies in the water, fishermen with rods and roels, and poachers with spears thin their ranks; but those that reach their homes at the heads of the rivers are protected by a wise law, which spears thin their ranks; but those that reach their homes at the heads of the rivers are protected by a wise law, which prohibits their capture from the time when they begin to lay their eggs until the anchor-ice, choking the streams, drives back to the sea the fish, now lean and hungry with long fasting; for the salmon is a dainty feeder in its summer home, touching the most tempting and alluring flies only occasionally. Remedy for Existing Industrial Evils.

III-INDUSTRIAL GOVERNMENT. With abundant harvests and unusual pro

With abundant harvests and unusual production in every department of industry we have the anomaly of thousands of people suffering want, while being denied an opportunity to work.

When we have all the material elements of prosperity, there must be something wrong that we do not have prosperity itself.

It is usual when attention is called to

such conditions to hear politicans loudly proclaim that we cannot bring prosperity by legislation, that governments have nothing to do with the industrial and businessmatters of the people, and we hear much about the non-intervention of the government

Governments already carry letters and

Governments already carry letters and parcels, send telegrams, transport persons and goods, make roads, supply water and light, teach children, heal the sick, provide reading rooms, parks, drinking fountains, baths, etc., care for the insane, the pauper and the criminal.

The government practically says to the man out of work, "commit a crime and we will feed you and give you work, but we can do nothing for honest men."

The criminal is comfortably housed, clothed and fed, and is free from all anxiety on these scores, while the industrious, peaceable citizen is left to worry along and take his chances in the unseemly confusion in which our industrial affairs now are. He is obliged to work from early morning until late at night for a bare substance. He has no certainty that he will have the opportunity to labor for this pittance for a year or a month, or even a week more.

These conditions of uncertainty and harrowing anxiety will in time unman the best of us, and are demoralizing to all.

best of us, and are demoralizing to all. No nation can have a proper degree of stability and contentment and make any great progress under such conditions.

It is absolutely essential to the higher civilization of a nation that the people have ample opportunity to labor, and that each shall receive the full product of his labor, and not be compelled to pay tribute to anyone.

one.

No government on earth could have a more important duty than that of regulating industrial matters. It is the province of the government to restore order where now is chãos.

Inasmuch as the government has taken

upon itself to barter away the land and all the natural resources of the country, it is clearly its duty to provide all with oppor-tunities to labor.

tunities to labor.

As the government has, by legislation, made it possible for the schemers who do not work to acquire the greater part of the product of labor, while the producer suffers deprivation, it follows that the government must supply the remedy by legislation.

With particular

With national co-operative stores in operation, having power to issue currency for useful articles as soon as produced, only one more thing is needed to enable the actual producers to reap full benefit of their labor. That one thing is capital. The difficulty of supplying capital may seem at a first glance insurmountable. I propose to show that under proper conditions it will be a very simple matter.

Under out present competitive system capital is required for (1) the plant, (2) raw material, (3) subsistence while producing, (4) the carrying of the manufactured stock until realized upon, (5) expenses to meet competition. With national co-operative stores in

competition.

By the following plan it will be seen that

By the following plan it will be seen that by replacing competion by co-operation only the first and third will have to be provided for, viz., the plant and subsistence, until the product is ready for delivery.

THE PLAN.

Let the Government establish a department of industry, to include agricultural and all productive industries. Let the secretary of this department have a competent board of advisers. Let the board appoint state or local boards in every section of the country.

The raw material is to be loaned by the national stores without charge. When the goods are manufactured, they would be delivered to the store which loaned the raw material, and the store would issue currency for the enhanced value.

This would provide for four of the five conditions named above. The fifth, that of meeting competition, would not enter into the question after the adoption of the system became general.

It may be objected that the men could not repay the loan in a reasonable time, if at all. It is true that they could not, under the present wasteful system, where they get less than one-third of what they actually produce.

If 100 men now receive a total of \$300 per day they would, if they got the whole product, earn \$900 per day. Of the \$900 they could retain their present wages of \$3 each per day and then have left to apply on the loan \$6 per day, or in one year (300 days) \$180,000; in five years, \$900,000.

The loan for subsistence could be repaid as soon as the first products are completed, and there are tew plants in the country employing 100 men that could not be paid for in three years or less.

THE POWER TO PROHIBIT. Test Case Before the Supreme Court, Growing Out of the Norwich Local Option Bylaw.

Option Bylaw.

Ottawa, May 9.—The case of Huson vs. the Township of Norwich was taken up in the Supreme Court to-day. This case in volves the question as to whether the Province enjoys the right concurrently with the Dominion to prohibit the sale of liquor, or if the right belongs alone to the Federal authority.

In view of the recent debate and defeat of the Marter bill in the Ontario Legislature, fresh interest has been directed toward this case.

A bylaw was passed by the township of

ward this case.

A bylaw was passed by the township of Norwich, under the provisions of an act of the Ontario Legislature of 1890, for the purpose of prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor. The Province contends that the municipalities had this power at the date of Confederation, and that the British North America Act retained to the municipalities all the powers they had in this regard. The contention of the opponents of the act is that this power was taken

regard. The contention of the opponents of the act is that this power was taken away by the British North America Act, the question being one of trade and commerce, and vested exclusively in the Dominion Government.

Huson, a ratepayer in the township, moved that the bylaw be quashed before Sir Thos. Galt. Judgment was given to quash the bylaw. The Court of Appeal reversed the decision and upheld the bylaw as being the rights of the municipality. From this judgment an appeal was made to the Supreme Court. A. Duverent and A. C. Galt, of Toronto, represent the appelant, Huson and J. J. McLaren, Q. C., and Mr. Titus appear for the respondent, the township of Norwich.

Montreal, May 9.—Curtland Freeman Bridgman to-day shot and probably fatally wounded Laura Bridgman, his wife. He was walking down Beverhall with another man, when lie met the woman. Some conversation ensued in which Bridgman asked the woman to return to him. This she refused to do, and Bridgman seized her by the threat, crowded her into a doorway, and shot her three times, one bullet entering the apex of the right lung. Bridgman then was carried to the general hospital.

Mrs. Bridgman, it is said, was connected with the Gurney Opera Company, which came to grief here a fortnight age. She states she married Bridgman in Winnipeg some years ago, when he was the editor of the Western Sunbeam in that city.

Laura Bridgeman made an ante-mortem deposition to-day, in which she charged her husband with habitual cruelty, shooting her three times and threatening to kill her. The woman is improving and may get well. She and her husband are natives of Winnipeg.



THE LATE DAVID PRESTON.

Sketch of the Life of the Late Mechanical Superintendent of the C. P. R.-A Railroad Pioneer.

The Railway Master Mechanics' Journal of Chicago has the following interesting reference to the late David Preston, who was the father of Mr. Robert Preston, locomotive foreman of the C. P. R., this city:

"The death of Mr. David Preston, the mechanical superinvendent of the Co. Alexander of the Co. 


