

Huerta Makes New Demand Which U.S.A. Will Not Agree to---Fire at New York Costs 11 Lives---Wyoming Farmer Throws Himself in Front of Train and Is Killed---An Attempt Made to Assassinate Mayor of New York.

HUERTA BEGINS TO EQUIVOCATE; SITUATION IS AGAIN STRAINED

Now Demands That His Salute Be Returned Gun for Gun, While the U. S. A. Refuses This, and May Proceed to a Blockade of Mexico.

[Canadian Press.] Washington, April 17.—Secretary Bryan instructed Huerta O'Shaughnessy to finally inform Huerta that the U. S. will accept nothing less than a salute of 21 guns, and that the American ships will reply after the salute has been fired.

Officials expressed the view that Huerta has been listening to "bad advice" during the last twelve hours, and after he promised Mr. O'Shaughnessy yesterday that he would give the apology.

MAJOR LEONARD IS INCLINED TO LODGE ALL RESPONSIBILITY

Says Chief Engineer Made an Agreement to Pay Contractor's Bill With Only \$150,000 Reduction.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Ont., April 17.—Why was a contractor paid under the present Government three quarters of a million dollars more than a commission appointed under the late Government said he should have been paid?

SMALLER CITIES ARE INCLUDED IN GOODERHAM BILL

Beck's Amendment Accepted by Committee, to Allow Voting on Bylaws on Other Than Election Days.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, Ont., April 17.—The last lap of the fight in the Legislature on the Gooderham Bill to permit votes on by-laws in large municipalities being taken on any other than municipal election days was concluded in the municipal committee this morning.

The bill as originally drafted applied to cities with a population of not less than 100,000. It was amended on the suggestion of Hon. Adam Beck to have the provision extended to include cities of 25,000, but limited to the question of any public utility, street railway or public franchise.

Col. Hendrie, of Hamilton, opposed the Beck amendment, declaring that if such legislation had been in force previously the Hydro by-law in Hamilton would never have passed.

CHURCH AND STATE MUST GO TOGETHER

That Is Ideal Condition, Declares Bishop Fallon, Speaking at Winnipeg Banquet.

[Canadian Press.] Winnipeg, April 17.—Speaking last night at the All Western Catholic banquet, Bishop Fallon, of London, said in part: "The Catholic laity as a body have duties outside their religious duty, important duties of citizenship; the Catholic citizen has obligations that can be fulfilled by him, and by him alone."

"It is late in the day for us to be taking the lesson of loyalty by anybody—(cheers). It is an inopportune moment when the army of Sir Edward Carson is drilling to drive the empire to irretrievable ruin. I think that is enough for loyalty in Catholic teaching, the relationship in a cause. They would therefore profit by law. 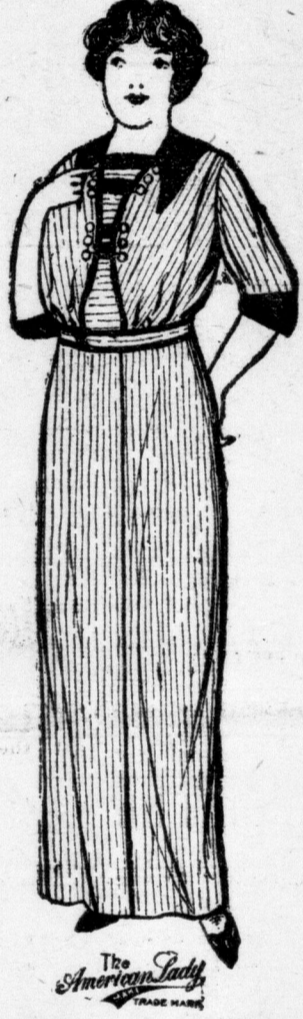

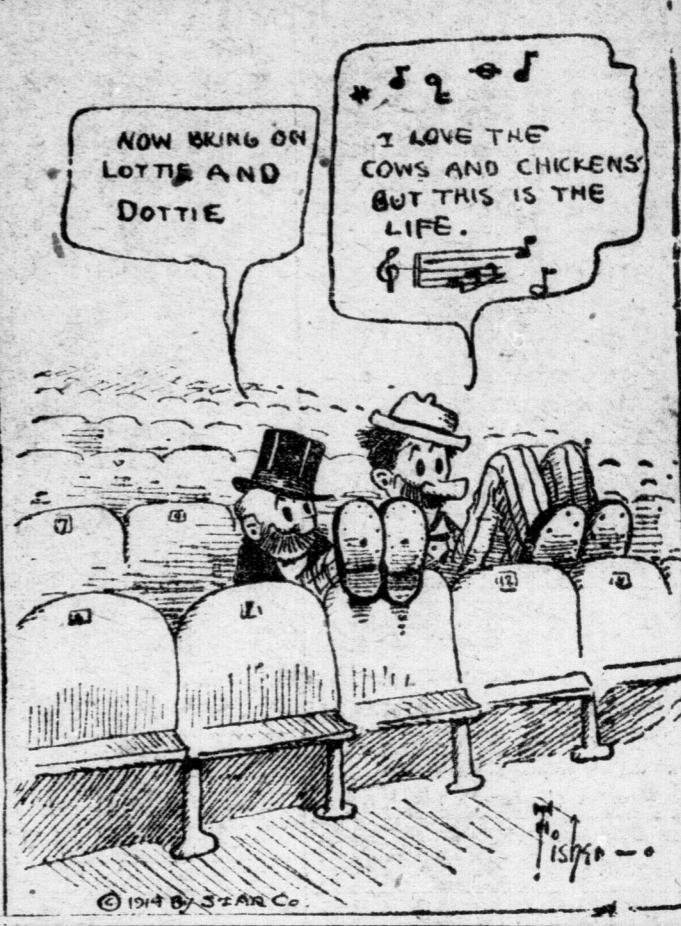

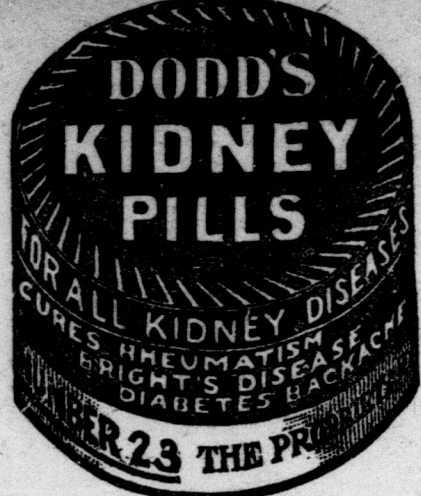

RESIDED IN CLINTON FOR HALF A CENTURY

Mrs. W. S. Harland Was Leading Charitable Worker—Death of Mrs. Crichton.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Clinton, April 16.—This district lost two of its oldest and most esteemed residents today in the deaths of Mrs. W. S. Harland, of Clinton, and Mrs. James Crichton, of Tuckersmith township. Mrs. Harland was sixty years old and had resided in Clinton for over half a century. She was for many years president of the W. C. T. U. and one of the most active workers in Wesleyan Methodist Church, besides being largely identified with charitable work. She had been ill since January. Besides her husband she leaves two brothers and five sisters, J. W. Simpson, of Toronto; J. G. of Colorado; Mrs. Robert Linn, Mrs. James Elliott and Mrs. B. T. Woolford, all of Ituna, Sask.; Mrs. R. Mason, of Toronto, and Mrs. J. H. Harrison, of San Francisco. The funeral arrangements have not yet



been completed. The death of Mrs. Crichton occurred at her home in Tuckersmith after an illness of only a few days. She was 76 years old and had resided in the district ever since coming from England as a young girl. Her husband died some years ago. She leaves seven sons and four daughters, Wilfrid, Lewis, Ell, John T. and Gifford, and Mrs. J. E. Ball, all of Tuckersmith; Mrs. Modeland, of Seaforth; Mrs. William McDonald, of Sunset, Washington; Onslow and Idolo, of Clinton, and Sarah, at home.

BELMONT SECTION MAN HAS HIS LEG BROKEN

Was on Handcar Which Was Struck by a Way Freight.

NO ELECTION THIS YEAR INTIMATES ASQUITH

But Unionists Persist in Expecting One in the Summer.

[Canadian Press.] Montreal, April 17.—Premier Asquith told the House of Commons yesterday, says a London cable to the Daily Mail, that the Government hoped to pass the bill for the abolition of plural voting before dissolution, but this cannot be done until 1915.

This declaration has, however, failed to disturb the conviction of the Unionists, adds the correspondent, that an annual meeting must come this summer, and they are preparing for that eventually. It is probable that the third reading of the Irish home rule bill will be taken on either May 11 or 18, and the suggestion is made that in order to facilitate its passage one of the stages in the Commons shall be eliminated.

BELIEVES HE IS RELATIVE OF AMERICA'S RICHEST WOMAN

Caradoc Township Farmer Will Write to Mrs. Harriman to Find Out.

Mount Brydges, April 16.—In the belief that Mrs. Mary Harriman, widow of the late Edward H. Harriman, who is the richest woman in the United States, is his great-aunt, Henry Hawes, a farmer of Caradoc Township, is making an attempt to establish her relationship as a sister of his maternal grandmother.

Mr. Hawes' conviction that the well-known millionairess and philanthropist is a relative of his, is the result of the publication in The Advertiser recently of the photographs of the four richest women in America, Mrs. Harriman among them. He promptly wrote for her address.

"I have often heard my mother, who died about a year ago, speaking of her aunt, Mrs. Harriman, and I am sure that this is she," Mr. Hawes told an Advertiser reporter today. My mother's name was Sarah Adams before she married my father, but I do not know what her mother's name was. She was of English and Holland Dutch descent and lived nearly all her life at Mount Brydges.

Mr. Hawes admitted that he did not know his great-aunt's first name, nor the business in which her husband had been engaged, and his father, George Hawes, could throw no addi-

tional light on the claim to relationship with Mrs. Harriman. He intends writing her, however, in the hope that she may be the right Mrs. Harriman.

"Of course, she may not be, but I feel confident that she was my grandmother's sister," he declared.

Mr. Hawes is about 35 years of age, and is popular in the neighborhood. To few of his neighbors, however, has he said anything about his belief that he is a relative of the richest woman in America. On his little farm of 35 acres, lot 19, concession 1, in the township of Caradoc, he is assiduously working, and finds his greatest pleasure in contemplation of his field of wheat, which the farmers in the vicinity declare to be the best around Mount Brydges. His father, who is now well advanced in years, has a small farm on the second concession, which he is still working.

Was a Miss Averell.
Among financiers, the name of Edward H. Harriman stood supreme until his death occurred in 1910. Comparatively early in life he married Miss Mary Averell, of Ogdensburg, New York State. When the duties of the vast fortunes and many financial interests of her husband devolved upon her, following his death, it became her aim to continue the policies that had accrued the \$175,000,000 that was bequeathed to her, and she has shown her ability, not only to increase her legacy, but to spend it wisely.

But it is in her dealings with the little brothers of the rich that Mrs. Harriman has become most noted. Interested to a great degree in the workers of the world, she has endeavored to do something definite to help, contributing largely and consistently to many philanthropies and charities.

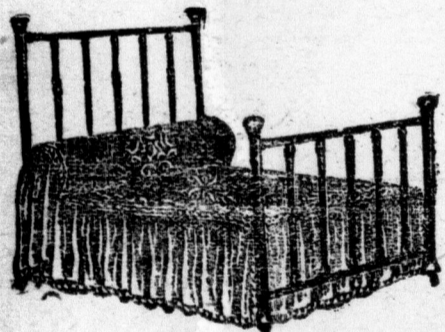

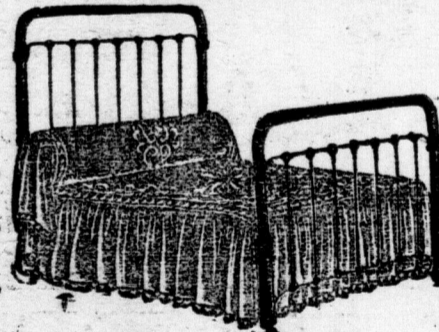

The straits of Mackinac were reported to be still clogged with ice. The ice was said to be soft and it was believed it would be gone within two or three days.

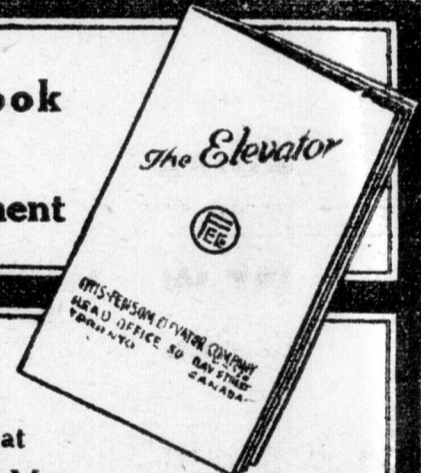
