St. Petersburg, Aug. 24. - The Novos ti today says: "Continued violation of neutrality laws in the Chinese ports by the Japanese will compel Russia to regard the Chinese Empire, or, at least, part thereof, as being within the sphere active hostilities. China lacks either the power or the inclination to pre-vent Japanese incursions. The warships of neutral powers idly watch these violations. Therefore the agree ment as to China's neutrality made at the beginning of the war becomes a dead-letter, and Russia must ignore it in self-defense.'

U. S. Won't Interfere. Washington, Aug. 23. - Under no conditions will American warships take a hand in any trouble at Shanghai or China, between Japan and Russia, or between either of the belligerents and China. 

Battle Took Place Off Korsakovsk the Jap Ship Being Hard Hit.

Tokio, Aug. 23. — 5 p.m. — The Japanese protected cruiser Tsushima alone defeated the Russian cruiser Novik. The first engagement occurred on Saturday, Aug. 20, and the Japanese protected cruiser Chitose finished the destruction of the Russian ship on Sun-

details of the engagement reached the navy department here today. At dawn Saturday the Chitose arrived at a point twenty miles northwest of Rebunshiri Island, and proceeded to search the Soya (La Pereuse) Strait. The weather was heavy and the Novik was not discovered. At 8 o'clock Saturday morning the Chitose and the Tsushima met close to Rebunshiri Island. The Tsushima had previously been searching to the west-ward. After the meeting of the two Japanese cruisers the Chitose took up the afternoon. She immediately signaled her discovery to the Chitose by wireless telegraph, and at once at-tacked the enemy. The Novik was returned. hit frequently by the fire from the Japanese cruiser, and at 5:40 she retreated to the inner anchorage at Korsakovsk. She was then enveloped in white smoke, and was evidently on Pretty Actress Wagers She Will fire. vanced to the Korsakovsk anchorage and discovered that the Novik had beached close to the town, and that the crew of the Russian vessel appeared to be disembarking. The Typhoid Outbreak. The medical health officer of Port Stanley writes in defense of his town, river by sewage, in houses closed up during the summer and filled with sewer gas, in milk carrying disease germs, and so on. Unfortunately for his contention, our sewerage is the very reverse of defective, and our people do not drink river-water. Sanitarians say the typhoid germ is conveyed in material taken into the stomach, very rarely, if ever, by germs carried in the air. The people here who have had the disease did not close up their houses edly tested and found to be pure, while the examination of Port Stanley water by an analyst at Toronto, as well as several chemists, shows that it contains disease germs. Unfortunately for Port Stanley, the proofs are too plain. We have no desire to see that town injured in any way, especially as a summer resort. And in future our health authorities will have to keep a close watch on that town, to do what are not disposed to blame their health




