TORONTO, Feb. 22.-In replying to the Legislature this afternoon to a question Attorney-General W. E. Raney stated that 36 men had been appointed to the provincial police force since January 1 1920, some of them being required to fill vacancies.

T. Herbert Lennox asked what was the total cost of enforcing

the Ontario temperance act since 1918. Mr. Raney replied that in 1918 the total cost was \$210,829; in 1919, \$235,454; in 1920, \$316,055, and in 1921, \$482,084.

He added, however, that the revenue received from fines and confiscation had exceeded the cost of enforcement of the act. The revenues were: 1918, \$213,709; 1919, \$316,087; 1920, \$785,-788: 1921, \$663,886.

The attorney-general added that there was approximately \$200, 000 of confiscated liquors on hand, so that the total revenue for 1921 would be about \$863,000.



"It is no longer the one wife and her children who have legal claims on the husband and father, but other women and their children have first claims backed and supported by all the machin-ery of the law. If at the man's death his widow refuses to pay either a lump sum, or a sum of money weekly, to support the other woman's child she may be sent to the common jail for six months. Already a man has received such a sentence in default of payment.

"All proceedings under this act are to be held by the judge in his chambers and not in open court-here the widow and her children will be forced to appear alone and unprotected in their hour of need, while the woman who has broken the moral law has a government official to act for her, and the law forces the widow to pay. It is left to the discretion of the judge to allow the legal widow and her children 'Necessary maintenance.' The act however, as before stated, requires a 'reasonable standard of life for the child of the unmar-

ried woman.'
"We have been informed that the Social Service Council have only given attention to this legislation from the point of view of







I don't mean just an ordinary fast ball, but one with a lot of "swift" on it, as Nick Altrock would say.

I had been working on a curve ball in the meantime, and when it became evident to me that I was losing a bit of my speed, I began to resort to the curve to cross the batters up.

I met with almost as much success with my curve as my fast one. However, I will always believe that I made a missiake in using too many curve balls, after once acquiring a good "hook."

Battle-Scarred Colors Are Placed In the Hotel Des Invalides.

LONDON, Eng., Feb. 22.-(Canamony was witnessed in Paris yesterday, says a Reuter dispatch from Paris when the battle-scarred flags of 390 regiments that fought in the war were born through the streets to their final resting place in the Hotel des Invalides.

Moving scenes were witnessed along the route. Many of the flags carried the cross of the Legion of Honor, and on them could be traced fragments of the word "Honneur et Patrie," and parts of the remains of regimental numbers, the rest of which had been shot away in battle. Every head was uncovered as the relics passed three by three, each with its guard of trench-helmeted infantrymen. Thousands of old soldiers stood rigidly at salute with twitching lips as their old colors ecalled memories of many terrible

fights. The flags were received in the ourtyard of the Hotel des Invalides by a guard of honor of detachments from every unit in the Paris garrison. Marshal Petain subsequently formally handed over the flags to the governor of the building.






