





He knew that both Judas and Jesus were Jews. Most Jews, the Potashes and Perlmutters, do not prefer a pound of spare-rib to thousands of dollars in good gold. They would not melodramatically sharpen a knife in court. Similarly, Macbeth is a great deal cleverer than the ordinary Highlander, and not many Scotchmen visit witches' caverns. Mac doesn't even use the northern dialect, nor ever once say "hoot mon." It was not safe for a dramatist to put on the Scotch patois in 1605, with pedantic and touchy King James newly on the throne of Great Britain, and Shakespeare probably did not know the northern dialect as he did know the Welsh. He came from Warwick and could well draw the Welshman even to his burr. But he did not venture to make Macbeth's porter express himself in a way that would have satisfled the readers of Wee MacGregor.

How infuriated the Scotch might have been by a depiction of their real character may be judged by the rage of the American Irish over Synge's "Playboy of the Western World," or of some heavy English at Shaw's "John Bull's Other Island." But the best way to get back at these cartoons is to show up the other fellow, not to stick your head or the cartoon in the sand, so as not to see it, especially if it be a good cartoon. And when the work of art is a Macbeth or a Shylock dealing with an in-

Italy could not allow "Othello" with its Iago, nor Denmark "Hamlet" with Claudius. "Paradise Lost" would have to go (if it hasn't gone anyway), as a libel in its Satan on the human race as a whole. The Bible would be put on the index as the greatest of all libels on the Jews in the persons of Judas, Jacob, uxorious Solomon and wicked Jezebel. Behind the efforts of those who are seeking to link Great Britain and America in a lasting union of friendship, two historic episodes stand out in

It is almost precisely 300 years since the Pilsrim Fathers set sail from Plymouth in the Mayflower to make, on an undeveloped continent, a brave experiment of self-government. The actual tercentenary falls next year, and already preparations are in progress to celebrate the occasion in this country in a fitting manner.

It is now for Great Britain and America to determine that the friendship which their gallant soldiers comented with their blood shall be a permanent inspiration in their international relations.

#### A DOOR THAT LEADS TO DESPAIR.

Not long ago one of the young men who tried to rob a bank at Agincourt was brought up for sentence. In effect, he told the judge that he did not care what was done with him. This was no deflance or bravado, but sheer hopelessness. He spoke as if he had mad a wreck of his life and was no longer interested in his own future.

#### THE JAPANESE AND THE SILK MARKET.

Recollection of the manner in which Congressman Doremus utilized the price of stockings as a lever with which to land himself in the House of Representatives always checks any tendency to undue levity when a discussion of the cost of these articles of apparel starts. So it is hard to avoid a feeling that monstrous portent of some sort may lurk in the prophecy from London that silk ones are to 'way out of sight in the spring. It is given out that the prices--already 300 to 400 per cent above pre-war figures, and in the case of some Japanese varieties even more altitudinous-are due to the short skirt vogue which has immensely increased the demand for fancy hosiery, and that at the same time there has been a decrease in pro-

duction owing to the shortened hours of labor. The London analysis of cause and effect is presumably correct as far as it goes; but the word dropped concerning the especially prohibitive cost of Japanese stockings creates an additional thought and freshens recollection that in the opinion of many merchants not only silk hose, but silken material in all forms, is due for a sharp boost before another year is past.

The basis of this dire prophecy is the knowledge that most of the raw silk of the world comes from China, from Shan-tung, and that Shan-tung is just now in the hands of the Japanese. It is whispered here and there that the thrifty Japanese are con-templating the creation of a corner in raw silk which will teach western manipulators a thing or two.

#### are particularly in great demand in Europe. TRIBUTE TO BRITISH KINDNESS.

Mr. Davis, the American ambassador, speaking at the armistice dinner of the English-Speaking Union, told the world a number of new facts about the American soldiers who had "tramped across England's soil by thousands." A million Americans landed at British ports, and with greater or less delay were transported across the Channel to France. and, in due time, "there returned across that strip of water a tide of wounded." In all that movement he told us, "not one American officer or man was lost. That would be a remarkable achievement as any time, but it was done while Britain was carrying a constant stream of her own military forces, while a large part of her rolling stock was laboring in France, and while every square foot of the ports was needed for incoming supplies." But, Mr. Davis pointed out, the Americans were not merely afforded mechanical facilities. "From the moment when there was handed to each soldier on landing a gracious message of welcome under the sign-manual of his Majesty the King, to the time of their departure, they were never beyond the reach of British kindness." A special bureau had to be set up to dispose of the letters which poured into the American expeditionary force headquarters, while the convalescent men were overwhelmed with offers of hospitality. The most skeptical, said Mr. Davis, should surely be convinced of the "shot-proof" character of English and American friendship.
