ASSESSMENT BILL

Toronto, Jan. 26.-Mr. Gibson, Attorney-General, as chairman, presented the new assessment draft before the special committee of the Legislature on this subject to-day, and the committee ordered it to be printed.

The new bill arops the proposed house tax and the proposed provincial board of assessment for dealing with franchise-holding companies.

The business tax will be on a graduated scale. Distillers will be assessed on 125 per cent. of their property, and brewers on 160 per cent.

MAJORITY WAS

Liberal Surplus Greatly Re-Reduced in the North Oxford Bye-Election.

Wondstock Goes Conservative Reversing Former Large Majority-Returns as far as Heard.

Woodstock, Ont., Jan. 26 .- The returns of the North Oxford election received to night give Col, Munro, the Liberal candidate a majority of 800 with four or five places to hear from, which will increase it.

The Conservatives are far from dis heartened. Indeed the first probable result of the election contest will be to make the Conservative Club in Woodstock a Conservative organization that will extend all over the riding. The present election found them without any organization in any place, and with only a week to pre-

Under the circumstances the Con. servaitves did very well in this city. They secured a majority of 34, or ilt may be 54, for there is a dispute as to the figures for one division in Woodstock, and they polled on the average a very good vote throughout the rid-They did not do all they expected to do in Woodstock, but it must be remembered that they had to fight against a perfect Liberal organization and the influence of the Minister of Public Works. Hon. Jas. Satherland, who has taken an active part in the campaign from the first. It is difficult to make a comparison with former contests for the legislature for the reason that the last two were three-cornered contests, and it is impossible to make a comparison with the previous contests for the Dominion, for the reason that the constituency was not the same. Taking the last contest for the Legylature, Pattullo polled 2,254 votes, Ross (Independent Liberal) 1,150, and Muma (Conservative) 1,054. Assuming that 20 per cert. of Ross' support came from the Conservatives as an outside figure, the figures would be:—Liberal, 3,179; Conservative, 1,284; giving a straight Liberal majority of 1,895. This has been practically cut in two.

The Conservatives did not expect to win the riding; the utmost they looked for was to keep the Liberal majority down to about 500.

The vote polled was unusually large considerag the weather. The vote in Woodstock was probably the largestever polled. Col. Mumro polled over 300 more votes here than the late Mr. Pattullo, and Mr. Butler nearly 300 more. From ten to twenty per cent. more votes were polled in the rural constituencies than last election, showing how desperate the fight was. The Conservatives here are confident that with proper organization and sufficient time for preparation they will yet win North Oxford, and before very long. They anticipate another election within a year at the most, and in order that they may not be caught unprepared again they will probably begin by putting candidates in the field for both houses without unnecessary delay.

The result of the contest will probably be the enstrangement from Hon. Jas. Sutherland of a large section of his following known as the "Sutherland Tories," who have always supported him. Everything considered, the Conservatives claim, they have done well, and they feel that with proper organization they will be able to do much better.

Significant Statement of Attorney-General Gibson in Legislature.

They May go out for a Term But it will be with Faces to the Foe.

Toronto, Jan. 26 .- That the Ontario Government realizes they have about run their course is made evident by the words with which Attorney-General Gibson concluded his speech in the Legislature this afternoon. Here is what he said: "I should be glad to be relieved of

the responsibilities of office, and probably my colleagues take the same view. But I refuse to be a party to any Government being bulldozed and blackguarded out of power. We are ready to retire-from power, and may go out for a term, but not under such compulsion as, the Opposition seek to apply. Perhaps no minister has had such inducements to retire as I have had. I refuse to desert my leader under the present circumstances. When I go it will be with his full consent; and when it will not cause any loss to him or the Government. The Opposition policy seems to be to hound the Government out. We may be forced out, but it will be with our faces to the enemy, and not by turning tail as cowards or traitors. Possibly the Opposition will take longer than they think to do this. They may find we have reached the turning point of our unfortunate luck in the death of members, etc., and that the tide will carry us through, notwithstanding our present small blackguarded out of power. We are

that the tide will carry us through, notwithstanding our present small majority."

In the course of his speech Mr. Gibson complained that the Opposition unfairly charged the Government with knowingly permitting the West Elgin ballots to be burned.

LESSONS FOR CANADIAN FARM ERS.

The complete returns issued by the British Board of Trade for the year 1903 show the fluctuations of the trade during the past year. Under the heading "Animals Living," the United States is credited with sending 307,757, a decrease of 22,674, while Canada forwarded 190,815, be-

ing the substantial increase of 97,141.
Of course the closing of the ports
of Boston and Portland during most or the year seriously affected the live stock shipments from the United States. The shipment of sheep and lambs from the United States declined from 233,227 to 171,386, a very heavy decrease of 61,841. Canada shows a satisfactory increase of 28,-2258, the total last year being 88,258, the total last year being 88,291. It is well to remember, however, that in the two months that the ports of Great Britain were open to Argentina that grazing country shipped over 82,941, illustrating very clearly our advantage of being free from contagious disease.
Under the head "Beef (fresh)" the

first place is accorded to the United States, last year's total being 2,693, 920 cwts., an increase of 403,465 cwts. Then follows Argentina, with 1,152,-211, an increase of 228,463 cwts. Australasia follows with 237,486, a decrease of 66,631 cwts., ending with other countries 75,989, a decrease of cwts. There are two coun-114.068 tries named under the head of "Mutton." The first, Australasia, sent forward 2,216,703, an increase of 302,-532 cwts., and Argentina forwarded 1,485,770, an increase of 133,269 cwts.

The above enumerated figures conclusively point out the pressing need of Ontario entering into the dressed beef trade in competition with the United States and Argentina. The increase in animals living is very creditable to Canada, but we must bear in mind that the Yankee knows by experience that it is more profitable for them to ship the dressed beef than the living animal, consequently the one item shows a decrease, the other item an increase.

BURNS' ANNIVERSARY. Yesterday was the anniversary of the birth of Robert Burns. In every English-speaking city of the world, it is mafe to say, the event was lobserved in one way or other, whether by a club dinner and suitable orations, or by the lover of the Ayrshire poet taking down from the shelf his well-thumbed copy, and reading for the hundredth time his favorite passages, with reverence becoming the occasion. It gladens one's heart to see the warmth of affection poured out for Burns, an affection which not half a score of characters in our history ever inspired. The reasom is not hard to find. Burns is about the only great poet we understand. We may, indeed, be mistaken in our estimate of him, since "to err is human," but at least we believe we know Burns. He had no characteristic that was not thoroughly human. He was brilliant, with none of the eccentricities of genius. gave himself no airs, nor pleaded his artistic temperament as an excuse for unartistic extravagances. On Tennyson we may bestow a character admiration, but Tennyson never won tithe of the love accorded the Scottish farmer. honor, his scrupulous cleanliness, his lofty ideals-well, we admire them, wery much as we might admire an Italian cathedral without particularly caring to live in it. We may be unjust to the cathedral and to Tennyson in subjecting him to such a comparison, but we must be fair to Burns. It may be that praise which was showered on him yesterday was undeserved. Much of his work will not endure. Some of his lyrics are deathless. His best work he hoped to do, but never accomplished. We can understand so well a man not doing his best work, and so well can we see why Burns, like others, failed. The Nemesis of his past deeds were on his trail, instead of the bright angels which peopled his fancy when the world was young and fair to him, ghosts crept out when he sat aione, ghosts of spoiled lives communing with the ghost of his own wrecked career. Walking in this nightmare, Burns did not produce the great masterpiece which the critics had expected. He pottered mechanically in the growing shadows, and at last the flame which for a time had burned so brilliantly sputtered and went out. Tears over the career of Robert Burny are wasted. Few men do not deserve them just as much as he. He had his good days and his evil, but all through his life be was a much-loved man.

REVIVING OLD PARTY LINES.

Only a few months ago Lord Ros bery was solemnly excommunicated by the Liberal leader in the House of Commons, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman. The former flung back the message and announced his intention of plowing his lonely furrow and doing spade work in his own way and in his own time.

Lord Rosebery has never been a persona grata with the radical section of the opposition. He and his Liberal leaguers or Imperialist Liberals have during and since the Boer war been anathema to the rabid little Englanders whose chief organ in the press is the London Daily News. When Sir Henry, in an unwonted burst of courage, put his foot down the step was loudly hailed as the extinction of the brilliant Earl, and no place of repentance was offered him unless he sought it with humbleness and tears.

It would have had an unfortunate result in British politics had this attempt of the Little Englanders succeeded. An official opposition bound to support the tenets to which they attach supreme importance would ended in strictly imperial interests and affairs being thrown once more into the vortex of party politics. But the loyalty of Lord Rosebery's own personal following, who include the strongest and sanest of the coming men of the party, despite the discouragement inseparable from his some what vacillating course, saved the situation. Without their support the Radicals felt they were hopeless and Sir Henry's fulminatory bull soon passed into the limbo or failures.

Joseph Chamberlain's fiscal reform movement, if it does nothing else, will be memorable in history as the efficient cause of the restoration of the old party lines. It now appears certain that the Liberal Unionist organization is irreparably shattered. Lord Rosebery and his party at once sprang into prominence and became of vital importance, for, without them there could have been no reconciliatioon between the Duke of Devonshire and the Liberal Unionists who

EMIGRATION

Efforts in Certain Quarters to Check It - Labor Leaders Blamed.

The Dominion Government Informed of the Matter.-Efforts to Offset the Onslaught.

London, Jan. 25 .- A persistent propaganda is still being carried on in this country to prevent emigrants under any circumstances from pro-ceeding to Canada. The officials here declare this is being done under the auspices of United States labor bosses, who control the Canadian labor unions. The design presumably is to destroy the emigrating movement through Great Britain. That, of course, is impossible, but neverthe-less, the propaganda is capable of do-ing much harm to emigration to Can-

The matter has been fully reported to the Government at Ottawa. It remains to be seen what official ac-tion will be taken.

tion will be taken.

Meanwhile the Canadian emigration department is meeting the onslaughts upon Canada as a field for
settlement by the publication of letters, from successful settlers, and alters, from successful settlers, and al-so by arranging interviews between intending emigrants and successful Canadian farmers now visiting this country. The department has also circulated one-quarter of a million of pamphlets containing remarkable testimonies of members of the recent Chambers of Commerce Congress at Montreal to Canada's fertility and at Montreal to Canada's fertility and entire suitability for settlement. Much activity is also being displayed in dis-deminating Canadian literature and deminating Canadian literature and maps through the schools. One ingenious method of advertising Canada is being eagerly adopted by the grocers and other small traders throughout the country. Their wrappers for goods now bear an excellent picture of Canada's arch of the Coronation year, with a pithy description of its evidences of Canada's resources.

London, Jan. 26.—There was an interesting debate last night at the interesting debate last night at National Liberal Club upon the sition of the Liberal party and co-lonial policy. Lord Carrington was

The Right Hon. Richard B. Haldane, K.C., M.P., declared that fiscal union would mean disunion. Imperial Federation was like thrusting a ramrod into a delicate piece of a ramrod into a delicate piece of machinery. Unless each component part retained complete freedom the Empire would not last ten years. As links in the Empire he suggested the temporary enlargement of the Imperial Cabinet by the addition of colonial advisers, the more frequent summoning of the Committee on Imperial Defense and their components. moning of the Committee on Imperial Defence and the transformation of the House of Lords into a grand Imperial chamber for the discussion of Imperial questions, where the agents-general of the various colonies could sit and the colonies bring forward their difficulties.

F. A. Channing, M.P., believed the best colonial policy lay in the absolute freedom of every unit.

Mr. Hawksley, solicitor for the late Cecil Rhodes' estate, argued that before the House of Lords could become an Imperial chamber, it needed amendment, which was an imperial chamber,

could become an Imperial chamber, it needed amendment, which was an impossibility unless backed by the country. Proposals for an enlarged Cabinet were of no value unless carried by the House of Commons.

J. Samuel, M.P., said the day was far distant when a member for Montreal would sit side by side with the member for Paddington. The real links of the Empire were an Imperial law tribunal and the Committee on Imperial Defence. Colonial sentiment avoided the fetid atmosphere of the House of Lords. The colonials fighting in South Africa themselves outnumbered the Boers and Australia was able to throw 100,000 men into India in the time of need.

MME. TUSSAUD'S.

ondon's Wax Show One Hundred Years Old—Romance of Founder—Once is Danger of the Guillotine.

The centenary of the foundation of Mme. Tussaud's Waxwork Exhibition in London was celebrated by a dinner at Baker street, on Dec. 17.

Like many other of London's "show" places, Tussaud's is even more famous throughout the country than it is in the metropolis. Just as visits to St. Paul's, the Abbey, and the Tower are inseparably associated the Tower are inseparably associated

wish to St. Paul s, the Abbey, and the Tower are inseparably associated with our country cousin's sojourn in London, so is a visit to Tussaud's regarded as equally indispensable.

Although the centenary of Tussaud's was celebrated in the last month of 1903, the exhibition was, in reality, started by Mme. Tussaud in 1802. It may seem strange, in view of this fact, to say that many who are no longer in their first youth must have a recollection of the neat little figure of Mme. Tussaud herself, seated near the vestibule of her palace of celebrities in was; but such is the case, and it is explained by the circumstance that Mme. Tussaud died at the great age of ninety in 1850.

She had a singular and varied life. She had a singular and varied life. She was a contemporary of, and lived among, the historic men and women of the French Revolution, and framed their portraits in wax from direct observation.

One day she would model the horrible features of the assassinated Marat, for whom she had no love; and the properties of the second of the second

and on another day she would imitate the countenance of his beautiful assassin, Charlotte Corday, for whom she had unbounded admiration. Now it was a Princess Lam-

balle, next Robespierre himself who was the object of her artistic attention.

Mme. Tussaid was for a time the inmate of a prison, and was in danger of the guillotine. She escaped from France and went through a period of adversity, which she faced with a stout heart. Once she was shipwrecked on a voyage to Ireland, and lost the whole of her stock; but she survived that calamity, and after time was able to set up her models a time was able to set up her models in London

They had their first home at the Lyceum, Strand. In 1855 the collection was settled in Baker street, and

tion was setfled in Baker street, and the present great building was erected to contain it in 1884.

From the moment when Mme. Tussaud settled in London fortune smiled upon the plucky and ingenious little lady. She had nearly fifty years of constant prosperity, and she left to her numerous descendants the finest waxworks show in the world and a considerable fortune.

ants the finest waxworks show in the world and a considerable fortune. The present director and artist-modeler is Mr. John Theodore Tussaud, great grandson of the founder of the exhibition. Through four generations the popularity of Tussaud's has steadily increased.

Neither time, trouble, nor money is spared to obtain anything that may prove an attraction to the exhibition. Remarkable stories are told of the sleuth-like hunts of the Tussaud directorate for articles rendered famous by their association with notable crimes, criminals, famous

notable crimes, criminals, famous

notable crimes, criminals, famous personages, and the astonishing prices that have been paid for them.

Not a notable crime of the century has occurred that is not recorded by an exhibit in the Chamber of Horrors, and no world celebrity has escaped commemoration in wax for a hundred wears.

The present, exhibition numbers 1, 000 figures, and its contents are valued at nearly half a million sterling. Over 250,000 people pass through the turnstiles in a year.

There is a regular army of dressmakers constantly employed on the premises, and the greatest attention is given to completeness and accuracy of costume. The most expensive pleteness and accur-The most expensive is given to completeness and acturacy of costume. The most expensive dress ever made for use there is perhaps that for the model of the Empress Eugenie, which cost £650.

The exhibition is now the property of a small limited company, but Mr. J. T. Tussaud has absolute control of the artistic arrangements.—London Express.
